



THE PRESIDENT'S MANSION


In 1838 the University of Alabama Board of Trustees appropriated funds for a more suitable residence for the University's new president, Basil Manly. The mansion was built between 1839 and 1841. According to tradition, Louisa Frances Garland, wife of president Landon C. Garland, valiantly saved the stately residence from destruction when Union troops destroyed the campus in April 4, 1865. The mansion, which has undergone a number of restorations, assumed its predominately white appearance in 1908.

From the architecture on campus to the landscaping, The University of Alabama campus is one of the most beautiful places in the state of Alabama.

← THE STUDENT RECREATION CENTER

The newly expanded Student Recreation Center offers first-class recreation facilities to students, faculty and staff.

The expanded facility includes two multi-use gyms, nine multipurpose courts, weight machines, 1/8-mile jogging track, extensive cardio area, locker rooms, indoor swimming pool, dry and steam saunas, 12 lighted tennis courts, four aerobics rooms, eight racquetball courts and a squash court—together encompassing more than 200,000 square feet.

The facility's outdoor aquatic area, which opened in the summer of 2003, features a lazy river, lap swim, large water-park-type slide and lots of deck space.



The University of Alabama's Director of Athletics since 1999, Mal Moore has made an indelible mark on one of the nation's most storied athletic programs, leading a department that has enjoyed tremendous success athletically and academically and has undergone an unprecedented period of growth during his tenure.

Through his guidance, Alabama's athletic department remains focused on his vision of having all Crimson Tide athletic teams and student-athletes competitive at the highest level nationally while continuing to elevate athletic facilities at the Capstone to premier status nationally for all sports.

During his tenure as Director of Athletics, Moore has overseen more than \$200 million of capital improvements to University of Alabama athletic facilities. Those projects have encompassed the entire scope of all Crimson Tide athletic programs and have benefitted every Alabama student-athlete, coach, and administrator.

Throughout his multi-faceted career, Moore has worked with a diversified field of constituents, from fellow coaches and former players, to fans and the business community. All of those experiences and relationships - in addition to his ability to unify those many constituents - have made him the ideal person to lead Alabama athletics in the 21st century.

His leadership has been crucial in helping guide Alabama through a period that has been, at times, extremely challenging. His guidance and effort helped Alabama athletics weather the storm, while continuing to move in a positive direction toward a future that holds great promise.

Moore's dedication to and love of the University of Alabama was recognized on March 28, 2007, when as a permanent tribute to his life-long contribution to The University of Alabama, the Board of Trustees of The University of Alabama officially dedicated the facility formerly known as The Football Building as the Mal M. Moore Athletic Facility.

Under Moore's direction, Alabama's athletic teams have produced several Southeastern Conference championships, winning titles in gymnastics, men's basketball, men's golf, men's cross country, baseball and softball; taking SEC tournament titles in both baseball and softball; and an NCAA gymnastics championship. Alabama athletes have earned some of the highest honors the SEC and NCAA have to offer, including SEC Athlete of the Year, SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year, NCAA Top VIII,

NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships and NCAA Sportsperson of the Year. These honors are over and above the individual conference and national titles that Alabama athletes continue to bring home to the Capstone on a regular basis.

In addition to making his mark on Alabama, Moore has also had a national impact as a key member of several prestigious NCAA and college football committees. Moore has served on the NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee, the SEC Athletic Directors Bowl Advisory Committee and the Big Six Conferences Minority Coaches Forum.

Moore's distinguished record of service to UA began more than 50 years ago when he joined the Crimson Tide football squad as a scholarship player for Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant from 1958-62. Moore has the distinction of being a part of seven national championship teams (1961, 1964, 1965, 1973, 1978, 1979, and 1992), 14 SEC championships, and 27 bowl trips during his career as a player and coach, the first as a member of the Crimson Tide's 1961 national championship team. He is the only individual connected with the Tide program to be a part of seven national championships.

During a coaching career that spanned 31 years, Moore spent 22 of those at Alabama with stops at Montana State, Notre Dame and the NFL's St. Louis and Phoenix Cardinals. At Alabama, Moore started as Coach Bryant's graduate assistant in 1964, then as defensive backfield coach for five years beginning in 1965 before becoming quarterbacks coach from 1971-82 and serving as the Tide's first offensive coordinator starting in 1975. He would go on to coordinate all of the offensive plays for Alabama's last four national championship teams

A 1963 graduate of The University of Alabama, Moore holds both an undergraduate degree in Sociology and a 1964 Master's Degree in Secondary Education from the Capstone. Moore was born December 19, 1939, in Dozier, Ala. He has been married to the former Charlotte Davis of Tuscaloosa since July 20, 1968. They have one daughter, Mrs. Steve (Heather) Cook of Scottsdale, Ariz., a granddaughter, Anna Lee, and a grandson, Charles Cannon.

Named the 27th head football coach in UA history on Wednesday, Jan. 3, 2007, Saban owns an overall record of 138-67-1 (.672) in 16 seasons as a head coach, having also led programs at Louisiana State (LSU), Michigan State and Toledo, as well as in the NFL with the Miami Dolphins. At each of his five stops, he has improved the win-loss record in his first year when compared to the previous season. Prior to Saban's arrival, those teams posted a combined average winning percentage of .387. In the first season with Saban at the helm, a .617 winning percentage was achieved.

With a perfect 13-0 mark this season, Saban has compiled a 123-50-1 (.710) record as a college head coach as he finishes his third season at the University of Alabama with the BCS National Championship Game against Texas. His Alabama team earned a spot in the title game with a resounding 32-13 win over defending National Champion Florida in the SEC Championship Game as the Crimson Tide moved to No. 1 in both major polls. The SEC Championship was the program's 22nd - by far the most in league history. On December 12, 2009, more history was made for both Alabama and Saban when running back Mark Ingram became the first Heisman Trophy winner for both. Saban's 2009 squad was well-represented when it came to other honors as well as Rolando McClain received the Butkus Award as the nation's top linebacker and six players earned first team AP All-American status - a record-high in college football. Joining Ingram and McClain were offensive guard Mike Johnson, cornerback Javier Arenas, nosegaurd Terrence Cody and placekicker Leigh Tiffin.

In addition to the on-field success, the 2009 Crimson Tide active roster featured a nation's best 13 players who had already graduated. That number increases to 21 players with degrees for the bowl game. Alabama led the conference in teams of freshman All-SEC academic honorees as well with 12. Of the three SEC players to be named to the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-American Team, two were from Alabama as Colin Peek earned first team honors and Barrett Jones was a second team selection. Peek was the first UA players to be named to the first team 2002.

Saban's first UA team finished 7-6 in 2007, but the 2008 season saw a different Alabama squad take the field. Saban's influence had taken hold in Tuscaloosa, and behind a small and united senior class along with a talented group of newcomers, the Crimson Tide returned to national prominence. The Tide developed a reputation as the most physical football team in the country and methodically dominated the competition. Saban produced the largest win increase from year one to year two in school history as the Tide went from a seven-win team in 2007 to 12 wins in 2008. Alabama swept through the regular season schedule with a 12-0 record, moving to No. 1 in all of the polls and capturing the SEC Western Division Championship before falling late to Florida in a hardfought SEC Championship Game. Their efforts earned them a trip to the Allstate Sugar Bowl for the 13th time in school history. Saban was named the 2008 Home Depot Coach of the Year at the ESPN Awards Show in Orlando and won several other national coach of the year honors including the FWAA/Eddie Robinson, AP, Sporting News, Walter Camp, and Liberty

Lessons learned from the 2007 season. which was capped with a win over Colorado in the Independence Bowl, no doubt carried over into to spring and summer preparations for the 2008 run. The win also continued an impressive streak for Saban as he has never had a losing season in 13 years as a college head coach. Of the six losses in 2007, none was by more than seven points. In addition to an improvement in the win-loss column from the year pior, the 2008 signing class was rated by many analysts as the best in the country. Off the field, the focus on academics by Saban and his staff made an immediate impact as the 2007 team put together one of the finest fall semesters in school history. The freshman class set a solid foundation for their future at UA as they led the way with an impressive combined GPA of 3.098 in the fall.

Before arriving in Tuscaloosa, Saban's most recent college head coaching stint was a five-season run at LSU which produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships, three SEC West Division championships, and a 3-2 record in bowl games including two Sugar Bowl victories and a Peach Bowl win. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban's guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association

of America. Saban was named SEC Coach of the Year twice (by The Birmingham News in 2001 and by the Associated Press in 2003).

Saban took over the Alabama program after serving two seasons at the helm of the Miami Dolphins. Saban's teams showed marked improvement over the unit he inherited. Taking over a team that finished 4-12 in 2004, Saban led the 2005 Dolphins to a 9-7 record, the third-biggest turnaround in the NFL that season and the second-highest victory turnaround for a Dolphins team in any nonstrike season. Most impressively, the Dolphins finished 2005 on a six-game winning streak, the longest streak in the NFL that season.



Named head coach at LSU on November 30, 1999, Saban led an immediate turnaround of a program that had suffered through seven losing seasons during the 1990s. His 48 victories over five seasons were the third-most among Division I-A head coaches during that time. Saban, Paul Dietzel and current LSU head coach Les Miles are the only coaches in the program's history to post multiple 10-win seasons. Saban, Dietzel and Bernie Moore are the only head coaches in Tiger history to win two SEC championships. Saban's 2000 Tigers rebounded from two straight losing seasons to post an 8-4 season, capped by a 31-20 win over 15th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl. Home victories over Tennessee, Mississippi State and Alabama highlighted the season, along with a key road win at Ole Miss.

The 2001 Tigers improved to 10-3 overall and won the program's first outright SEC title since 1986 with a 31-20 win over second-ranked Tennes

ning a second consecutive SEC West Division title as a last-minute comeback by Arkansas in the regular season finale prevented LSU from another appearance in the SEC Championship game. That LSU team overcame the mid-season loss of starting quarterback Matt Mauck, free safety Damien James and Toefield in successive weeks to make a run at an SEC Western Division title.

Saban's philosophy of "out of yourself and into the team" paid huge dividends in 2003. The Tigers produced a 13-1 record, won their second SEC championship and earned the school's second national championship with a squad that was among the nation's most dominant on both sides of the line of scrimmage. The LSU offense scored a school-record 475 points (33.9 points per game) while holding 13-of-14 opponents to less than 20 points. LSU's defense ranked first nationally in points allowed per game (11.0) and total defense (252.0 yards per game).

berth in the Capital One Bowl in Orlando against Iowa. LSU's fourth consecutive January bowl berth, a first for the Tiger program.

Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans' defensive coordinator/secondary coach. After playing in just one bowl game in the previous four years, Michigan State made four postseason appearances in Saban's five years at the helm. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record.

In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season. The Spartans' performance that year landed them a spot in the Citrus Bowl.



see in the SEC Championship game. An impressive second half against the Volunteers was a trademark of Saban's coaching acumen as the Tigers outscored UT, 21-3, in the final half to erase a 17-10 deficit. The Tigers won the game despite the absence of starting quarterback Rohan Davey and running back LaBrandon Toefield. Sparked by one of the most prolific offenses in the nation, a unit that averaged 451.5 yards per game, the Tigers capped the season with a 47-34 defeat of Big Ten champion Illinois in the Sugar Bowl, LSU's first victory in a New Year's Day bowl game since 1968.

Stifling defense was the trademark of the 2002 Tigers. LSU posted an 8-5 record and a second consecutive New Year's Day bowl appearance. The Tigers, who faced Texas in the Cotton Bowl, held opponents to less than 275 yards per game through the season's first six games and scored a school-record 30 or more points in six straight games that season. The Tigers barely missed win-

After a 7-1 start, LSU ended the season with six dominating victories by an average margin of 35-10. An impressive 34-13 victory over Georgia in the SEC title game paved LSU's way to an appearance in the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) Championship Game against top-ranked Oklahoma.

The Tigers produced a dominant defensive effort against the Sooners in the Sugar Bowl, limiting OU to 154 yards of total offense in a 21-14 victory.

His final LSU team in 2004 overcame the loss of 13 players from the 2003 team who went on to NFL rosters, posting a 9-3 record while producing the SEC's best rushing offense (200.7 yards per game). The Tiger defense ranked third nationally during the regular season in total defense (249.9 yards per game) and passing defense (145.4 yards per game), allowing only 15.9 points per contest. Over the last six games, the Tiger defense allowed only 12 points in the second half on the way to a

The Spartans led the Big Ten in rushing defense (77.0 yards per game) and total defense (299.0 yards per game) while ranking fifth nationally in rushing defense and 11th in total defense. The Spartans offense averaged 31.0 points per game.

Saban was the first coach in school history to put the Spartans in postseason bowl games in each of his first three seasons as he led the Spartans to the Independence Bowl in 1995, the Sun Bowl in 1996 and the Aloha Bowl in 1997.

Before joining the Spartans, Saban spent four seasons (1991-94) as defensive coordinator with the Cleveland Browns under head coach Bill Belichick. The Browns went from allowing the most points (462) in the NFL prior to Saban's arrival to allowing the fewest points (204) in the league in 1994, the sixth-fewest points surrendered in NFL history at the time. In each of Saban's four years guiding the Browns' defense, they never permitted an av-





erage of more than 19.2 points per game. He built a reputation as one of the finest defensive coaches in the league and also was heavily involved in the team's player personnel and scouting process.

Saban's first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points), and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.

Saban joined Toledo after serving as secondary coach with the Houston Oilers for two seasons under Jerry Glanville (1988-89), his first NFL coaching position. He quickly made an impact on the Oilers' defense, as the team's secondary tied for fourth in the AFC in 1988 with 21 interceptions and tied for second in the conference in 1989 with 22.

In his first stint at Michigan State, Saban served as secondary coach and defensive coordinator under George Perles from 1983 through 1987. Saban played an integral part in helping the Spartans to three postseason bowl appearances, including a Big Ten championship in 1987 and a 20-17 victory over Southern California in the 1988 Rose Bowl. Michigan State led the nation in rushing defense in 1987, allowing only 61.2 yards per game, and ranked second in scoring defense, permitting just 12.4 points.

A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor's degree in business. He earned a master's degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen.

Saban co-authored Tiger Turnaround in 2001, a book documenting his first two years as head coach at LSU, and co-authored How Good Do You Want to Be in 2005, a book that offers reallife principles for success at work and at home.

In addition to work as fund-raisers for LSU's Student-Athlete Academic Center, the Sabans supported several charitable and civic projects in Louisiana. The largest of those efforts was with the Children's Miracle Network, for which Terry and Nick raised more than \$100,000 per year for children.

At Michigan State, the Sabans started the Nick's Kids Fund, which they have continued in Tuscaloosa, a vibrant example of their continuing concern for disadvantaged children. Since Nick and Terry arrived in Tuscaloosa, more than \$1 million has been distributed to approximately 100 charities through the Nick's Kids Fund. In winning the 2008 Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year Award, Saban was awarded a \$50,000 gift at the A-Day Game, which he designated for Nick's Kids, as well as an additional \$20,000 gift for the University of Alabama scholarship fund.

In June of this year, Nick and Terry pledged \$1 million to the university's scholarship fund and earmarked it for first-generation college students. Terry also plays an important role in the planning of many of the events for causes including the Nick's Kids Fund. Her eagerness to give back and her tireless devotion to help others is what makes Terry Saban one of the most admired members of the Crimson Tide family.

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH / RUNNING BACKS



Burton Burns is in his third season with the Crimson Tide football program as associate head coach and running backs coach. The New Orleans native is regarded as one of the best in college football and was named the FootballScoop Running Backs Coach of the Year following the 2008 season

Under Burns' quidance this year, sophomore Mark Ingram was awarded Alabama's first-ever Heisman Trophy and earned consensus All-America honors. Ingram set the school's single-season rushing record with 1,542 yards and 15 TD while adding 30 catches for 322 yards and three more scores. True freshman Trent Richardson was the team's second-leading rusher (642 yards, 6 TD) and was named a freshman All-SEC selection. The Tide also got some valuable production, especially on third downs, from senior Roy Upchurch. Alabama ended the regular season 12th nationally with an average of 215.9 rushing yards per game.

Burns also developed one of the nation's strongest running games in 2008 as Alabama finished 3rd in the SEC and 30th nationally with an average of 184.6 rushing yards per game. Junior Glen Coffee, a first-team All-SEC selection and third round draft pick of the San Francisco 49ers, led the way with 1,383 yards on the ground. That single season total tied for second in school history and was third in the conference. In addition, Mark Ingram was 8th in the SEC in rushing (728 yards), captured Freshman All-SEC honors and set a Crimson Tide rookie record with 12 rushing touchdowns.

In his first year at Alabama, Burns helped first-year tailback Terry Grant set school records for rushing yards (891) and touchdowns (8) by a freshman in a season. Grant was a three-time SEC Freshman of the Week honoree, and was named to the SEC All-Freshman team as well as the Sporting News Freshman All-American team (honorable mention).

An assistant coach at Clemson University for eight seasons before coming to Alabama, Burns was a major factor in producing six of the top 10 offenses in Clemson history as running backs coach for the Tigers. Burns tutored star runners such as 2005 ACC Rookie of the Year James Davis, 2006 freshman record-setter C.J. Spiller, Reggie Merriweather, Travis Zachery and Duane Coleman at Clemson and former New York Jet Jerald Sowell at Tulane. In 2006, Davis led the Tigers with 1,187 rushing yards on 203 carries and scored 17 touchdowns, while Spiller had 938 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns. The Tigers averaged 5.7 yards per carry during the '06 regular season.

Burns spent eight seasons with head coach Tommy Bowden at Clemson after a four-year stint at Tulane that concluded with a 12-0 season in 1998. Over 14 seasons as a college assistant coach, Burns has regularly produced versatile running backs that have been effective in every phase of the game. His players have proven to be equally effective as pass catchers, as well as in the running game.

Burns, 56, spent nine seasons as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Saint Augustine High School in New Orleans, La., before joining Bowden's staff at Tulane. Burns helped lead Saint Augustine to district titles in 1987, 1992 and 1993, his second stint at the school. Burns' first experience as a coach also was at Saint Augustine, where he served as an assistant from 1977-79 and helped the school win three more district championships on the way to consecutive state titles in 1978-79. Burns also coached at New Orleans' Booker T. Washington High School in 1980 before a five-year stint as an assistant coach at Southern University in Baton Rouge from 1981-85.

As a player, Burns played fullback (1971-75) at the University of Nebraska under head coach Tom Osborne. A member of three Cornhuskers teams that won at least nine games. Burns participated in the Orange Bowl, Cotton Bowl and Sugar Bowl as a player. He earned a bachelor's degree in education from Nebraska in 1976.

Curt Cignetti joined the Crimson Tide football coaching staff in February of 2007 as receivers coach and recruiting coordinator. The 2008 and 2009 signing classes were listed by most recruiting analysts among the nation's best.

Alabama looked for more diversity in the passing game in 2009 and the Crimson Tide receivers answered that challenge. Sophomore Julio Jones again led the team in all three receiving categories (42 catches, 573 yards, 4 TD) but the team benefitted greatly as Marquis Maze and Darius Hanks emerged as reliable targets and deep threats throughout the season. Maze was second on the team with 30 catches for 519 yards (2 TD) and Hanks added 17 receptions for 272 yards and three scores. Maze led the team with five catches for 96 yards in the SEC Championship Game.

In his second year at the Capstone, Cignetti coached wide receiver Julio Jones as he established school freshman records for receiving yards (924) and receptions (58). Jones was recognized as the AP Freshman of the Year in the SEC and also earned Freshman All-America honors. The true freshman had an outstanding performance in the SEC Championship Game against Florida with five catches for 124 yards.

Cignetti coached D.J. Hall in 2007 as he established Alabama records for career receiving yards and receptions. Hall, who also set the school mark for single season receptions in 2007, was one of three SEC receivers to reach the 1,000-yard mark that year.

Entering his 27th season in the college coaching ranks, Cignetti spent the previous seven seasons as tight ends coach, recruiting coordinator and quarterbacks coach at North Carolina State. He served as recruiting coordinator while coaching tight ends (from 2000-02 and 2005-06) and quarterbacks (2003-04). In 2005, Cignetti was ranked among the nation's top 25 recruiters by Rivals.com. Among the players Cignetti coached during his tenure with the Wolfpack was the ACC Player of the Year, quarterback Philip Rivers in 2003. Rivers set ACC records for passing yards (4,491) and touchdown passes (34) while leading the country in completion percentage (72.0) and passing efficiency (170.5). He also coached first team All-ACC tight end Sean Berton in 2002 and second team All-ACC tight ends TJ Williams (2005) and Anthony Hill

Prior to working with the Wolfpack, Cignetti spent six seasons (1994-99) on the staff at the University of Pittsburgh. Cignetti began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Pittsburgh in 1983-84.

As a player, Cignetti played quarterback at West Virginia University from 1979-82. During his playing career, Cignetti played on teams that made consecutive bowl appearances in 1981-82 (1981 Peach Bowl and 1982 Gator Bowl). He was honored with the Lewis D. Meisel Award for academic excellence and the A.C. "Whitey" Gwynn Award for character while playing for the Mountaineers.

Cignetti hails from a family that has deep coaching roots. His father, Frank, was head coach at West Virginia and Indiana University of Pennsylvania, racking up 199 career victories before retiring at the conclusion of the 2005 season. Curt's brother, Frank Jr., is also a veteran of the college coaching ranks and is currently the offensive coordinator at Pittsburgh.

Cignetti earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from West Virginia. He is married to the former Manette Lawer and the couple has three children: Curtis John, Carly Ann and Natalie.

DEFENSIVE LINE COACH



Bo Davis is in his third season with the Crimson Tide football staff as defensive line coach. Davis joined the Alabama staff after serving the 2006 season as an assistant strength and conditioning coach and assistant defensive line coach with the Miami Dolphins under Nick Saban.

Davis' 2009 defensive line was again the key in setting the tone for an Alabama defense that ranked either first or second nationally in four major categories - rush defense, pass efficiency defense, total defense and scoring defense. Senior nosegaurd Terrence Cody earned All-America honors for the second straight season while seniors Lorenzo Washington and Brandon Deaderick anchored the defensive end positions. Sophomore Marcell Dareus emerged as a pass-rusher and led the team with 6.5 sacks.

The Alabama defensive line saw great improvement in 2008, which helped the Crimson Tide develop into one of the top defensive units overall nationally. Davis added Terrence Cody to the starting lineup at noseguard and the junior was named an All-American in his first season. Alabama ranked second nationally in terms of rush defense, allowing just 74.1 yards per game on the ground. UA also ranked among the top seven in the country in total defense (263.5 ypg) and scoring defense (14.3 ppg).

Under Davis' watch in 2007, senior defensive end Wallace Gilberry put together one of the finest seasons in Alabama history. Gilberry earned first team All-SEC status, leading the league in tackles for loss (27) and finishing second in sacks (10).

Davis, 38, has a deep history in Southeastern Conference football. Prior to his stint with the Dolphins, Davis spent four years (2002-05) as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at LSU under Saban and current Tigers' head coach Les Miles.

A former All-SEC defensive lineman for LSU in the early 1990's, Davis joined the LSU strength and conditioning staff as assistant coordinator in June of 2002. He joined the LSU staff after a stint at North Shore High School in Galena Park, Texas, where he served as an assistant football coach from 1997-2002. Davis played football at LSU from 1990 to 1992, earning second team All-SEC honors as a noseguard in 1992. He finished his LSU career with 90 tackles, one sack and one fumble recovery. As a senior in 1992, Davis started all 11 games at noseguard, recording 66 tackles, including four tackles for loss.

A native of Magee, Miss., Davis graduated from LSU in 1993 and he then served as a graduate assistant with the LSU strength and conditioning program from 1995-1997. Davis and his wife, Omeika, have a son (Bo) and a daughter (Juliana).



JIM MCELWAIN

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR / QUARTERBACKS COACH

Jim McElwain was named Alabama's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach by head coach Nick Saban on January 30, 2008 and his balanced offensive attack helped the Crimson Tide to a 12-2 mark in year one and a 13-0 mark entering the BCS National Championship Game in 2009.

Balance was again the key for the Crimson Tide this season as the Tide utilized Heisman Trophy winning tailback Mark Ingram in both the run and pass game, including plenty of work from the "wildcat" formation. Alabama ranked 12th nationally in rushing yards per game (215.9) and 26th in the country in scoring (31.7 ppg). First-year starting quarterback Greg McElroy was fourth in the SEC and 30th in the country in pass efficiency (142.01). McElroy, the MVP of the SEC Championship Game, boasted an impressive touchdown to interception ratio of 17-4 in the 2009 season.

McElwain's 2008 offense proved to be one of the nation's most efficient and productive units. Alabama finished 5th in the SEC in scoring offense (30.1 ppg) and 35th nationally after ranking 64th (7th in the SEC) in that category in 2007 with an average of 27.1 ppg. In addition, quarterback John Parker Wilson saw his pass efficiency rating improve from 8th to 5th in the SEC and he was named a Johnny Unitas Award finalist under McElwain's guidance.

McElwain spent the 2006 season in the NFL as quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders and served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Fresno State in 2007. He made an immediate impact in his first season at Fresno State as he helped lead the Bulldogs to a 9-4 record, a significant turnaround from the previous year in which Fresno State posted a 4-8 mark.

The Fresno State offense under McElwain averaged 419.5 yards per game (38th nationally) and 32.9 points per game (32nd) last season. That was a significant increase from the 2006 campaign when the Bulldogs averaged 338.2 yards per game in total offense and 23.0 points per game in terms of scoring offense. After Fresno State rolled up 571 yards of total offense and defeated Georgia Tech 40-28 in the Humanitarian Bowl, McElwain moved up to No. 18 in the Rivals.com national power rankings (offensive coaches). His quarterback, Tom Brandstater, finished 2007 with a passing efficiency rating of 140.5, which ranked 23rd in the country. Brandstater showed remarkable improvement under McElwain's watch as he had posted a pass efficiency rating of 106.7 (89th) the previous year.

McElwain served as the assistant head coach, receivers coach and special teams coach at Michigan State from 2003-05. The 2003 team reached the Alamo Bowl behind a receiving corps that set school records for receptions (312) and yards (3,510). He coached 2004 All-America punter Brandon Fields and kicker Dave Rayner, who led the Big Ten Conference in scoring. In 2005, five Spartan receivers had at least 28 receptions and the group combined to a set another school record with 24 touchdown catches.

Prior to his stint at Michigan State, McElwain spent three seasons (2000-02) at Louisville as the receivers coach and special teams coach as the Cardinals earned bowl bids in each of those three seasons. He coached four first team All-Conference USA selections at Louisville and also tutored three of the Cardinals' all-time leading receivers, including Deion Branch and Arnold Jackson.

From 1995-99, McElwain was the offensive coordinator, quarterbacks and receivers coach at Montana State. Under his direction, quarterback Rob Compson threw for nearly 7,000 career yards and a school-record 54 touchdowns. McElwain also coached the Bobcats' all-time leading receiver Chip Hobbs, who caught 144 career passes for 2,060 yards and 18 TDs. Montana State led the Big Sky Conference in scoring in 1998, averaging 31.6 points per game.

McElwain was at Eastern Washington from 1985-94 in a variety of capacities, starting as a graduate assistant and working his way up to quarterbacks and receivers coach. The Eagles made two NCAA Division I-AA playoff appearances (1992 and 1995) and earned a share of the Big Sky Championship in 1992. McElwain coached EWU's all-time leading receiver, Tony Brooks (2,969 career yards), who earned third team AP All-America honors in 1993.

An all-state quarterback at Missoula (Montana) Sentinel High School, McElwain played quarterback at Eastern Washington from 1980-83 and earned his degree in Education from EWU in 1984. He and his wife, Karen, have three children, JoHanna, Elizabeth and Jerret.

JOE PENDRY

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH / OFFENSIVE LINE COACH



A veteran coach with impressive credentials from the pro and college ranks, Joe Pendry is in his third year at Alabama serving as assistant head coach and offensive line coach.

Losing three starters, including All-Americans Andre Smith and Antoine Caldwell, seemed to be the biggest question mark for Alabama entering the 2009 season. Pendry took that challenge and put together a starting five that not only helped clear the way for a Heisman winning tailback in Mark Ingram, but also provided outstanding protection for first-year quarterback Greg McElroy. The group ranked among the nation's top 20 in fewest sacks allowed, averaging just over one per game. Left guard Mike Johnson earned All-America honors, giving Pendry three All-Americans in the last two years. Redshirt freshman Barrett Jones started all 13 games at right guard and was named a freshman All-American. Left tackle James Carpenter, in his first year, earned second team All-SEC honors (AP).

Pendry's experience was the key in the development of what many analysts regarded as the nation's best offensive line in 2008. The group of Andre Smith, Mike Johnson, Antoine Caldwell, Marlon Davis and Drew Davis only missed a total of four starts between the five of them and cleared the way for one of the nation's top rushing attacks. Smith won the Outland Trophy and was a as consensus All-American while Caldwell was also listed on several All-America teams. Johnson was a second-team All-SEC selection.

In 2007, Pendry saw Smith earn first team All-SEC honors and win the Jacobs Blocking Trophy as the league's top offensive lineman. In addition, Caldwell was a second team All-SEC selection playing all three positions on the offensive line.

With 19 years of NFL coaching experience, Pendry joined head coach Nick Saban's staff in January of 2007. Pendry has worked with six different NFL clubs and has been to the playoffs 11 times in his career. His most recent stop was with the Houston Texans, where he served as offensive line coach and offensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005. Prior to that, Pendry worked for three years under Dom Capers at the Carolina Panthers from 1995-97. Carolina posted a 27-23 overall record with one NFC championship game appearance over those three seasons. He has served as an offensive coordinator with four NFL teams (Houston, Carolina, Buffalo and Kansas City).

A native of Matheny, W.Va., Pendry was a three-sport star at Oceana High School, excelling in football, basketball and track. He was an all-state selection in football and basketball and was the West Virginia High School Lineman of the Year in 1964. Pendry played two seasons at West Virginia University (1965-66) before a career-ending injury allowed him to become a student coach (1967-68) before becoming a graduate assistant coach in 1969. He remained on the WVU staff as freshman coach (1970), wide receivers coach (1971-72), offensive line coach (1973-74) and offensive coordinator (1976-77).

Pendry also had collegiate coaching stints at Kansas State (1975), Pittsburgh (1978-79), and Michigan State (1980-81) before moving to the professional ranks. He was an assistant coach with the USFL's Philadelphia Stars (1982-83) before becoming head coach of the Pittsburgh Maulers in 1984. In 1985, he began his NFL coaching career, where he spent 19 seasons.

KIRBY SMART

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR / SECONDARY COACH

Kirby Smart is in his third season with the Alabama football staff as secondary coach and second as defensive coordinator. A former standout defensive back and scholar-athlete at Georgia, Smart brings an impressive blend of college and pro coaching experience to the Crimson Tide.

Smart recently took home the 2009 Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach. The Alabama defense was again regarded as one of the top units in the country, leading the nation in scoring defense (11.0 ppg) and pass efficiency defense (88.8), while ranking second nationally in rush defense (77.9 ypg) and total defense (241.7 ypg). Three players on Smart's defense earned first team All-America honors – Rolando McClain, Javier Arenas, Terrence Cody – and Mark Barron was a third team AP All-American. McClain took home the Butkus Award and Cody was a finalist for several national awards as well.

The Alabama defense was rated among the nation's best in 2008. The Tide finished 3rd in total defense (263.5 ypg) and 7th in scoring defense (14.3 ppg) in the final NCAA stats. Senior captain Rashad Johnson earned All-America honors as well as first-team All-SEC recognition after intercepting five passes, including two for touchdowns. Alabama recorded 15 interceptions in '08 and brought back four of those for scores.

Under Smart's guidance in 2007, Johnson led the SEC with six interceptions and earned first team All-SEC honors along with cornerback Simeon Castille. A third member of the Alabama secondary, Kareem Jackson, was honored at the end of the season as a second team Sporting News Freshman All-American.

Smart joined the Tide after spending the 2006 season as safeties coach with head coach Nick Saban and the NFL's Miami Dolphins. Prior to his stint with the Dolphins, Smart spent six years on the collegiate level with Georgia (1999 and 2005), LSU (2004), Florida State (2002-03), and Valdosta State (2000-01).

As the running backs coach at Georgia in 2005, the Bulldogs averaged 162.2 yards per game, the third best mark in the SEC. Smart spent the 2004 season as defensive backs coach under Saban at LSU, where he tutored two NFL draft picks: Corey Webster (2nd round, New York Giants) and Travis Daniels (4th round, Miami Dolphins). That season, the Tigers allowed 157.2 passing yards per game, which ranked second in the SEC and fifth nationally.

Smart was a graduate assistant coach under Bobby Bowden at Florida State in 2002-03 and served as defensive coordinator (2001) and defensive backs (2000) coach at Valdosta State. He began his coaching career as an administrative assistant at Georgia in 1999.

As a player, Smart was a four-year lettermen at defensive back for the Bulldogs, where he was a first team All-SEC pick as a senior. He finished his career with 13 interceptions, fourth in Georgia annals, and led the Bulldogs with six interceptions in 1997 and five in 1998. A four-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll, Smart earned his undergraduate degree in finance from Georgia and his master's degree from Florida State in 2003.

A native of Bainbridge, Ga., Smart is married to the former Mary Beth Lycett of McDonough, Ga. The couple became the proud parents of twins (Weston and Julia) on February 8, 2008.

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH / LINEBACKERS COACH



Sal Sunseri, a former All-American linebacker at Pittsburgh, joined the Alabama coaching staff in January of 2009 after serving as the defensive line coach with the NFL's Carolina Panthers. As a member of the Crimson Tide staff, he will hold the title of assistant head coach for defense and work with the linebackers.

In year one at Alabama, Sunseri helped guide a Crimson Tide defense that gave up fewer points than any other team in the nation. Sunseri's NFL experience with the pass rush has helped Alabama greatly increase the production in that area. UA totaled 26 sacks in 14 games in 2008, and has 31 sacks in 13 games this year, despite losing its best pass rusher in linebacker Dont'a Hightower early in the season.

Sunseri's defensive line with the Panthers was regarded as one of the best in the NFL. Defensive end Julius Peppers, defensive end Mike Rucker and defensive tackle Kris Jenkins earned Pro Bowl honors during Sunseri's tenure. He produced at least one Pro Bowl defensive lineman in five of six seasons as defensive line coach. The Panthers were among the top 10 in the NFL in terms of fewest yards allowed in four of his seven seasons and made three playoff appearances.

Sunseri came to Carolina as a defensive assistant in 2002 and took over as defensive line coach in 2003. It was a seamless transition as the Panthers defensive line remained one of the best in the NFL in 2003 under Sunseri. Carolina ranked eighth in overall defense, 11th against the run and seventh in sacks per pass play. The defensive line accounted for 32.5 of the team's 40 total sacks and also produced a pair of Pro Bowl players in Jenkins and Rucker.

The Panthers' defensive line has provided more than its share of superlatives. In 2006, the Panthers ranked seventh in yards allowed and seventh in sacks per play as two members of the starting unit, Peppers and Jenkins, were selected to the NFC Pro Bowl squad. In 2005, Carolina finished third in yards allowed, fourth against the rush and fifth in sacks per pass play. In 2008, Carolina ranked ninth in the NFL and fifth in the NFC in sacks (37.0) while also ranking 12th in the NFL and sixth in the NFC in scoring defense (20.6 ppg). Peppers earned his fourth trip to the Pro Bowl and established a new career-high with 14.5 sacks.

Prior to his time at Carolina, Sunseri worked as the linebackers coach and special teams coordinator at Michigan State in 2001 after spending 2000 at Louisiana State under head coach Nick Saban in the same capacity. He coached at Alabama A&M in 1998 and 1999 as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach following three seasons from 1995-97 at the University of Louisville as linebackers coach.

Working his way up the coaching ladder, Sunseri spent one year each at Illinois State as defensive coordinator in 1994 and lowa Wesleyan as assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and special teams coach in 1993. He broke into coaching at his alma mater, Pittsburgh, in 1985 and coached defensive line and linebackers before being named assistant head coach in 1992.

Sunseri began his career at the University of Pittsburgh in 1978 as a walk-on and ended it as a team captain and consensus All-American as a senior in 1981. A three-year starter at linebacker, he helped the Panthers to a combined record of 33-3 and anchored a defensive unit that led the NCAA in total defense in 1980 and 1981. He was the defensive MVP in the 1982 Senior Bowl and was drafted in the 10th round by the Pittsburgh Steelers but had his pro career cut short by a knee injury in training camp. He received a bachelor's degree in communications from Pittsburgh in 1982.

Sunseri is married to the former Roxann Evans, who was a varsity gymnast at Pittsburgh. The couple has two daughters, Jaclyn and Ashlyn, and two sons. Santino (who is a redshirt freshman quarterback at Pittsburgh) and Vinnie.

TIGHT ENDS COACH AND SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

Bobby Williams is in his second season in Tuscaloosa after being hired as Alabama's tight ends coach and special teams coordinator in January of 2008. A veteran coach with both college and NFL experience, Williams joins Nick Saban's coaching staff for the fourth time in his career as they have worked together previously at Michigan State, LSU and the Miami Dolphins.

Williams had to replace a pair of senior tight ends from last year's roster, but the Alabama offense did not miss a beat as transfer Colin Peek emerged as one of the team's top targets. Peek earned AP second team All-SEC honors with 26 catches for 313 yards and three touchdowns. Williams also oversaw Groza finalist Leigh Tiffin at placekicker, who earned first team AP All-America status, as well as Javier Arenas, who set the SEC all-time punt return records for yards and touchdowns.

In year one at the Capstone, Williams led a pair of senior tight ends to the best seasons of their careers. Nick Walker made 11 starts and was 2nd on the team in receiving with 32 catches, 324 yards and two touchdowns. Travis McCall started 12 games and was one of the team's top blockers, clearing the way for an outstanding ground game. McCall, who caught seven passes for 52 yards, represented Alabama in the Senior Bowl.

The special teams in 2008 were a big weapon for the Tide under Williams. Javier Arenas broke two punt returns for touchdowns and set the school record for career punt return yardage and punt return touchdowns. Placekicker Leigh Tiffin, a Lou Groza Award semifinalist, was 20-of-29 on field goals and punter P.J. Fitzgerald had a career-best average of 41.1 yards per punt with 15 inside the 20.

Williams spent the 2005 and 2006 seasons as the running backs coach with the Dolphins. In his first season, Miami averaged 118.6 yards rushing per contest, the second-best figure by the team over the previous 21 years (1985-05). Ronnie Brown led the team with 907 yards rushing, second-most among NFL rookies in 2005 and the second-highest total ever by a Dolphins rookie. Brown followed that up with 1,008 yards in 2006, which marked the first time a player in the franchise had rushed for 900 or more yards in each of his first two seasons.

He served as the associate head coach/wide receivers coach at LSU in 2004 where he coached a pair of future NFL first round picks in Craig Davis and Dwayne Bowe. Both Davis and Bowe ranked in the top ten in the SEC in both receptions per game and receiving yards per game that season.

Prior to his one-year stint in Baton Rouge, Williams spent one season (2003) as the wide receivers coach with the Detroit Lions. With the Lions, rookie Charles Rogers, who played for Williams at Michigan State, caught 22 passes for 243 yards and three touchdowns through just five games before an injury cut short his rookie campaign. At the time, Rogers' receiving total tied for 11th in the NFC and was third among NFL rookies.

Williams followed Saban as head coach at Michigan State, and served in that post from 2000-02. He led the Spartans to a victory over Florida in the 2000 Citrus Bowl after the 1999 season, in his first game as the school's head coach. He also guided Michigan State to a 7-5 mark in 2001, his second full season as the team's head coach, one which culminated with a victory over Fresno State in the Silicon Valley Football Classic, as he became the first coach in Michigan State history to lead his team to victories in his first two bowl appearances.

He previously was an assistant on the Spartans staff from 1990-99, during which time he tutored the running backs, the final five years under Saban. Michigan State backs produced nine individual 1,000- yard rushing performances in Williams' ten years in that post, a list which includes T.J. Duckett, Atlanta's first-round draft choice in 2002.

Williams got his start in the coaching profession as running backs/defensive backs coach at Ball State from 1983-84. He followed that with a five-year stop (1985-89) as offensive backfield coach at Eastern Michigan before heading off to East Lansing.

Williams is a 1982 graduate of Purdue where he earned his degree in general management and was a four-year letterman for the Boilermakers. He started his career at running back before moving to the secondary and starting in his final three seasons. A tri-captain as a senior in 1981, Williams was a part of three Purdue bowl teams as a player. He then served one year (1982) as a graduate assistant with the Boilermakers.

A native of St. Louis, Mo., Williams and his wife. Sheila, have a daughter, Nataly, and a son, Nicholas

JAMES WILLS

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH / LINEBACKERS COACH



James Willis was hired at the University of Alabama in January of 2009 and will serve as associate head coach and work with the line-backers. Willis, a seven-year NFL veteran, joins the Crimson Tide after serving as an assistant coach at Auburn.

The Crimson Tide defense ranked either first or second nationally in the four major defensive categories in Willis' first year, including the No. 1 scoring defense (11.0 ppg). The linebackers did some shuffling throughout the season with Dont'a Hightower out but did not miss a beat. Junior Rolando McClain earned Alabama's second Butkus Award as the country's best linebacker and newcomer Nico Johnson went on to earn Freshman All-America honors in his first year.


Willis spent the previous three years as the linebackers coach at Auburn. The Tigers ranked No. 7 nationally in scoring defense in 2006 and followed that up with a No. 6 ranking in 2007 and a No. 14 ranking in scoring defense last season. Auburn appeared in two bowls during his tenure – the 2007 AT&T Cotton Bowl and the 2007 Chick-fil-A Bowl. The Tigers defeated Nebraska 17-14 in the Cotton Bowl and defeated Clemson 23-20 in overtime in the Chick-fil-A Bowl. Willis also coached a pair of Freshman All-Americans at linebacker at Auburn in Tray Blackmon (2006) and Spencer Pybus (2008).

Prior to his stint at Auburn, Willis coached the linebackers at Temple (2005) and Rhode Island (2004-05). He coached Rhode Island linebacker Teddy Gibbons to team MVP and All-Atlantic 10 Conference honors in 2004. In 2003, Willis was a defensive graduate assistant at Auburn after working as a student assistant the previous two years at AU.

Willis spent seven seasons in the NFL and one season in the XFL. He began his professional career with the Green Bay Packers (2003-04) before making the move to Philadelphia (1995-98) where he was a three-year starter for the Eagles. His final NFL season was in 1999 with the Seattle Seahawks and his playing career concluded in 2001 with the Birmingham Thunderbolts of the XFL.

As a collegiate player, Willis was a three-year starter at Auburn (1990-92). He recorded 344 career tackles and was a member of the 1990 Peach Bowl team. Willis was a first team All-SEC selection in 1992 and was the SEC Co-Defensive Freshman of the Year in 1990. A fifth round draft pick by Green Bay following his junior season, Willis returned to earn his degree in Adult Education from Auburn.

Willis was born in Huntsville, Ala. and played high school football at J.O. Johnson High School where he was a Parade All-American as a linebacker. He and his wife, Shalane are the proud parents of daughter Jade and sons Jalen and Jordan James.

HEAD FOOTBALL STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH


The booming voice you hear leading a pre-practice stretch or encouraging a Crimson Tide player to finish a workout session strong is that of Head Football Strength and Conditioning Coach Scott Cochran. The high-energy coach joined the Alabama staff in 2007 after spending three seasons with the New Orleans Hornets as an assistant strength coach. He received one of the highest honors in his field when he was named the 2008 Samson Strength & Conditioning Coach of the Year as featured in American Football Quarterly following Alabama's 12-2 season a year ago.


Cochran's duties with the Hornets included assisting with the exercise and strength conditioning programs to help players achieve and maintain optimal fitness throughout the NBA season. With the Hornets, he coached NBA standouts Chris Paul, Baron

Davis and David West.

Prior to joining the Hornets staff, Cochran worked for his alma mater, Louisiana State, as an assistant strength coach in 2003 (13-1, BCS National Champions) and 2004 (9-3, Capital One Bowl). He was a graduate assistant in Baton Rouge from 2001-03. Cochran returned to LSU after starting his career in the strength and conditioning field at University Laboratory High School in Baton Rouge, La. He held that position from 1998-2001 and then went back to LSU as a graduate assistant for all sports from 2001-03. Cochran was then hired on to the full-time staff for the 2003-04 season.

A native of New Orleans, Cochran received a bachelor's degree in kinesiology from LSU in 2001 and added a master's degree in sports management from LSU in 2003. Cochran was born on March 21, 1979, and is married to the former Cissy Schepens. They have a son, Beau, and a daughter, Savannah.





Mike Vollmar was hired as associate athletics director for football on May 22, 2008. Vollmar's primary role at Alabama is to oversee the administration and operation of the football program. Before joining the Crimson Tide, he spent 12 years as an assistant athletics director and director of football operations at Michigan State. Vollmar had the opportunity to serve on the 2010 Citi BCS National Championship Game Advisory Committee earlier this year.

Vollmar's duties at Michigan State included internal and external operations of the football program. He also managed the football operating budget, team travel, camps and the construction of a new \$12 million football facility. He served as the liaison between Michigan State and NFL scouts as well as high school coaches. Vollmar serves on the AFCA National Committee for Directors of Football Operations and the Duffy Daugherty Memorial Award Committee.


In 1996, then-Michigan State head coach Nick Saban called on Vollmar to serve as the assistant athletic director of football operations. During Vollmar's tenure at MSU, he saw the Spartans appear in six bowl games ('96 Sun, '97 Aloha, '00 Citrus, '01 Silicon Valley, '03 Alamo and '07 Champs Sports). During Vollmar's stay with the Spartans, they compiled a 10-2 record in 1999 which included a win over Florida in the Citrus Bowl.

Prior to joining MSU, Vollmar spent five years at Syracuse where the Orangemen posted a record of 41-15-1. He served as recruiting coordinator from 1991-93 and director of football and recruiting operations from 1994-96 under Paul Pasqualoni. Four players recruited during that time were named to Syracuse's All-Century team, including Donovan McNabb, Donovan Darius, Kevin Johnson and Kevin Abrams. Syracuse won three bowl games in his five years ('92 Hall of Fame, '93 Fiesta and '96 Gator Bowls).

Vollmar also spent three seasons as assistant recruiting coordinator and in athletic administration under the late Bo Schembechler and Gary Moeller at the University of Michigan (1988-90). The Wolverines went 28-7-1 during his stay in Ann Arbor, winning three Big Ten Championships, with two Rose Bowl appearances and a Gator Bowl appearance. Mike's father, James, was a running back at Michigan from 1956-58.

Vollmar participated in track and field as a pole vaulter at Siena Heights University in Adrian, Mich. He received a bachelor's degree in history with a minor in speech communication from Siena Heights in 1988.

A native of Riverview, Mich., Vollmar earned a total of eight letters in track and basketball at Riverview Community High School. As a senior, he earned all-state honors as a pole vaulter. Vollmar attended the same high school that produced former Michigan head coach Lloyd Carr, former Vanderbilt head coach Woody Widenhofer and former Colorado head coach Bill McCartney. Vollmar earned a master's degree in sports management from the United States Sports Academy in Daphne, Ala., in 1989 where he was recently added to the school's alumni board. He and his wife, Tami, have a daughter, Bailey Lauren.

Ed Marynowitz joined the Alabama staff in December of 2008 as the Director of Player Personnel. He comes to Tuscaloosa after a season as a scouting assistant for the Miami Dolphins.

Marynowitz directs Alabama football's recruiting efforts. In addition to those duties, he assists with camps, clinics and other football-related events. Marynowitz also serves as the liaison between Alabama and the NFL scouts and assists with the day to day administration and operation of the football program.

With the Dolphins, Marynowitz worked under general manager Jeff Ireland and executive vice president of football operations Bill Parcells. He worked in both the pro and college scouting departments where he assisted with the advance scouting of opponents, evaluation of both draft eligible college prospects and NFL free-agents, the execution of free-agent workouts, the monitoring of daily league transactions, and the maintenance of Miami's scouting databases.

Prior to his time with the Dolphins, Marynowitz spent two years on staff at the University of Central Florida under George O'Leary. He served as a graduate assistant during the 2006 season, working primarily with football operations before joining the staff on a full-time basis for the 2007 season as the Knights' recruiting administrator. In that role for UCF, Marynowitz directed the on-campus recruiting efforts in addition to assisting with day-to-day operations of the program.

He began his collegiate playing career as a two-year starter at La Salle University in Philadelphia where he threw for 4,896 yards and 24 touchdowns as a freshman and sophomore. Marynowitz earned honorable mention All-American honors in 2003 as a sophomore and holds a number of the school's passing records. He finished his playing career at UCF as a reserve quarterback on the 2005 Hawaii Bowl team.

Marynowitz completed his B.A. degree in business management in the spring of 2006 at the University of Central Florida. He finished his master's in business administration in December of 2007 and then a second master's degree in sports business management from UCF's DeVos Sport Business Management Program in May of 2008.

One of the most well-respected athletic trainers in the country, Allen has had several articles published and is a regular speaker at national and state athletic training conferences. Allen has served as a featured speaker at conferences held by the National Athletic Trainers Association and the Southeast Athletic Trainers Association, as well as state meetings in Georgia, Kentucky and Tennessee.

A 1993 graduate of Georgia Southern University with a bachelor's degree in Health and Physical Education, Allen and his wife, Mary, have one daughter, Makennah.

The all-important role of Athletic Equipment Director falls under the capable direction of Tank Conerly. Recognized as one of the nation' best in his field, Conerly began his duties at Alabama in 1987, joining the Tide staff from Duke University where he served as head athletic equipment manager from 1983-87.

In his 23rd year at Alabama, Conerly has seen the Crimson Tide compete in 16 bowl games and has been a part of four SEC Championship teams and the National Championship team in 1992.

A native of Jackson, Miss., Conerly was a four-year student equipment manager at the University of Mississippi. After graduation, Conerly became the assistant equipment manager at Ole Miss, before moving on to Duke University. DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT


Jeremy Pruitt joined Coach Nick Saban's staff as Director of Player Development in 2007, after a successful stint as an assistant coach at Hoover (Ala.) High School. He brings 12 years of coaching experience to the Alabama program, including three seasons as defensive backs coach at Hoover and as the defensive coordinator for the final two seasons. He tutored a defense that helped the Bucs reach the Class 6A State Championship in 2004, 2005 and 2006, winning titles in 2004 and 2005. Six of his players went on to sign Division I scholarships. Prior to his stint at Hoover, Pruitt served as an assistant coach under his father, Dale Pruitt, at Fort Payne High School from 2001-03.

He began his coaching career as a student assistant coach at Alabama during the 1997 season, where he worked under defensive backs coach Curley Hallman. After one-year on the UA staff, Pruitt joined his father's staff at Plainview High School, where he served as defensive backs coach and defensive coordinator in 1998 and 2000. He spent one season as defensive backs coach at the University of West Alabama, where he earned his bachelor's degree in 1999.

Pruitt played at both Middle Tennessee and Alabama during his collegiate career. He began his career at Middle Tennessee under legendary coach Boots Donnelly, where he was a two-year starter at safety and cornerback for the Blue Raiders.

After his sophomore season, Pruitt transferred to Alabama where he played two seasons under coach Gene Stallings. As a junior, Pruitt played in nine games and recorded seven tackles. As a senior, Pruitt played in seven games as a backup defensive back and was a member of Alabama's 1996 SEC Western Division Championship team that beat Michigan 17-13 in the Outback Bowl in Tampa.

A two-time all-state defensive back, Pruitt helped Plainview High School to a 48-8 record during his four-year career. He earned All-State honors in both 1991 and 1992.


DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Willie Carl Martin joined the Alabama football staff as Director of Player Development (Academics/Strength & Conditioning) in March of 2007 after serving as head football coach at Benjamin Russell High School in Alexander City since 2001.


Martin's role at Alabama is to help in the personal development of each student-athlete and see to it that they reach their full potential from an academic and physical standpoint.

Martin compiled a 52-24 record in six seasons as head coach at Benjamin Russell. Previously an assistant coach for the school, where he coached Dallas Cowboys receiver Terrell Owens, Martin served 24 years in the Alexander City School System as a coach, teacher and administrator. A native of Alexander City, Martin joined the school system there in 1983 as a teacher and coach for Alexander Middle School. In 1985, he moved on to Benjamin Russell High School in a similar capacity and was elevated to head football coach in 2001. He led the Wildcats to the state championship in 2001 and was an assistant during the 1997 and 2000 seasons when they finished as runners-up. For the last four years, Martin has served on the Central Board of Control for the Alabama High School Athletic Association (AHSAA).

A 1975 graduate of Northeastern State University in Tahlequah, Okla., Martin was inducted into the NSU Athletic Hall of Fame in February 2007. He was a four-year letterman (1969-72) in football for NSU as an offensive lineman and earned All-America and All-Oklahoma Collegiate Conference First Team honors as a senior in 1972. After graduation, the Houston Oilers of the National Football League (NFL) drafted Martin. However, he chose to compete in the Canadian Football League (CFL) where his 10-year career featured stops in Edmonton and Winnipeg. Martin was named All-Pro in eight of his 10 seasons in the CFL, participated in six Grey Cup games and won two championships. Martin and his wife, Leslie Ruth, have two daughters, Carla and Kizzy, and one grandson, Malik.




































THE GAME: The top-ranked University of Alabama football team makes its first BCS National Championship Game appearance after knocking off defending national champion Florida in the Southeastern Conference Championship Game. The BCS National Championship Game will be played on Thursday, January 7, 2010, at the historic Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. The Crimson Tide will face the second-ranked Texas Longhorns for the ninth time in school history and the first time since the 1982 Cotton Bowl. The game is scheduled for a 7 p.m. (CST) kickoff and will be televised by ABC with Brent Musburger, Kirk Herbstreit and Lisa Salters calling the action. Eli Gold, Phil Savage and Barry Krauss will have the radio call on the Crimson Tide Sports Network.

HEAD COACH NICK SABAN: Alabama head coach Nick Saban (Kent State, 1973) is in his third season with the Crimson Tide. He was named the school's 27th head coach on January 3, 2007. Saban has compiled a 123-50-1 (.710) record as a collegiate head coach with a 32-8 (.800) mark at Alabama that includes a 13-0 record this year with a perfect 8-0 mark in the SEC and a SEC Championship Game victory over then-No. 1 Florida, 32-13. Saban has now won 10 games in back-to-back seasons for the first time in his career. He captured his 100th career win and coached his 150th game as a collegiate head coach during the 2008 campaign. In 2003, Saban led LSU to a 13-1 record and the BCS National Championship. Overall, Saban has coached four conference championship teams (1990 Mid-American, 2001 SEC and 2003 SEC at LSU and the 2009 SEC title at Alabama) while coaching 12 of his 14 teams to post-season bowl appearances (did not coach Michigan State in the bowl game following the 1999 season). Saban is one of two (Bob Stoops) current Football Bowl Subdivision coaches to coach for at least 10 years and not suffer a losing season.

RANKINGS: The Crimson Tide is ranked No. 1 in every poll following their 32-13 win over previously No. 1 Florida in the SEC Championship Game. Alabama tops the *Associated Press* poll (1,498 points), the BCS standings (.9978), the Harris Poll (2,841 points) and the *USA Today* Coaches' poll (1,470 points). UA garnered 58 first-place votes in the *AP* poll and 54 in the coaches' poll. Alabama was ranked fifth in both the *AP* and *USA Today* Coaches' preseason polls, the highest preseason ranking for the Tide since the 2000 season when Alabama opened at No. 3.

ALABAMA-TEXAS SERIES: Alabama and Texas will be meeting for the ninth time with the Longhorns holding a 7-0-1 edge in the series. Alabama and Texas are meeting for the sixth time in a bowl game with the Horns holding a 4-0-1 lead in those meetings. Alabama earned a tie with Texas in the 1960 Bluebonnet Bowl while the Horns won the 1948 Sugar Bowl (1947 season), the 1965 Orange Bowl (1964 season), the 1973 Cotton Bowl (1972 season) and the 1982 Cotton Bowl (1981 season). The 1982 Cotton Bowl was the most recent meeting between these to storied football programs. Texas rallied with 14 points in the fourth quarter to secure a 14-12 win.

Fitzgerald (management), Terry Grant (human environmental science), Baron Huber (telecommunications), Mike Johnson (consumer affairs), Tyrone King (health studies), Greg McElroy (business marketing), Colin Peek (Finance), Cory Reamer (finance), Chris Rogers (consumer affairs), Brian Selman (business marketing), Ali Sharrief (human environmental science), Travis Sikes (consumer affairs), Heath Thomas (human environmental science), Leigh Tiffin (management), Roy Upchurch (general studies) and Lorenzo Washington (human environmental science).

TIDE LEADS NATION IN GRADUATES: Alabama's 21 graduates on the 2009 roster are the most of any school in the Bowl Championship Subdivision. The Crimson Tide had nine more players graduate this December after leading the nation with 13 graduates during the 2009 season.

ALABAMA RANKS 2ND NATIONALLY IN GRADUATION RATE AMONG TOP 25: Alabama is tied for second nationally with a 75 percent federal graduation rate, which was released recently by the NCAA, among teams ranked in this week's *Associated Press* top 25. The Crimson Tide and Miami Hurricanes both trailed Penn State, who graduated 89 percent.

BEATING THE BEST: Alabama is 8-2 against the *Associated Press* Top 25 over the 2008 and 2009 seasons. The Crimson Tide's 32-13 win over No. 1 Florida on December 5 in the SEC Championship Game was the Tide's fifth win over a top-10 team dating back to the start of the 2008 season. Alabama is also 5-0 against the *AP* Top 25 and 3-0 vs. the *AP* Top 10 this season.

ALABAMA IN THE BCS RANKINGS: Alabama is ranked first in the final 2009 Bowl Championship Series standings released on Sunday, December 6. The Crimson Tide (.9978) edged their BCS National Championship Game opponent Texas (.9433) by a margin of .0545 with Cincinnati (.8878) third. The Tide is ranked first in the Harris Interactive poll, the computers and the *USA Today* Coaches' poll. Texas is third in the computer rankings while Cincinnati in second by computers. TCU is fourth in the overall BCS rankings (.8836) and Florida is fifth (.8637).

SABAN AMONG THE BEST: Head coach Nick Saban's arrival in Tuscaloosa led to the Crimson Tide's rapid rise up the national rankings. That success in such a short period of time has impacted the Tide's record book. Saban produced the largest win increase from year one to year two in school history as Alabama went from seven wins in 2007 to 12 wins in 2008. He is one of two coaches (Bob Stoops, Oklahoma) in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) football to have coached 10 years and never suffered through a losing season. Saban achieved another first in 2009 with back-to-back 10-win seasons. He also ranks fifth in winning percentage (71.0 percent) among active coaches who have coached at least 10 years of FBS football.

CRIMSON TIDE DEFENSIVE NOTES

BAMA DEFENSE GETTING STRONGER: Alabama's defense has strengthened down the stretch of the 2009 season, ranking in the top seven in every major defensive category. The Crimson Tide leads the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 11.0 points per game. UA also leads the nation in pass efficiency defense (88.81) while ranking second nationally in total defense (241.69 yards per game) and rushing defense (77.92 ypg). The Tide is seventh nationally in pass defense, allowing 163.77 ypg. The UA defense has surrendered only nine touchdowns in nine games against Southeastern Conferences teams this season and has held five SEC teams to single-digit scoring. Alabama has won seven of its nine games vs. SEC teams by two or more scores.

DOMINANT 'D': Alabama returned eight starters from a 2008 defense that finished third nationally in total defense, allowing 263.5 yards per game. The 2009 unit has even better numbers, allowing a total of 241.69 yards per game in 13 games to rank second nationally. The Tide opened the season by holding Virginia Tech to 155 total yards (64 rushing, 91 passing). UA held FIU to 214 total yards, including only one yard rushing, while North Texas could manage only 187 yards of offense and 61 yards rushing. Arkansas managed 63 on the ground, while the Tide limited Mississippi to 197 yards and 57 rushing, including 19 yards of total offense in the first half. UA then held No. 22 South Carolina to 64 yards rushing and six points. LSU totaled 253 yards, but had only 95 on the ground. Mississippi State could only muster 99 yards through the air and 213 total yards. Alabama held Chattanooga to 84 total yards, including 48 rushing and 36 passing. Then-No. 1 Florida could only manage 88 rushing yards and was forced to the air as the Tide broke out to an early lead.

McCLAIN HEART AND SOUL OF TIDE DEFENSE: Junior middle linebacker Rolando McClain has proven to be the heart and soul of the Tide's defense and may be the most complete linebacker in the country. The Butkus Award winner not only leads the team in tackles with 101, but is an on-the-field coach for Alabama. McClain is responsible for making all of the defensive calls and is especially proficient at checking the Crimson Tide into the correct alignment. Almost impossible to block, McClain is either making the tackle or forcing the play into the waiting arms of another Tide defender. The remainder of his stat line: 12.5 tackles for loss (-58 yards), 4.0 sacks (-36 yards), two interceptions (21 return yards), three pass breakups, 14 quarterback hurries and a forced fumble. McClain's play has garnered him extensive national recognition. He was the FWAA/Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week after his performance against Kentucky and has twice been named the Lott Trophy IMPACT Player of the Week (South Carolina and Auburn). McClain is a first-team All-American by the American Football Coaches Association and was a finalist for the Lott Trophy.

AIR DEFENSE: Alabama's defense has smothered almost every aspect of opposing offenses in 2009. While much attention is earned by the Tide's suffocating rush defense, Alabama has also effectively thwarted passing attacks. The Tide boasts the nation's top-ranked pass efficiency defense, with an 88.81 opponent passer rating. The Tide is also seventh in pass defense, allowing 163.77 yards per game while ranking fifth with 20 interceptions. Over the last five games, UA has limited LSU, Mississippi State, Chattanooga and Auburn to a total of 721 passing yards (144.2 ypg). A game-by-game look at opponents' passing numbers in 2009:

UA IN THE COACHES' POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches rankings over the last half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. The USA Today took over the poll in 1991 and has run the poll for the last 19 seasons. Alabama was ranked No. 5 in the 2009 preseason coaches' poll after not being ranked in last year's preseason poll. Alabama entered the rankings after beating Clemson and was ranked in the coaches poll for the remainder of the season, reaching No. 1 in the polls for five weeks in November. The Tide has five UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 and 1979) and USA Today (1992) coaches poll national titles.

GROUND DEFENSE: The Crimson Tide has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in an astonishing 33 games, dating back to October 13, 2007, when Mississippi's BenJarvus Green-Ellis went for 131 yards. That is the longest streak in the nation, 11 games more than second-place Ohio State (22 games). Alabama is one of five teams not to allow a 100-yard rusher in 2009 and is the only team not to surrender a 100-yard rusher in 2008 or 2009. As a team, the Crimson Tide has held 22 teams under 100 yards rushing over the past 27 games with only LSU and Florida in 2008 and Kentucky, Mississippi State and Auburn in 2009 able to crack the 100-yard barrier as a team.

STIFLING DEFENSE PUTS UP IMPRESSIVE NUMBERS: Alabama's defense over the past 27 games – or two seasons – has held opponents under 200 yards of total offense in 10 games, including a 155-yard effort by Virginia Tech, a 187-yard showing by North Texas, a 197-yard game by Mississippi and a 84-yard outing vs. Chattanooga in 2009. The sub-200-yard games in that span: Clemson (188); Western Kentucky (158); Tennessee (173); Arkansas State (158); Mississippi State (167); Auburn (170); Virginia Tech (155); North Texas (187); Mississippi (197).

DEFENSE TOUGH ON THIRD DOWN: The Crimson Tide defense has been strong on third down in 2009, ranking fourth nationally and allowing a 29.38 conversion rate (52 for 177). Alabama's performance at Mississippi on October 10 was special. UA did not allow the Rebels a single third-down conversion as UM went 0 for 9. UA held Virginia Tech to just two conversions on 12 third down attempts (16.7 percent). Florida International was just 7 for 17 (41.1%) on third down while North Texas could only convert at a rate of 28.5 percent (4 for 14). The Tide opened SEC play by limiting Arkansas to 2 for 14 on third down (14.3 percent) and then held Kentucky to 4 of 13 (30.8 percent). LSU converted just 5 of 14 (35.7 percent) and Mississippi State managed just a 15.4 percent conversion rate (2 for 13). Chattanooga was 3 for 13 on third down (23.08) and Auburn was 4 of 12 (33.3 percent). The Crimson Tide finished third nationally in third down conversion defense in 2008, holding opponents to a 28.14 percent (56 of 199) conversion rate.

FORCING TURNOVERS: Alabama has produced 22 turnovers in the last nine games, forcing five turnovers at Mississippi, four at Kentucky, two against South Carolina, one vs. Tennessee, one vs. LSU, three at Mississippi State, three vs. Chattanooga, two at Auburn and one vs. Florida. The Tide has picked off 18 passes in those nine games and recovered four fumbles. The Crimson Tide ranks fifth nationally in turnover margin at plus-16 (1.23 per game). Alabama has forced 75 turnovers in 40 games under head coach Nick Saban (an average of 1.88 per game) forcing 26 turnovers in 13 games this season, while the UA offense has only turned the ball over 10 times (4 interceptions, 6 fumbles) in 2009. Alabama forced 24 turnovers in 2007 for a plus-4 turnover ratio and then recorded 25 turnovers and ended the season with a plus-6 turnover margin in 2008. Alabama has recorded at least one turnover in 35 of 40 games under Saban. UA is 29-6 under Saban when gaining at least one turnover. Alabama is 3-2 in games without a turnover over the last three seasons.

PASS RUSH IMPORTANT FOR BAMA DEFENSE: The Alabama defense has 31 sacks on the season, five more sacks than the Tide recorded in 2008. UA ranks 35th nationally while ranking third in the SEC in sacks with 2.38 per game. The Texas offensive line has surrendered an average of 2.31 sacks per game to rank 81st nationally. Defensive end Marcell Dareus leads Alabama with 0.50 sacks per game (6.5 for 44 yards in losses), Javier Arenas and Eryk Anders are second on the team with 5.0 sacks while Rolando McClain is fourth with four sacks. UA ranks 19th nationally in tackles for loss (TFL), averaging 7.00 per game. That mark also ranks third in the SEC and accounts for 422 lost yards by UA opponents. McClain and Anders and are tied for the team lead with 12.5 tackles for loss while Arenase is third with 12.0 TFL and Dareus is fourth with nine TFL.

BARRON NOTCHES 7TH INTERCEPTION: Alabama sophomore safety Mark Barron has intercepted seven during 2009 season, which ranks seventh nationally at .54 per game. That total ranks tied for third on the Alabama single-season interceptions list.

THREE-AND-OUT PROWESS: The Alabama defense has been one of the stingiest units in the country in 2009. Beyond top two rankings in total defense, rushing defense, pass efficiency defense and scoring defense, another example of the Crimson Tide's defensive prowess shows in the amount of three-and-outs forced. Alabama has forced 71 three-and-outs this season,

which ranks third in the country and averages out to 5.46 per game. TCU checks in at No. 1 with 79 forced three-and-outs for 6.58 per contest. Ohio State follows with 71, which averages out to 5.9 per game.

BARRON MAKING PRESENCE KNOWN: Safety Mark Barron might not be the first safety prominent in the minds of the national media, but the Mobile, Ala., native is making a strong bid for first-team All-SEC recognition and may be worthy of much more. Barron is seventh nationally while leading the SEC with seven interceptions. He also has 70 tackles to rank second on the Alabama defense, which ranks near the top nationally in almost every defensive category. Barron leads the SEC in passes defended with 17 (10 PBU, 7 INT) and ranks tied for sixth nationally with 1.31 passes defended per game.

Dareus Makes A NAME FOR HIMSELF: Sophomore defensive lineman Marcell Dareus has been dominant in 2009 with 32 tackles, 9.0 tackles for loss (-49 yards) and 6.5 quarterback sacks (-44 yards) to rank eighth in the Southeastern Conference and tied for 73rd nationally. Dareus had a breakout game in the season opener against Virginia Tech with 1.5 sacks. He followed that up with a four-tackle outing against Florida International in which he posted two sacks for 17 yards in losses. Dareus had two solo stops vs. Arkansas with a tackle for loss (-1). He then recorded a sack, four tackles and a pass breakup in a win over Tennessee before notching two more sacks in a win over LSU.

DEADERICK UNDAUNTED: Senior defensive tackle Brandon Deaderick completed a miraculous return to the playing field with an appearance in the Crimson Tide's win over Virginia Tech, just five days after being shot by an unknown assailant on the night of Monday, August 31, in Tuscaloosa. Deaderick, who suffered non-life threatening injuries to his left forearm and hip in the incident, was cleared for action by team doctors. He saw his first action on special teams with 6:35 left to play in the first quarter on Virginia Tech's point-after conversion following a 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown that tied the game at 6-6. Deaderick saw action on defense with 3:00 left in the first quarter. He finished with one solo tackle vs. the Hokies. He has played in all 12 games this season with seven starts. He has accounted for 22 tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss and a sack.

CRIMSON TIDE OFFENSIVE NOTES

AT HIS BEST, AGAINST THE BEST: Sophomore running back Mark Ingram has been at his best against the best in 2009. He has rolled up 1,864 all-purpose yards and 18 touchdowns while averaging 118.62 yards per game on the ground with 15 rushing touchdowns in 13 games. But those numbers climb even higher when the Crimson Tide's opponent is ranked in the top 25. In UA's five games with top-25 opponents - including three ranked in the top 10 - Ingram has accounted for 825 yards on the ground (165.0 ypg) with six touchdowns. He has also caught 15 passes for 181 yards and a touchdown to account for 1,006 all-purpose yards (201.12 ypg) in those five games.

Ingram broke free for 150 rushing yards and a touchdown while catching three passes for 35 yards and a score in the season-opener against Virginia Tech. He scampered for 172 yards on the ground, including a 36-yard touchdown run on fourth down at Mississippi. Ingram then exploded for a Bryant-Denny Stadium record 246 yards and a game-clinching touchdown vs. South Carolina and then pounded out 144 yards with five receptions for 30 yards vs. No. 9 LSU. In the SEC title game against the nation's No. 8 rushing defense, Ingram went for 113 yards and three touchdowns on the ground while catching two passes for 76 yards.

The Tide's games against ranked opponents are also when he has best displayed his hard-to-tackle running style that has led to 578 total yards after contact (115.6 ypg), including 115 yards vs. Virginia Tech, 95 yards after contact at Mississippi, 167 yards against South Carolina, 107 after contact against No. 9 LSU and 94 vs. No. 1 Florida in the SEC Championships Game.

INGRAM OFF TO THE RACES: Mark Ingram produced a 2009 season that has led him to the Heisman Trophy. He has rushed for 1,542 yards and 15 touchdowns in 13 games this season for 118.62 yards per game average to rank 12th nationally and second in the SEC in rushing. Ingram has also added 30 receptions for 322 yards and three scores. Below is a look at Ingram's season on a game-by-game basis.

INGRAM IS EXPLOSIVE ...: Mark Ingram has burst onto the scene for the Crimson Tide as a sophomore in 2009. He ranks among the national leaders in runs of 10 yards or more (46), 15 yards or more (29) and 20 yards or more (17). With his 10 receptions of 10 or more yards, he has a total of 53 plays of 10 or more yards this season. He ripped off an impressive eight runs and one reception of 10 or more yards against South Carolina, including five runs and one reception of 20 or more yards. He also had six runs and one reception of 10 yards or more vs. LSU's tough defense and three rushes and one receptions of 10 yards or more vs. Florida's then-top-ranked defense.

... AND TOUGH: Mark Ingram has also proven difficult to bring down on first contact. He has gained an astonishing 1,002 yards after contact this season on 279 touches (249 rushes, 30 receptions). Ingram has gained 53.7 percent of his total yards after contact this season (1,002 of 1,864). He reeled off a season-best 167 total yards after contact against South Carolina on 24 rushes and two receptions. He also broke the 100-yard barrier on yards after contact vs. Virginia Tech (115), and LSU (107). He also got close at Mississippi (95) and vs. Florida's No. 1-ranked defense. Below is a breakdown of Ingram's yards after contact (both rushing and receiving) this year.

INGRAM TOPS ALABAMA'S SINGLE-SEASON RUSHING LIST: Mark Ingram has 1,542 rushing yards this season to become Alabama single-season rushing leader. He sprinted past the former record-holder Bobby Humphrey with 113 yards against Florida's then-No. 1-ranked defense in the SEC Championship Game.

INGRAM'S PACE: Mark Ingram has already turned in a big season for the Crimson Tide. His 118.62 yards per game currently ranks 12th in the country and he is on pace to rush for 1,661 yards in a 14-game season (including National Championship Game). He has already broken the Alabama single-season rushing mark of 1,471 by Bobby Humphrey in 1986 and currently ranks 11th on the SEC's single-season rushing list. But he is on pace (1,661) to rank sixth on the SEC single-season rushing chart. It would only trail only Georgia's Herschel Walker (1,891 & 1,752), Arkansas' Darren McFadden (1,830), Auburn's Bo Jackson (1,786) and LSU's Charles Alexander (1,686). He would also do it in less carries - projected 268 - than any running back in the top 10.

BALL SECURITY: Mark Ingram has also developed an impressive reputation during his 27-game Alabama career as an expert at holding onto the football. The sophomore has lost only one fumble in 392 career rushing attempts and 37 career receptions for a total of 429 career touches. He has only put the ball on the ground twice (at LSU in 2008 and vs. Tennessee in 2009), the first of which was recovered by the Tide and the second was a lost fumble vs. Tennessee this season. Ingram went 332 carries into his career before losing his first fumble. He has 2,270 rushing yards in those 26 games with 24 rushing touchdowns while also catching 35 passes for 300 yards and three scores.

INGRAM RACKING UP RUSHING/RECEIVING YARDS: Mark Ingram has already broken the Tide's single-season rushing record (with 1,542 yards), but he is also among the UA greats in all-purpose yardage. Ingram enters the Texas game with 1,864 all-purpose yards (only rushing and receiving in his case), which ranks third on the Tide's single-season list. He is 152 yards behind the Tide's single-season record-holder Bobby Humphrey (2,016 yards in 1986). Ingram is averaging 143.4 all-purpose yards per game this season.

INGRAM OVER 100 YARDS RUSHING FOR 7TH in 2009; 8TH TIME IN CAREER: Mark Ingram's 113 rushing yards vs. Florida in the SEC Championship Game is his seven 100-yard rushing performances in 2009, tying an Alabama record for 100-yard rushing outings in a season originally set by Shaun Alexander in 1999. Ingram has eclipsed 100 rushing yards eight times in his Alabama career, ranking ninth in Alabama history. Alexander (15 from 1996-99) and Bobby Humphrey (15 from 1985-88) hold the record.

TOP RUSHING EFFORT IN BRYANT-DENNY STADIUM: Mark Ingram constructed a careerbest rushing performance with 246 yards on 24 attempts against South Carolina on Oct. 17 – the third-highest single-game rushing total in Alabama history and the most in the history of Bryant-Denny Stadium. Ingram's signature drive of the season also came against the Gamecocks, as he carried the ball on all six plays of the Tide final touchdown drive that sealed the game. Five of the plays came out of the 'Wildcat' formation with the runs covering 24, 4, 5, 9, 22 and 4 yards (TD). The yardage exceeded Ingram's 172-yard outing at Mississippi, his previous career high.

INGRAM SCORES ON CAREER-LONG RUN: Sophomore running back Mark Ingram's 70-yard touchdown run with 7:24 left in the fourth quarter sealed Alabama's win over Mississippi State. It also stands as the longest run of Ingram's Alabama career (previous long: 54 yards versus South Carolina on October 17, 2009).

MARK INGRAM BREAKDOWN: Below is a detailed breakdown of sophomore running back Mark Ingram's 2009 season as the sophomore continues to trend upward.

INGRAM VS. SEC TEAMS: Ingram has rushed for 1,143 yards (199 attempts) in nine games against SEC competition, including the SEC Championship Game. He is averaging 127.0 yards per game in SEC play with 10 rushing touchdowns. He has accounted for 67.6 percent of the team's rushing total in league play (1,143 of 1,690) and has scored 10 of the team's 12 rushing touchdowns. Ingram has six 100-yard games against SEC teams this season: Kentucky, Mississippi, South Carolina, LSU, Mississippi State and Florida. He finished with a career-high 246 yards vs. No. 22 South Carolina and then busted loose on a career-long 70-yard touchdown run at Mississippi State on Nov. 14.

INGRAM ON THE ROAD: In six games away from Bryant-Denny Stadium, vs. Virginia Tech (Atlanta), at Kentucky, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Auburn and Florida (Atlanta), Ingram is averaging 125.7 rushing yards per game this season. He has gained 754 yards in those contests on 134 carries and nine touchdowns.

INGRAM IN SEPTEMBER: Ingram averaged 86.8 rushing yards in four games in September in limited action. He missed the start and most of the second half of the Tide's win over Florida International with the flu. He then missed almost all of the second half and only received eight car-

ries in a 53-7 blowout win over North Texas. Ingram also missed most of the fourth quarter against Arkansas after the Tide built a 35-7 lead.

INGRAM IN OCTOBER: Ingram had a breakout month in October, averaging 164.2 rushing vards per game against four SEC opponents. He had 92 rushing attempts for 657 yards and four touchdowns for 7.1 yards per carry. Ingram tallied three 100-yard rushing games and had 99 yards in win over Tennessee while averaging 175.5 allpurpose yards per game.

INGRAM IN NOVEMBER: In four games in November, Ingram rushed 73 times for 424 yards and four touchdowns in wins over LSU, Mississippi State, Chattanooga and Auburn. He averaged 5.81 yards per carry and 106 yards per game in those four games. He ran for 144 yards in the Tide's SEC Western Division-clinching win over No. 9 LSU on Nov. 7 and added 149 rushing yards - with a 70-yard run - and two touchdowns at Mississippi State on Nov. 14. Ingram left the game with 9:43 remaining in the second quarter vs. Chattanooga with 102 yards and two touchdowns on just 11 rushes. He was held to a season-low 30 yards at Auburn on Nov. 27.

A BALANCED ATTACK: Alabama returned to the nation's elite in 2008 with a punishing ground attack that wore down defenses and took shots down the field. In 2009, the Tide has brought more balance to the table. UA still has an outstanding ground game and an aerial attack to match with quarterback Greg McElroy. The Tide has shown good balance in their offensive numbers, averaging 215.85 rushing yards and 197.92 yards passing per game, which gives UA the No. 35 total offense in the nation (413.77 ypg). On the ground, Alabama is rushing the ball an average of 42.31 times per game for 5.10 yards per rush. The passing game is averaging 25.69 pass attempts per contest for an average of 7.70 yards per attempt. Those numbers are leading to points on the scoreboard. UA averaged 30.1 points per game last season and is averaging 31.69 points per game in 2009 to rank 26th nationally.

McELROY ON THE MARK: Junior quarterback Greg McElroy has been impressive in his first season as the Crimson Tide's starting quarterback, completing 61.15 percent (192 of 314) of his passes for 2,450 yards and 17 touchdowns with only four interceptions. He boasts a 142.01 passing efficiency rating, which ranks 30th nationally and fourth in the SEC. He has won his last 29 starts at quarterback, going 16-0 as a high school senior in 2005 and 13-0 for the Tide in 2009. In his collegiate starting debut against Virginia Tech, the Southlake, Texas, native threw for 230 yards on 15-of-30 passing with one touchdown and one interception in leading the Crimson Tide to a win over the No. 7 team in the country. He also set a new Alabama record for consecutive completions against Florida International by connecting on 14 straight passes. Against North Texas, he tied the school mark for highest completion percentage with a minimum of 10 completions, going 13 for 15 (86.7 percent).

SECOND-HALF PRECISION: Alabama junior quarterback Greg McElroy is one of just three quarterbacks in the nation to have at least 75 second-half pass attempts with zero interceptions. McElroy joins TCU's Andy Dalton and Southern Miss' Martevious Young as the only quarterbacks to accomplish the feat. For the season, McElroy has completed 61.1 percent of his passes for 2,450 yards with 17 touchdowns and four interceptions. However, those numbers improve significantly in the second half. McElroy has completed 66-of-101 passes (65.3 percent) in the second half for 909 vards and nine touchdowns. Broken down by quarter, McElrov has connected on an amazing 73.3 percent of his passes (22-of-30) for 345 yards and four touchdowns in the fourth quarter, while hitting on 44-of-71 passes in the third quarter (62.0 percent) for 564 yards and five touchdowns. McELROY MOVING UP THE RECORD BOOKS: Alabama junior quarterback Greg McElroy is quietly moving up the Crimson Tide's single-season record books. He ranks tied for second in passing touchdowns with 17 (needs one to tie, two to break), fourth in passing yards with 2,450 (49 yards out of third place), fifth in completions with 192 (needs 11 to move into fourth and 14 to move into third place) and sixth in attempts with 314 (needs 26 to move into fourth and 28 to move into third place). McElroy is also currently the school's single-season leader in completion percentage at 61.14 (192 of 314). He leads Gary Hollingsworth, who completed 60.5 percent (205 of 339) in 1989.

JONES PRODUCTION ON THE RISE: Alabama sophomore wide receiver Julio Jones has put up some impressive numbers during the last half of the 2009 season. Slowed by injures during the first half of the year, Jones' production has exploded over the last six games. The Foley, Ala., native has 29 catches for 398 yards and three touchdowns during that time frame. He is also averaging 13.7 yards per catch and 66.3 yards per game. His recent success began against Tennessee on Oct. 24, when he hauled in seven receptions for 54 yards in the Tide's 12-10 win. Against LSU he caught four passes for 102 yards and a 73-yard touchdown as the Tide clinched the SEC Western Division with a 24-15 win over the Tigers. He caught a touchdown pass in three straight games against LSU, Mississippi State and Chattanooga. Jones closed out the regular season with a career-high nine catches for 83 yards in the win over Auburn. Jones was instrumental in the gamewinning touchdown drive with four catches for 33 yards with all four catches resulting in first downs. He had two receptions, both for first downs, in the Tide's 32-13 win over Florida in the SEC Championship Game.

RICHARDSON HAS IMPRESSIVE ROOKIE CAMPAIGN: True freshman running back Trent Richardson has enjoyed an impressive rookie season. The Pensacola, Fla., native has rushed for 642 yards and six touchdowns in 126 attempts (5.10 yards per carry and 49.4 yards per game). Richardson has 14 receptions for 107 yards. He rushed for 118 yards and two touchdowns on 15 carries against Florida International in his second career game. He followed that up with 87 yards on 11 carries (7.9 ypc) against North Texas and 65 yards and a score vs. Arkansas. Richardson scored on runs of

nine and 35 yards in the second half vs. FIU, plunged in from one yard out against North Texas and broke five tackles en route to a 52-yard touchdown vs. Arkansas. He then went for 80 yards on 11 carries against the vaunted Florida defense.

MULTIPLE OPTIONS CREATE DIVERSE OFFENSIVE ATTACK: A key element of the Tide's high-powered offense in 2009 has been its ability to find playmakers all over the field. UA quarterbacks, led by starter Greg McElroy, have completed 61.14 percent of their passes to 17 different receivers in the 2009 season. That includes the SEC opener against Arkansas where McElroy spread out 17 completions to nine different targets. The UA receiving numbers are headed by Julio Jones, who has 42 receptions for 573 yards, a 13.6 yards per catch average and four touchdowns. Running back Mark Ingram is tied for second with 30 receptions for 322 yards and three scores. Receiver Marquis Maze has equaled Ingram's 30 catches while accounting for 519 yards two touchdowns. Next is tight end Colin Peek with 26 grabs for 313 yards and two touchdowns. Receiver Darius Hanks has 17 catches for 272 yards and 3 touchdowns. In all, the Tide has 106 receptions from its wide receivers, 59 from backs, 40 from tight ends and one from safety Mark Barron on a fake punt.

DIVERSE SCORING: The Alabama offense has been able to score in a hurry while also showing the ability to grind out the long, time-consuming scoring drive. The Crimson Tide has scored 24 touchdowns in three minutes or less, including 13 that found the end zone in three or less plays. On the flip side, Alabama has ground out 16 scoring drives (12 touchdowns & four field goals) that have included 10 or more plays and 5:00 of possession time. The Tide has logged six touchdowns that have consisted of at least 13 plays. Alabama has also pounded out 10 drives of 80 yards or more, including three drives of 95 yards or more (99, 97 & 95). Alabama's 17-play, 88-yard, game-clinching drive against Florida in the SEC Championship Games is the most-plays run and longest-time elapsed on a drive this season.

TIME OF POSSESSION: An Alabama trademark over the past two seasons has been its ability to control the line of scrimmage offensively and, consequently, control the tempo of the game. This has created an impressive advantage in time of possession. A year ago the Crimson Tide finished 11th nationally with an average time of possession of 32:08. In 2009, the Crimson Tide is once again a leader in that category, ranking third nationally at 33:31. UA's biggest time of possession win came in the biggest game of the year as Alabama held the ball for 39:37 against Florida in the SEC Championship Game. The Tide held the ball for 37:02 in the opener against Virginia Tech and then again against Chattanooga. UA also had 38:19 of possession at Mississippi. UA also won possession time against Florida International (31:38), North Texas (30:43), Arkansas (33:36), Kentucky (33:30), LSU (32:52), Mississippi State (31:36) and Auburn (33:47). The Tide has won the time of possession battle in 20 of the last 27 games over the last two season, including 11-of-13 contests in 2009.

BAMA SCORES ON BIG PLAYS: On the year, the Alabama offense has 55 plays of 20 yards or more with 21 of those plays going for touchdowns. The Tide also has 21 plays of 35 yards or more with 13 of those going for scores.

ALABAMA'S 53 POINTS: Alabama's 53 points in its win over North Texas were the most during head coach Nick Saban's tenure at the Capstone. The previous high of 52 came on Sept. 1, 2007, against Western Carolina in his first game at Alabama. Additionally, the 53 points are the most scored by Alabama since beating Texas-El

Paso, 56-7, on Oct. 6, 2001, at Legion Field in Birmingham. The 53 points are the most at Bryant-Denny Stadium since a 62-0 win over Tulane on Oct. 12, 1991.

100-YARD RUSHERS AND RECEIVERS: Alabama has had nine 100-yard rushers and two 100-yard receivers in its 13 games this season. Sophomore running back Mark Ingram has recorded at least 100 yards in six of his last eight games and eight games overall. He had 150 yards vs. Virginia Tech, 140 yards at Kentucky, 172 yards at Mississippi and then a career-best and Bryant-Denny Stadium record 246 yards against South Carolina. Ingram then went for 144 against No. 9 LSU, 149 and two scores at Mississippi State and 102 yards and two touchdowns against Chattanooga on just 11 carries. Under Saban, Alabama has had 19 100-yard rushing performances and the Tide has gone 18-1 in those 19 games. Four different players have rushed for 100 yards during the last three seasons. Under Saban, Alabama has had eight 100-yard receiving performances and the Tide has gone 7-1 in those games. The LSU game on Nov. 7 marked the fourth time under Saban that Alabama has had a 100-yard rusher and receiver in the same game.

30-PLUS: For the first time since 1979, and just the third time in school history, Alabama opened the season with five straight games in which the Crimson Tide scored 30 points or more. The Tide also accomplished the feat in 1920. It was just the seventh time in school history Alabama has had five consecutive games of 30 points or more scored with the most recent being the season-opening streak in 1979. The longest such streak is seven games, which came from Sept. 18-Oct. 30, 1971. The 1971 team also set the school record for most 30-point games in a season with nine. Alabama has eight 30-point games this season after recording eight in 2008. In 2009, the Tide opened with 34 points against Virginia Tech, scored 40 vs. Florida International and rang up 53 against North Texas - the most points for a UA team since 2001. The Crimson Tide then put up 35 points in the SEC opener against Arkansas and followed that with 38 points on the road at Kentucky. Later, Alabama posted a 31-3 win at Mississippi State on Nov. 14 and a 32-13 win over Florida in the SEC Championship Game.

CRIMSON TIDE SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

ARENAS CLOSE TO SEC & NCAA PUNT RETURN YARDAGE RECORD: Senior return specialist Javier Arenas is one of the best punt returners in college football history. He has already broken all of the Crimson Tide punt return records and has the SEC record for career punt return yards (1,733) and career punt returns for touchdowns (7). He now has his sights set on the NCAA record, needing 29 yards to become the NCAA leader in career punt return yards and is one touchdown shy of the NCAA mark. Arenas broke Lee Nalley's (Vanderbilt, 1947-49) long-standing SEC record of 1,695 yards (102 returns for a 14.4-yard average) with 67 yards on two punt returns vs. Auburn. Arenas set the SEC punt returns for touchdowns record (7) with a 66-yard return vs. Chattanooga. Nalley set that record and it stood for 54 years as the NCAA record until Texas Tech's Wes Welker broke it in 2003. Welker finished his Tech career with 1,761 punt return yards. Arenas is the NCAA active leader in career punt returns (122), yards (1,733), touchdowns (7), returns per game and yards per game (14.26).

TIFFIN'S PRODUCTION AT ALL-TIME HIGH: Alabama senior place-kicker Leigh Tiffin leads the nation in field goals per game at 2.23 and total field goals made (29). He has connected on 29-of-33 field goals this season (87.9 percent). His 29 field goals breaks his own school record (25 in 2007) and currently rank as the second most by any SEC kicker in a single season in history (Georgia's Billy Bennett, 31 - also NCAA record). Tiffin has also broken his own single-season scoring record with 125 points, which ranks tied for fifth in points by a kicker in SEC history. He leads the SEC and ranks ninth nationally in scoring at 9.62 points per game. Tiffin has connected on 23 of his last 25 field goals, including 14 of his last 15.

TIFFIN BECOMES UA'S CAREER SCORING LEADER: Leigh Tiffin became Alabama's career scoring leader on Nov. 7 with 10 points vs. LSU, passing Philip Doyle (345). He now has 378 career points to rank second among kickers in SEC history. He trails only Georgia's Billy Bennett, who holds both the SEC and NCAA scoring record with 409 career points.

TIFFIN BREAKS UA'S CAREER FIELD GOALS MADE RECORD: Senior place-kicker Leigh Tiffin has broken the Alabama career field goals made record with 82 in his career at the Capstone. He converted 2-of-3 field goals at Auburn on Nov. 27 to pass Philip Doyle, who had 78 field goals from 1987-90. After hitting both attempts vs. Florida in the SEC Championship Game, Tiffin has connected on multiple field goals in nine games this season. He has made 21-of-23 field goals during the last nine games and 14 of his last 15 attempts. He is also second on the SEC's career field goals made list, just five behind Georgia's Billy Bennett (87), who is also the NCAA career leader.

INGRAM BECOMES TIDE'S FIRST HEISMAN TROPHY WINNER: Alabama running back Mark Ingram became Alabama's first Heisman Tropy winner in 2009. The sophomore from Flint, Mich., edged out Stanford's Toby Gerhart by 28 points to take of the most coveted award in college football. Ingram tallied 1,304 points and 227 first-place votes to beat out Stanford's Toby Gerhart (1,276 points and 222 first-place votes) in the closest Heisman Trophy vote in history. He is the second running back to win the Heisman Trophy this decade, joining former Southern California All-American Reggie Bush, who won the award in 2005. He is the 40th running back to win the Heisman Trophy, but just the eighth since 1985. He is the ninth player in Southeastern Conference history to win the Heisman Trophy and the second in the last three years, join-

ing 2007 winner Tim Tebow (Florida). Other SEC winners include Frank Sinkwich (Georgia, 1942), Billy Cannon (LSU, 1959), Steve Spurrier (Florida, 1966), Pat Sullivan (Auburn, 1971), Herschel Walker (Georgia, 1982), Bo Jackson (Auburn) and Danny Wuerffel (Florida). In 12 games this season, Ingram has rushed for a school-record 1,542 yards and 15 touchdowns on the ground. He ranks second in the SEC and 12th nationally with 118.6 rushing yards per game. Ingram has added 30 receptions for 322 yards and three touchdowns, giving him 18 total touchdowns and 1,864 all-purpose yards. He tied Shaun Alexander as the fastest player in school history to reach 1,000 yards, accomplishing the feat in just eight games.

INGRAM WINS SPORTING NEWS NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR: Alabama running back Mark Ingram has also been selected as the Sporting News National Player of the Year after his historic 2009 season. A unamious first-team All-America selection, he also won the Heisman Trophy.

MCCLAIN WINS BUTKUS AWARD: Alabama junior linebacker Rolando McClain is the second Crimson Tide player to capture the Butkus Award, which goes to the top linebacker in college football since 1985. Former Alabama All-American Derrick Thomas won the Butkus Award in 1988. McClain beat out finalists Sergio Kindle (Texas), Eric Norwood (South Carolina), Brandon Spikes (Florida) and Sean Weatherspoon (Missouri). McClain is the heart and soul of the Tide defense this season, anchoring a unit that leads the SEC and ranks second nationally in rushing defense, allowing 2.76 yards per play and 77.9 yards per game this season. He leads the team with 101 tackles and has 12.5 tackles for loss (-58 yards), four sacks (-36 yards), two interceptions (21 return yards), three pass breakups, 14 quarterback hurries and a forced fumble that led directly to a touchdown. The UA defense leads the nation in scoring defense (11.00 ppg) while ranking second nationally in total defense (241.69 ypg).

INGRAM ALSO A FINALIST SEVERAL OTHER AWARDS: Alabama sophomore running back Mark Ingram won the Heisman and was named the Sporting News Player of the Year, but was also a finalist for several other national awards. He was one of five finalists for the 2009 Walter Camp Player of the Year Award, one of three finalists for the Maxwell Award, the Walter Camp Player of the Year and the Doak Walker Award.

SMART WINS 2009 BROYLES AWARD: Alabama defensive coordinator Kirby Smart won the 2009 the Frank Broyles Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top assistant coach in college football. Smart is beat out Boise State offensive coordinator Bryan Harsin, Cincinnati offensive coordinator Jeff Quinn, Florida defensive coordinator Charlie Strong and TCU defensive coordinator Dick Bumpus as this year's finalists. Under Smart's tutelage, the Alabama defense ranks among the top four nationally in all three major statistical categories. UA is first in the NCAA in pass efficiency defense (88.81) and scoring defense (11.00 ppg) while ranking second rushing defense, (77.92 ypg) and second in total defense (241.69 ypg). Alabama has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in 33 straight games – a streak that leads the country. The Crimson Tide defense has recorded 20 interceptions this year which is currently fifth in the NCAA standings.

SABAN, INGRAM, McCLAIN HONORED BY ASSOCIATED PRESS: The 2009 Southeastern Conference Champion Alabama Crimson Tide took home three major awards, when the Associated Press released its All-SEC football team. Head Coach Nick Saban was named the 2009 SEC Coach of the Year, while sophomore running back Mark Ingram and junior linebacker Rolando McClain were selected as the Associated Press Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year. Saban has guided the Crimson Tide to a No. 1 BCS ranking and berth in the BCS National Championship Game after compiling a 13-0 record this season and securing the school's 22nd SEC Championship. In three years at Alabama, Saban has compiled a 32-8 (.800) overall record and has led the Tide to backto-back SEC Western Division titles. Ingram wrapped up SEC Offensive Player of the Year honors after shattering the Alabama single-season rushing record with 1,542 yards this season and 15 touchdowns. The sophomore averaged 118.6 yards per game and 6.2 yards per carry. He also added 322 receiving yards and three touchdowns, giving him 1,865 all-purpose yards and 18 touchdowns this season. McClain was named the 2009 SEC Defensive Player of the Year after leading one of the nation's top defensive units with 101 tackles, including 12.5 tackles for loss (-58 yards) and four sacks (-36 yards). He also added 14 quarterback pressures, three pass breakups, two interceptions (21 return yards) and forced one fumble.

ALABAMA HAS SEVEN FIRST-TEAM ALL-SEC PICKS: Alabama had seven first-team All-SEC selections this season, as voted by the league's 12 head coaches and the Associated Press. The first-team All-SEC picks included senior cornerback/return specialist Javier Arenas, sophomore safety Mark Barron, senior nose guard Terrence Cody, sophomore running back Mark Ingram, senior left guard Mike Johnson, junior linebacker Rolando McClain and senior kicker Leigh Tiffin. In addition, Alabama had three second-team All-SEC picks in 2009, including junior offensive lineman James Carpenter, sophomore receiver Julio Jones and senior tight end Colin Peek.

CRIMSON TIDE TRIO NAMED FRESHMAN ALL-SEC: Alabama freshmen Barrett Jones, Trent Richardson and Nico Johnson were named to the 2009 Freshman All-Southeastern Football Team. Jones started all 13 games for the Tide at right guard and helped the Crimson Tide offense churn out 215.8 rushing yards and 413.8 total yards per game this season. He also cleared the path for sophomore Mark Ingram's school record 1,542 rushing yards and 15 touchdowns this season. The Memphis, Tenn., native was twice named Alabama offensive player of the week this season by the Tide coaching staff. Jones and South Carolina wide receiver Alshon Jeffery were the only unanimous offensive or defensive selections to this year's freshman All-SEC team. Richardson played in all 13 games at running back this season for the Crimson Tide. The Pensacola, Fla., native was the Crimson Tide's second-leading rusher with 642 yards and six touchdowns. He averaged 5.1 yards per carry this season. He also caught 14 passes for 107 yards. He was twice named SEC Freshman of the Week following wins over Florida International and Arkansas. Johnson played in 11 games and made two starts and had an increased role in the Tide's defense after the season-ending injury to preseason All-SEC linebacker Dont'a Hightower. Johnson recorded 27 tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss (-18 yards) and one sack (-15 yards). He also added two pass breakups and forced one fumble.

JONES, RICHARDSON EARN FRESHMAN All-AMERICAN HONORS: Alabama freshman right guard Barrett Jones has been named to the 2009 Sporting News, Phil Steele and CollegeFootballNews.com Freshman All-American Teams. The Memphis, Tenn., native started all 13 games for the Crimson Tide's SEC Championship team at right guard. Running back Trent Richardson was an honorable mention freshman All-American by CollegeFootballNews.com.

ALABAMA PLACES FOUR ON AFCA ALL-AMERICAN TEAM: The Alabama football team has placed four players on the 2009 American Football Coaches Association All-American team. Alabama sophomore running back Mark Ingram, senior left guard Mike Johnson, junior linebacker Rolando McClain and senior cornerback Javier Arenas were named to the 25-man squad. The 2009 season marks the second straight year the Crimson Tide has placed four players on the AFCA All-American team. It is also the ninth time since the inception of the AFCA All-American Team in 1945 that one school has had four or more players on one All-American team. Alabama (2008 and 2009), Notre Dame (1966 and 1990) and Southern California (1967 and 2005) are the only schools to accomplish that feat twice.

COLIN PEEK & BARRETT JONES NAMED ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS: Alabama tight end Colin Peek and right guard Barrett Jones have been named to the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-American Team, as selected by the College of Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) recently. Peek is the first Alabama player selected to the first team since Kenny King in 2002. Peek sports a 3.79 grade point average in finance and will graduate in December. He has played in 13 games in 2009 and has recorded 26 catches for 313 yards (12.0 per catch) and three touchdowns. Jones was named to the second team after compiling a 4.0 grade point average in management at the Capstone. He has started all 13 games for the Crimson Tide this season at right guard and is one of three first-year starters on an offensive line that is averaging 215.85 rushing yards per game to rank 12th nationally and ranks 19th nationally in fewest sacks allowed (1.15) per game.

INGRAM PICKED AS DOAK WALKER & MAXWELL FINALIST: Alabama sophomore running back Mark Ingram has been selected as one of three finalists for the 2009 Doak Walker Award and the 2009 Maxwell Award. The Doak Walker Award goes to the nation's top running back, while the Maxwell Award is given to the best all-around player in college football. In 12 games this season, Ingram has 1,542 yards and 15 touchdowns on the ground. He ranks second in the SEC and 12th nationally with 118.6 rushing yards per game. Ingram has added 30 receptions for 322 yards and three touchdowns, giving him 18 total touchdowns and 1,864 all-purpose yards. He tied Shaun Alexander as the fastest player in school history to reach 1,000 yards, accomplishing the feat in just eight games.

MCCLAIN NAMED A LOTT IMPACT TROPHY FINALIST: Crimson Tide junior linebacker Rolando McClain in one of four finalists for the 2009 Lott Impact Trophy the Pacific Club Impact Foundation. The award, which is named for NFL Hall of Famer Ronnie Lott, is presented to college football's defensive IMPACT Player of the Year. The award is presented to the player who best exhibits the same characteristics Lott embodied during his distinguished career: Integrity, Maturity, Performance, Academics, Community and Tenacity. The winning school will receive \$25,000 for their general scholarship fund. Former Alabama linebacker and current Houston Texans standout DeMeco Ryans won the award in 2006. Alabama ranks in the top three nationally in almost every defensive category. The four finalists will be announced Nov. 24 and the winner will be announced Dec. 13 at the Lott Trophy Banquet in Newport Beach, Calif.

CODY SELECTED AS LOMBARDI FINALIST: Alabama nose guard Terrence Cody is one of four finalists for the 40th Rotary Lombardi Award, which goes to the nation's top interior lineman or linebacker. Cody joins TCU defensive end Jerry Hughes, Oklahoma defensive end Gerald McCoy and Nebraska defensive tackle Ndamukong Suh as this year's finalists. Cody is the seventh Tide player to be named a finalist for the Lombardi Award and the second in a row, after Andre Smith in 2008. Former All-American linebacker Cornelius Bennett is the only UA player to win the Lombardi Award, capturing the honor in 1986. Cody has anchored an Alabama defensive front that has held opponents to 77.9 rushing yards per game, a figure that ranks second nationally. He has recorded 25 tackles, including six tackles for loss (-21 yards), while constantly going against double-teams. He has also added two blocked kicks, three quarterback pressures and one pass breakup.

CODY NAMED NAGURSKI FINALIST: Senior nose guard Terrence Cody has been selected as one of five finalists for the 2009 Bronko Nagurski Trophy by the Football Writers Association and the Charlotte (N.C.) Touchdown Club. Cody is joined by Iowa linebacker Pat Angerer, Tennessee strong safety Eric Berry, TCU defensive end Jerry Hughes and Nebraska defensive tackle Ndamukong Suh as the five finalists vying for one of the FWAA's highest honors, its National Defensive Player of the Year award.

CODY NAMED FINALIST FOR BEDNARIK AWARD: Terrence Cody is among the three finalists for the Chuck Bednarik Award, given to the best defensive player in college football. Cody joins Nadamukong Suh (Nebraska) and Brandon Spikes (Florida) as finalists.

TIFFIN NAMED FINALIST FOR LOU GROZA AWARD: Alabama senior placekicker Leigh Tiffin has been selected as one of three finalists for the 2009 Lou Groza Award, which is given to the nation's best place-kicker. Tiffin is joined by UCLA's Kai Forbath and Georgia's Blair Walsh. Tiffin is first nationally with 27 field goals while ranking ninth in scoring at 9.75 points per game. Both of those numbers lead the SEC. He has connected on 87.1 percent of his field goals this season (27-of-31). He has 117 points, which leads all Groza finalists and is the highest total in a single season in school history. The winner will be announced on Dec. 10 at the ESPN/Home Depot College Football Awards Show in Orlando, Fla.

NICK SABAN NAMED AFCA REGION II COACH OF THE YEAR: Alabama head football coach Nick Saban has been named the 2009 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Region II Coach of the Year. Region II is comprised of the 12 teams from the Southeastern Conference and nine teams from the Sun Belt Conference in the Football Bowl Subdivision. Mississippi's Houston Nutt was the 2008 winner. Saban has guided Alabama to back-to-back 12-0 regular seasons and two straight appearances in the SEC Championship Game. In three seasons, Saban has compiled a 31-8 (.795) overall record with the Tide. He has directed the Crimson Tide to 25 wins in its last 27 games and two straight SEC Western Division championships. Alabama has won 24 straight regular-season games and 16 consecutive SEC games under Saban. The Tide's 24 wins over the last two seasons are the second-most among FBS schools and tied for the most wins in back-to-back seasons in school history.

INGRAM/CODY RECEIVE AT&T PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS: In back-toback weeks (South Carolina and Tennessee), Alabama players won the AT&T All-America Player of the Week Award. The AT&T All-America Player of the Week is the only player of the week award voted on solely by the fans. Ingram rushed for a Bryant-Denny Stadium record 246 yards and a touchdown against South Carolina and Cody followed that with two blocked field goals in the fourth quarter against Tennessee to preserve the win. The second blocked field goal came with four seconds remaining and clinched a 12-10 Crimson Tide win.

MORE SEC HONORS: Rolando McClain is the latest Alabama player to receive SEC Player of the Week honors, he was named the SEC Defensive Player of the Week after making 12 tackles and recording a sack in a win a Auburn. Javier Arenas earned special teams honors following the Chattanooga game, where he set the SEC record with his seventh career punt return for a touchdown. Mike Johnson was the offensive lineman of the week after the Tide's 252 yards rushing and no sacks allowed at Mississippi State. Arenas was honored following the LSU was as the defensive player of the week, making seven total tackles (four solos), with two for losses (-8 yards) and a quarterback pressure. Seniors Leigh Tiffin and Terrence Cody were honored by the SEC following the Tennessee game. Tiffin was selected as the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week after successfully converting all four field goal attempts and accounting for all 12 points in the win over Tennessee. Tiffin made kicks of 38, 50, 22 and 49 yards. Tiffin has made 11 field goals in the last three games against Mississippi (5-for-5), South Carolina (2-for-3) and Tennessee (4-for-4). Cody was named the SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week after his two blocked field attempts, including one of the game's final play that secured the Crimson Tide's 12-10 victory over the Vols. Cody blocked Daniel Lincoln's 44-yard field goal attempt on the game's final play as the Tide improved to 8-0 this season. Cody also blocked a 43-yard field goal attempt earlier in the fourth quarter, tying the Alabama single-game record for blocked kicks in a game. He was also credited with two tackles in the win.

For the season, Alabama has seen eight players earn 10 SEC Player of the Week honors. Mark Ingram has received offensive player of the week honors twice, following the Virginia Tech and South Carolina games while fellow running back Trent Richardson was recognized as the freshman of the week following the FIU and Arkansas games. Rolando McClain was honors after the Kentucky game when he made 12 tackles, forced a fumble that was returned for a touchdown and intercepted a pass. Junior center William Vlachos was named the SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week following the Tide's win at Mississippi.

JAVIER ARENAS TABBED AS SEMIFINALIST FOR THORPE AWARD: Alabama senior cornerback Javier Arenas was one of 12 semifinalists for the Jim Thorpe Award, which goes to the nation's top defensive back. Arenas is one of three SEC players among the semifinalists.

McCLAIN EARNS NATIONAL HONOR: Alabama linebacker Rolando McClain was named the FWAA/Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week after his performance against Kentucky. McClain, a 6-4, 258-pound junior from Decatur, Ala., registered a game- and season-high 12 tackles (eight unassisted) made his first interception of the 2009 season, forced a fumble that was returned for a touchdown, notched a quarterback hurry and recorded a pass deflection in Alabama's 38-20 victory. McClain's forced fumble led to a 45-yard touchdown return that gave the Crimson Tide a 21-6 halftime lead. Then, his 21-yard interception return on the first possession of the third quarter set up another Alabama touchdown. His third-quarter pass deflection resulted in an interception that led to a field goal.

SPORTING NEWS' MIDSEASON ALL-AMERICANS: Four Alabama players were among 26 players listed on the Sporting News midseason All-America team. The Tide defense featured standout linebacker Rolando McClain along with nose guard Terrence Cody. Running back Mark Ingram and left guard Mike Johnson were tabbed on offense.

McCLAIN LOTT IMPACT POW: Junior linebacker Rolando McClain was selected as the Lott Trophy's IMPACT Player of the Week following the Tide's 20-6 win over No. 22 South Carolina. The Decatur, Ala., native had seven tackles, two quarterback pressures, one tackle for loss (-2 yards) and one pass breakup in the Crimson Tide's win over the Gamecocks.

PEEK ON MACKEY WATCH LIST: Alabama senior tight end Colin Peek was one of 22 players named to the 2009 John Mackey Award Watch List announced by the Nassau County Sports Commission. The Mackey Award is given annually to best collegiate tight end and the winner will be announced on Dec. 10. Peek has started

11 games and played in 12 for the top Crimson Tide and has caught 23 passes for 274 yards (11.9 per catch) and two touchdowns this season. Peek's blocking skills have paved the way for running back Mark Ingram's 119.1 rushing yards per game this season and 12 touchdowns. In addition, the Crimson Tide offense churns out 212.92 rushing yards per game to rank 13th nationally and second in the SEC.

STAR OF THE WEEK: Senior place-kicker Leigh Tiffin has become accustomed to being named the Lou Groza Award "Star of the Week." He was selected for the award for the third time this season after nailing four field goals and accounting for all of Alabama's points in a 12-10 win over Tennessee. He connected on kicks of 38, 50, 22 and 49 yards in the win. He was also named the Lou Groza Award "Star of the Week" for his efforts in the Crimson Tide's 22-3 win at Mississippi on Oct. 10, when he kicked a career-best five field goals in the win. His first "Star of the Week" recognition this season came at Virginia Tech where he connected on 4-of-5 field goals and two extra points. Tiffin was also named a Lou Groza Award "Star of the Week" twice in 2008.

FRESHMAN ACADEMICS: Alabama's heralded 2008 freshman class did more than just excel on the football field, the Crimson Tide placed 12 rookies on the 2009 SEC Freshman Academic Honor Roll, by far the highest total in the SEC with Georgia coming in second with seven honorees. Honorees were Undra Billingsley, John Michael Boswell, Jerrell Harris, Mark Ingram, Barrett Jones, Chris Jordan, Tyler Love, Wesley Neighbors, Brad Smelley, Corey Smith, Damion Square and Michael Williams. Each student-athlete must have a cumulative GPA of 3.00 or above and be on scholarship or a letter winner. They also must completed 24 semester hours of non-remedial credit at the nominating institution and have been a member of the varsity team for the sport's entire NCAA Championship segment.

CRIMSON TIDE TEAM NOTES

ALABAMA CAPTURES 22ND SEC CHAMPIONSHIP: Alabama won its SEC-leading 22nd conference football championship when the Crimson Tide beat Florida, 32-13, in the 2009 SEC Championship Game. The Crimson Tide has more SEC Championships than any other school. Alabama won the first SEC Championship during the 1933 season as coach Frank Thomas led the Crimson Tide to 5-0-1 conference record. Thomas led Alabama to four SEC Championships. Paul Bryant directed the Crimson Tide to six national championships and 13 SEC titles during his 25-year run in Tuscaloosa. Alabama won five straight SEC Championships from 1971-75 and captured eight of the 10 SEC Championships from 1970-79. In addition to Thomas and Bryant, Alabama has had four other coaches win SEC Championships, including Harold "Red" Drew (1953), Bill Curry (1989), Gene Stallings (1992) and Mike DuBose (1999). In addition to its 22 SEC Championships, Alabama has also won four Southern Conference titles (1924, 1925, 1926 and 1930), giving the school 25 conference football championships.

ARENAS, JOHNSON & McCLAIN NAMED CAPTAINS: The Alabama football team selected their permanent team captains following the 2009 SEC Championship Game. Senior cornerback Javier Arenas, senior left guard Mike Johnson and junior linebacker Rolando McClain were chosen by a vote of their teammates. The captains will have their hand and foot prints cemented at the base of Denny Chimes prior to the 2010 A-Day Game.

PERFECT RECORD: Alabama ran the table in the 2009 regular season and finished the season with a perfect 8-0 record in SEC play. Since the league split into a divisional format in 1992, nine SEC teams have navigated their way through the conference with a perfect 8-0 mark. Alabama has done it four times (1992, 1994, 2008 and 2009) while Florida has run the table three times (1995, 1996 and 2009). Tennessee went 8-0 in 1998 and Auburn was 8-0 in 2004.

BACK-TO-BACK 8-0 MARKS: With its win over Auburn, Alabama has completed back-to-back perfect seasons in SEC play. With 8-0 records in each of the last two seasons, the Crimson Tide joins the 1995-96 Florida Gators as the only two SEC teams to post consecutive 8-0 seasons since the league expanded to 12 teams in 1992.

16-GAME SEC WINNING STREAK: Alabama's win over Auburn extends the Crimson Tide's conference regular-season winning streak to 16 games after successive 8-0 seasons in 2008 and 2009. Alabama's last loss in an SEC regular season game came in a 17-10 loss at Auburn on Nov. 24, 2007. The current 16-game regular-season SEC winning streak is the longest by an Alabama team since the Tide reeled off 17 straight SEC wins from 1991-93, which included an 8-0 season in 1992. The current 16-game winning streak is the fourth-longest streak in school history. The Tide won an SEC record 27 straight SEC games from 1976-80 and added a 20-game winning streak from 1973-75.

UA TIES RECORD FOR REGULAR SEASON WINS: The Crimson Tide's 12 regular season wins tied an Alabama record for most victories in the regular season. The Tide also won 12 regular season games last year to set the single-season mark for regular season wins. The previous record was 11 regular season wins set in six times, most recently in 1994. The 2009 squad is the eighth Alabama team to win at least 11 regular season games and the first since 1994. The other UA teams to win at least 11 regular season games are 1971 (11-0), 1973 (11-0), 1974 (11-0), 1979 (11-0), 1992 (11-0) and 1994 (11-0). A total of 13 Alabama teams have won 10 regular season games, most recently in 2002 (10-3).

FOURTH QUARTER DOMINANCE: Finishing has been a focus for Alabama over the past two seasons as the Tide has ascended into the nation's elite. And no one in the SEC has been better in the fourth quarter in 2009 than the 13-0 Crimson Tide. Alabama has outscored its opponents 108-24 in the fourth quarter, a margin of 84 points. That number grows to 188-62 in the third and fourth quarters for a margin of 126 points.

10-WIN SEASONS: Alabama's 13-0 record in 2009 gives the Crimson Tide its 30th 10-win season in 115 seasons of football. Alabama's 30 10-win seasons ranks second in college football history behind Oklahoma, which has reached the 10-win plateau 31 times. It is the fourth time this decade in which Alabama has had 10 wins in a season (2002, 2005, 2008 and 2009). Alabama head coach Nick Saban is the 11th coach in school history to lead his team to a 10-win season. In addition, Saban is the fifth coach in school history to have more than one 10-win season. Saban led the Crimson Tide to a 12-2 record last season.

TIDES HAS 10-GAME STREAK FOR 22nd TIME IN HISTORY: Alabama's 13.-game winning streak gives them a winning streak of 10 games or more for the 22nd time in school history, an NCAA record. The last time UA owned a 10-game winning streak came during the 2007-08 seasons when UA reeled off 13 consecutive wins. That streak began with a 30-24 win over Colorado in the 2007 Independence Bowl and continued through the 2008 regular season, ending with a loss to Florida in the SEC Championship Game.

ALABAMA TIED FOR MOST WINS OVER LAST TWO YEARS: Alabama has won 25 games over the past two seasons, which is tied for the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision and sets a new school record. The Crimson Tide won 12 games a season ago and has followed that with a perfect 13-0 record in 2009. Alabama is joined by Florida, Texas and Boise State with 25 wins over the past two years. The previous UA record for wins in back-to-back seasons was 24-combined games in 1991 (11 wins) and 1992 (13 wins).

ALABAMA 28-1 UNDER SABAN WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF: The Crimson Tide is 28-1 when leading at halftime under head coach Nick Saban, including a 21-game winning streak. The only loss came against LSU in 2007 when UA held a 20-17 half-time lead before losing, 41-34, on Nov. 3, 2007, at Bryant-Denny Stadium. The Crimson Tide is 2-5 under Saban when trailing at halftime and 2-2 when tied at halftime. The two wins when trailing at the half came in a 34-24 win over No. 7 Virginia Tech on Sept. 5 in Atlanta and a 24-15 victory over No. 9 LSU on Nov. 7. Alabama's two wins when tied at halftime came at LSU (Nov. 8, 2008) with a 27-21 victory and at Auburn with a 26-21 win on Nov. 27, 2009.

BEST COACHING STARTS: Nick Saban has compiled a 32-8 (.800) record in his career with the Tide and the 32 wins rank as the fourth-most for any Crimson Tide head football coach after 39 games. Wallace Wade and Frank Thomas hold the record for most wins after 39 games with 34 victories while Gene Stallings is third with 33. Xen Scott is fifth with 27 and Paul "Bear" Bryant is sixth with 26 wins at this point in their careers. Below are the most wins by UA coaches after the first 39 and 40 career games.

SABAN JOINS ELITE COMPANY: Alabama head coach Nick Saban has joined Paul "Bear" Bryant as the only coaches in history to win an SEC Championship at two different schools. Bryant won 14 SEC championships during his 33-year SEC career, first at Kentucky (1946-53) in 1951 before winning 13 at Alabama (1958-82). Saban has three SEC Championships, leading LSU to the league title in 2001 and 2003 before his Tide captured the 2009 SEC title. He is one of 12 coaches in SEC history to work at two different SEC schools, joining Mississippi's Houston Nutt and South Carolina's Steve Spurrier as the active SEC coaches on that list.

TIDE CAPTURES 800TH WIN: The storied Alabama football program captured the program's 800th win on Sept. 5 in Atlanta with a 34-24 win over No. 7 Virginia Tech. Alabama is the seventh school in the Football Bowl Subdivision to reach the 800-win plateau. The Crimson Tide holds an 812-316-43 all-time record for a .712 winning percentage that ranks sixth in FBS history. The other six programs to record 800 wins: Michigan (877); Texas (84); Notre Dame (837); Nebraska (825); Ohio State (817); Penn State (809).

FIVE STRAIGHT IN THE SEC: Alabama recently won five straight Southeastern Conference games without a bye for just the second time this decade. Alabama also won five straight SEC games without a bye in 2002. What makes this feat more impressive is that the Crimson Tide is the only SEC team this decade to do it twice. In 2002, UA rolled off five straight wins without a bye week against Mississippi, Tennessee, Vanderbilt, Mississippi and LSU. In 2009, the Tide beat Arkansas, Kentucky, Mississippi, South Carolina and Tennessee. Only Florida, which defeated six SEC opponents in successive weeks earlier this season, has eclipsed that feat.

20 NATIONAL TV GAMES IN LAST TWO YEARS: The BCS National Championship Game against Texas, which will be broadcast on FOX, will be the Crimson Tide's 20th national television game since the start of the 2008 season. UA opened this season with a national ABC broadcast against Virginia Tech and CBS then broadcast the Arkansas, Mississippi, Tennessee, LSU, Auburn and Florida games. ESPN broadcast the Tide's win over South Carolina in Bryant-Denny Stadium and UA's win at Mississippi State. In 2008, Alabama had 10 of its 14 games broadcast nationally, including five games on CBS, three games on ESPN, one on ABC and one on FOX. The 10 nationally broadcast games last year were tied with Notre Dame for the most in the nation.

FIRST-TIME STARTERS: Sixteen Alabama players (10 on offense, 6 on defense) have made their first career starts for the Crimson Tide this season. On defense, senior linebacker Eryk Anders, sophomore defensive back Mark Barron and sophomore defensive lineman Marcell Dareus were first-time starters against Virginia Tech before sophomore free safety Robby Green made his first career start as the Tide employed five defensive backs on the first play of scrimmage against FIU and Courtney Upshaw got his first start at Kentucky. True freshman Nico Johnson made his first start at will linebacker against South Carolina. On offense, junior left tackle James Carpenter, sophomore center William Vlachos, sophomore right guard Barrett Jones, senior tight end Colin Peek, sophomore tight end/H-back Brad Smelley and junior quarterback Greg McElroy made their first starts against Tech. Against FIU, senior running back Roy Upchurch made his first start for the Crimson Tide. Darius Hanks started his first game vs. North Texas and tight end Michael Williams got his first start vs. LSU.

NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw four players selected in the 2009 NFL Draft, including first-round pick Andre Smith, who went to the Cincinnati Bengals with the No. 6 overall pick. Glen Coffee (San Francisco), Antoine Caldwell (Houston) and Rashad Johnson (Arizona) all went off the board in the third round. The four picks were the most for the Tide since five players were taken in 2005.

RETURNING SUCCESS: Much of the talk in the preseason was about Alabama's vaunted defense, and the defensive side of the football is where the Crimson Tide returned the biggest portion of its players from last year's Sugar Bowl team. UA features 15 total returning starters and 55 lettermen this season, but eight of those returning starters are on the defensive side of the football with four on offense and both specialists. The Tide returned 90 percent of its lettermen on defense and 73 percent on offense. The defense returns 84 percent of the tackles (728 of 866) from 2008. The special teams returned almost completely intact with place-kicker Leigh Tiffin, punter P.J. Fitzgerald, snapper Brian Selman and return specialist Javier Arenas.

PRESEASON ALL-AMERICANS: The Crimson Tide had five players earn preseason first-team All-America honors prior to the 2009 campaign. Javier Arenas, Terrence Cody, Mike Johnson, Julio Jones and Rolando McClain have garnered at least one first-team designation. McClain leads the way with six first-team honors.

ALABAMA'S TV RECORD: Alabama has compiled a 189-115-5 (.620) all-time record in 309 televised games. This does not include pay-per-view, tape-delayed or closed circuit telecasts. The Crimson Tide owns a 164-96-3 (.629) record in 263 regular-season televised games.

OVERTIME RECORD: Alabama is 4-7 (.364) all-time in overtime games. In its last overtime game, the Crimson Tide defeated LSU, 27-21, at Tiger Stadium on Nov. 8, 2008. Alabama has lost six of its last nine overtime games. The Crimson Tide is 4-6 (.400) in overtime games against SEC teams. Alabama is 2-4 (.333) in overtime home games. The Crimson Tide is 3-4 (.429) in single-overtime games.

NICK'S KIDS: At Michigan State, head coach Nick Saban and his wife Terry started the "Nick's Kids" Foundation, which the Sabans have continued in Tuscaloosa. Since their arrival at the University of Alabama, the Sabans have helped raise over \$1 million - including over \$300,000 this year - for "Nick's Kids" and made a total of more than 160 donations to children's charities throughout the state of Alabama.

STADIUM RENOVATION: The latest expansion project for Bryant-Denny Stadium will increase seating capacity to approximately 101,000, keeping it among the largest on-campus football stadiums in the nation. The expansion, expected to be completed for the beginning of the 2010 season, will be the fourth expansion of the stadium since 1988 and the seventh expansion in its history. This renovation will mirror the north end zone project completed in 2006 and will add roughly 8,500 seats, 1,700 South Zone Club seats, two corner video boards, an upper concourse with concessions and restrooms, 36 skyboxes, offices, a Donors Hall of Fame and an outdoor market for food and merchandise.

CRIMSON TIDE PLAYERS ON NFL ROSTERS: The Alabama football program was well represented throughout the NFL with the opening of the 2009 season with former players and coaches dotting league rosters. The Tide has 36 former players and coaches working in the NFL this season. The Crimson Tide is also represented on 17 of the league's 30 teams. Four former Alabama players and coaches are with the defending Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers, including defensive back DeShea Townsend and assistant coaches John Mitchell (assistant head coach/DL), Bruce Arians (offensive coordinator/QBs) and Amos Jones (special teams). The Crimson Tide has 21 current NFL players, including 18 on active rosters and two more on practice squads or injured reserve. There are 13 former UA players and/or coaches serving as assistant coaches in the NFL this season, including Sylvester Croom (St. Louis), Freddie Kitchens (Arizona) and Richard Williamson (Carolina).

CRIMSON TIDE OPPONENT NOTES

ALABAMA-TEXAS SERIES: Texas leads the series with Alabama 7-0-1. Alabama and Texas will be meeting for the sixth time in a postseason bowl game when the schools meet in the 2010 BCS National Championship Game. The Crimson Tide and Longhorns also met in the 1948 Sugar Bowl, the 1960 Bluebonnet Bowl, the 1965 Orange Bowl, the 1973 Cotton Bowl and the 1982 Cotton Bowl. Texas is 4-0-1 in bowl games vs. the Crimson Tide. The two teams have also met three times in the regular season, with the last regular-season meeting taking place 87 years ago. Alabama and Texas first met on Nov. 18, 1902, with the Longhorns posting a 10-0 win in Tuscaloosa. The two teams met again in 1915 in Austin, with Texas claiming a 20-0 win. The last time the two teams met in the regular season was on Oct. 28, 1922, when Texas posted a 19-10 win in Austin. In the first of five bowl meetings, Texas guarterback Bobby Layne completed 10-of-24 passes for 183 yards, leading the Longhorns to a 27-7 win in the 1948 Sugar Bowl in New Orleans. The next meeting took place in the Dec. 17, 1960, Bluebonnet Bowl and the teams battled to a 3-3 deadlock. Tommy Brooker's 30-yard field goal gave the Tide a 3-0 lead in the third quarter. Texas tied the game in the fourth quarter on Dan Petty's 20-yard kick with 3:44 left in the game. The teams met again in the 1965 Orange Bowl with Texas winning a controversial 21-17 game. Alabama quarterback Joe Namath scored an apparent game-winning touchdown on a quarterback sneak from the Texas goal line. One official ruled Namath had score, while another ruled he was not in the end zone, leaving the Tide four points short. Alabama and Texas met in the battle of the wishbone offenses the 1973 Cotton Bowl. The Crimson Tide jumped out to a 13-3 halftime lead, but saw Texas score two second half touchdowns for the win. The last time these two teams met came in the 1982 Cotton Bowl, where the Longhorns rallied for a 14-12 win.

ALABAMA-TEXAS NOTEBOOK: The Alabama-Texas football series.

- Alabama and Texas are two of college football's winningest programs with 1,657 all-time wins. Texas is second all-time with 845 wins, while Alabama is sixth all-time with 812 victories.
- Alabama and Texas have combined to win 16 national championships. Alabama has 12 national titles, with its last coming in 1992. Texas has won four national titles, including a 41-38 win over USC in the 2005 BCS National Championship Game at the Rose Bowl.
- The Crimson Tide and Longhorns have combined to win 54 conference football championships. Alabama has 26 conference football championships, including 22 SEC Championships. Alabama is the only SEC school to win an SEC title in every decade since the league was formed in 1933. Texas has won 28 conference titles, including 25 Southwest Conference titles and three Big 12 crowns. Both teams have won at least one conference title in every decade since the 1920s.
- Alabama and Texas have made more bowl appearances than any other teams. The Crimson Tide tops the list with 57 bowl appearances, while the Longhorns are second all-time with 49 appearances.
- The Crimson Tide and Longhorns have combined for 56 bowl wins. Alabama leads all FBS schools with 31 bowl victories, while Texas ranks fourth with 25 bowl wins
- Texas head coach Mack Brown is 0-1 in his career against Alabama. The Crimson Tide defeated Brown's North Carolina Tar Heels, 24-10, on December 31, 1993, at the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla.

- Alabama head coach Nick Saban is 0-1 in his career against Texas. The Longhorns beat LSU, 35-20, in the 2003 Cotton Bowl in Dallas (following 2002 season).
- Texas defensive coordinator Will Muschamp worked in the same capacity under Alabama head coach Nick Saban at LSU (2001-04) and the Miami Dolphins (2005). He was the linebackers coach at LSU in 2001, before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2002. He was the defensive coordinator on LSU's 2003 BCS National Championship team. In 2004, Muschamp was the defensive head coach for the Miami Dolphins under Saban.
- Texas assistant head coach and running backs coach Major Applewhite served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Alabama under Saban in 2007. Applewhite is also named for former Alabama halfback Major Ogilvie, who played on two national championship (1978-79) teams during his four-year career with the Tide.
- Texas associate head coach and offensive line coach Mack McWhorter worked as the offensive line coach at Alabama under Bill Curry in 1987-88.
- The Longhorns are one of eight FBS teams the Crimson Tide has played but never defeated on the football field. The list includes Central Florida (0-1), Minnesota (0-1), Northern Illinois (0-1), Oklahoma State (0-1), Rice (0-3), Utah (0-1) and Wisconsin (0-1).

CRIMSON TIDE BOWL GAME NOTES

ALABAMA SEEKS 13th NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP: The top-ranked Crimson Tide will be playing for its 13th national championship in school history at the 2010 BCS National Championship Game on Thursday, Jan. 7, 2010 in Pasadena, Calif. Alabama has won national championships in 1925, 1926, 1930, 1934, 1941, 1961, 1965, 1966, 1973, 1978, 1979 and 1992. The combined record of the 12 previous national championship teams is 131-6-2.

ALABAMA EARNS NCAA-BEST 57TH BOWL BERTH: The University of Alabama football team makes its NCAA-leading 57th bowl appearance as the Crimson Tide is set to face the Texas Longhorns in the 2010 BCS National Championship Game on Thursday, Jan. 7, 2010, at the Rose Bowl Stadium in Pasadena, Calif. This is Alabama's third BCS bowl appearance and first in the BCS National Championship Game since the current format was introduced in 1998. Alabama has played in more bowl games (57) and earned more bowl wins (31) than any team in college football history. The Crimson Tide has posted a 31-22-3 record in its previous bowl appearances. Alabama is bowling for the sixth consecutive season, something that has not happened since the Crimson Tide played in 10 straight bowl games from 1985-94. UA played in the Music City Bowl (2004), Cotton Bowl (2005), Independence Bowl (2006-07) and the Sugar Bowl (2008) over the past six years. Alabama's bowl history dates back to the Jan. 1, 1926, Rose Bowl. The Tide has played in 16 different bowl games in its storied history. Alabama has played bowl games in 10 different states, including Arizona, California, Florida, Hawai'i, Louisiana, Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Texas. Alabama players have garnered 42 "Most Valuable Player" awards in its 56 previous bowl games. Another 21 players and coaches have been selected to various all-time bowl teams.

No. 1 VERSUS NO. 2 MATCHUPS: The 2009 BCS National Championship Game will mark the 42nd time since the inception of the Associated Press football poll in 1936 that the No. 1 and No. 2 ranked teams have met. Alabama is ranked No. 1 in the latest AP poll, while Texas is ranked No. 2. It is the third No. 1 vs. No. 2 game for the Crimson Tide in the last two years, gong 1-1 in two of those matchups vs. Florida. UA lost when they were ranked No. 1 in the 2008 SEC Championship Game, but won the 2009 SEC title game with a No. 2 ranking. The top two teams have met 22 times during the regular season and 18 times in conference championship game or bowl games. The No. 1 ranked team owns a 24-16-1 all-time record in these matchups. Alabama is playing in its sixth No. 1 vs. No. 2 matchup. Alabama is 3-2 in its previous five games matching No. 1 vs. No. 2 with wins over Penn State (1979 Sugar Bowl), Miami (1993 Sugar Bowl) and Florida (2009 SEC Championship Game) and losses to Nebraska (1972 Orange Bowl) and Florida (2008 SEC Championship Game).

ROSE BOWL NOTEBOOK: Alabama will be making its eighth appearance at the Rose Bowl (Stadium) in Pasadena, Calif., including its seventh post-season bowl game. The Crimson Tide played in the Rose Bowl game in 1926, 1927, 1931, 1935, 1938 and 1946. Alabama was the first southern team to play in the Rose Bowl, when the Crimson Tide beat Washington 20-19 on Jan. 1, 1926. Alabama is 4-1-1 all-time in Rose Bowls, with wins over Washington (1926), Washington State (1931), Stanford (1935) and Southern California (1946). Alabama has also played one regular season game at the Rose Bowl, when the third-ranked Crimson Tide opened the 2000 season with a 35-24 loss to the UCLA Bruins. This is the Tide's first appearance in the BCS National Championship Game at the Rose Bowl.

ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE BOWL HIGHLIGHTS: Below are some highlights of the Crimson Tide's storied bowl history that dates back to the 1925 season.

- Alabama made its bowl debut on Jan. 1, 1926, with a 20-19 come-frombehind win over Washington. The Crimson Tide erased a 12-0 halftime deficit with a 20-point third quarter to earn its first bowl win. Pooley Hubert scored the first touchdown in UA bowl history with a 1-yard run in the third quarter. Johnny Mack Brown had two touchdown receptions (59 yards and 27 yards) in the win.
- •The Tide captured back-to-back national championships with Rose Bowl wins in 1926 and 1927. In fact, the Tide's first five bowl appearances came at the Rose Bowl. Alabama went 3-1-1 in those games with wins over Washington (1926), Washington State (1931) and Stanford (1935).
- UA great Harry Gilmer rushed for 113 yards in the 1946 Rose Bowl win over Southern California. The 113 rushing yards ranks 15th on the NCAA's all-time bowl list for quarterback rushing stats. Gilmer had eight straight pass completions, the ninth-highest total in NCAA bowl history.
- Alabama's Bobby Luna tied the NCAA bowl record with nine extra point attempts

ATLANTA, Ga. - What started as a defensive struggle opened up late in the game with No. 5 Alabama beating No. 7 Virginia Tech 34-24 in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game held in the Georgia Dome.

"Anyone that liked competition liked the game that was played tonight," UA head coach Nick

The two teams traded the lead back and forth throughout the first half with Tech holding a one-point margin over the Tide, 17-16, heading into the locker rooms at halftime. While Alabama was moving the ball offensively and stopping the Hokies defensively in the first half, Virginia Tech's special teams kept them in front in the first half.

After a scoreless third quarter, Alabama built a ten-point lead in the fourth only to have the Hokies cut it to three before the Tide put the game away by scoring a touchdown with 6:35 remaining.

Crimson Tide running back Mark Ingram ran for a career-best 150 yards, including a six-yard touchdown run. He also scored on an 18-yard pass from Greg McElroy, who made his first start and completed 15 passes, including a long of 48 yards, on 30 attempts for 230 yards, a touchdown and an interception. After starting with just two completions on 12 attempts, McElroy went 13-of-18 the rest

Kicker Leigh Tiffin made four of five field goal attempts, including a long of 49 yards on the Tide's first drive. In addition to Ingram's TDs, Roy Upchurch burst into the end zone from 19 yards out for Alabama's first touchdown of the night.

Alabama dominated statistically, rolling up 488 net yards to Tech's 154 with a 14-minute advantage in time of possession and 24 first downs to the Hokies' 12. Alabama's defense had five sacks.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. - Alabama used a balanced attack to rack up more than 500 yards of total offense on its way to defeating Florida International, 40-14, in front of a sellout crowd in the home opener at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

After being held to a 23-yard Leigh Tiffin field goal on its first drive, the Tide reached the end zone on its second possession when McElroy found receiver Mike McCoy for a 24-yard touchdown. On the ensuing kickoff, FIU's T.Y. Hilton returned it 96 yards for a score to bring the Golden Panthers within three points at 10-7.

Tiffin added a second field goal on the first play of the second quarter to extend the Tide lead to 13-7 and tie his father, Van Tiffin, for third place on the career field goals list at Alabama with 59. FIU answered with an eight-play, 60-yard drive capped by a nine-yard touchdown catch by Greg Ellingson to take the lead, 14-13.

Alabama came back quickly, driving 64 yards in five plays on a drive concluded by a two-yard Mark Ingram touchdown plunge to regain the lead at 20-14. The Tide took that lead to the locker room at halftime. McElroy completed 13-of-14 attempts for 203 yards and a score in the first half, and McCoy snatched five passes for 100 yards and a touchdown before intermission.

While McElroy and the passing game did most of the damage in the first half, the second half belonged to the Crimson Tide rushing attack.

Freshman Trent Richardson made his debut at Bryant-Denny Stadium a memorable one with two rushing touchdowns in the second half. Richardson's first score came on a nine-yard carry to take the Tide lead to 26-14 late in the third quarter. Then, following a 49-yard Javier Arenas punt return, Richardson struck again with a 35-yard burst to extend the lead to 33-14 on the first play of the fourth quarter.

Terry Grant tacked on another touchdown with a 42-yard scamper for Alabama's final score. In total, the Crimson Tide ran for 275 yards, 203 of which came in the second half. Richardson finished with 118 yards on 15 carries to lead the team.

McElroy finished the game 18-of-24 passing for 241 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions. McCoy led the team in receiving with five catches for 100 yards. Nine players caught at least one pass for the Tide. The Alabama offense wound up with 516 total yards.

The defense stiffened in the second half, shutting out the Golden Panthers while holding them to 95 yards of total offense. For the game, Florida International managed only one rushing yard. Alabama linebacker Rolando McClain led the team with 10 tackles, and defensive lineman Marcel Dareus had two of the team's five quarterback sacks. Strong safety Mark Barron came up with an interception late in the fourth quarter.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. - Alabama (3-0) dominated North Texas (1-2) on both sides of the ball en route to a 53-7 victory at Bryant-Denny Stadium on a damp afternoon.

Alabama showcased a balanced attack on offense, throwing for 264 yards and grinding out 260 yards on the ground to surpass the 500-yard mark for the second straight game. North Texas finished with 181 yards of total offense with 61 rushing yards while earning only seven first downs.

After a turnover on its first possession, the Alabama offense asserted itself with four straight touchdown drives. Quarterback Greg McElroy got the scoring started with a two-yard scramble that capped a 13-play, 95-yard drive to put the Tide up 7-0.

McElroy went to the air for the Tide's second score, finding receiver Marquis Maze for a 34-yard scoring strike. Alabama's next drive belonged to running back Trent Richardson, who busted a 38-yard run to put the Tide in scoring position then finished the drive with a one-yard dive to give Alabama a 21-0 lead.

Running back Mark Ingram gained 108 yards from scrimmage in the first half, in addition to a 29-yard reception for the Crimson Tide's final touchdown of the half.

Reserve quarterback Star Jackson saw his first significant game action for Alabama on the final possession of the first half and led the Tide down the field to a 35-yard Leigh Tiffin field goal that gave Alabama a 30-0 lead at halftime. Jackson completed 5-of-6 passes on the drive for 30 yards. Alabama piled up 353 yards of total offense before intermission compared to 62 yards for the Mean Green

McElroy came out for one possession in the second half and it turned out to be a short one as the Tide punched in another touchdown on a three-play drive that took less than a minute. Ingram found the end zone on a five-yard run to conclude the quick march.

After McElroy's exit, Jackson kept the offense ticking, leading the Tide down the field on three more scoring drives. Running back Terry Grant cashed in two of those drives with one-yard and nine-yard touchdown runs. Meanwhile, Jackson finished the game 9-of-13 passing for 88 yards.

The Alabama backfield shared the wealth as Ingram, Richardson and Grant each rushed for more than 75 yards and at least one score. Eleven Tide players caught passes, led by Maze with four catches for 49 yards and a score.

North Texas scored its touchdown on a 34-yard pass to Lance Dunbar late in the third quarter with Alabama leading 44-0.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. – A career-high 291 passing yards from quarterback Greg McElroy, combined with a staunch defensive effort, propelled No. 3 Alabama to a convincing 35-7 win over Arkansas in the Southeastern Conference opener for the Crimson Tide at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

Alabama held a 425 to 254 advantage in total offense with five different players scoring, including three touchdown passes from McElroy. The Crimson Tide defense also performed well, allowing just 63 yards on the ground with three sacks, eight tackles for a loss, six quarterback hurries and an interception.

McElroy keyed the offensive output with another solid performance, completing 17-of-24 passes for 291 yards and touchdown strikes of 80, 50 and 14 yards with no interceptions. On the ground, Alabama gained 134 yards, the majority split between Trent Richardson (9 carries, 65 yards) and Mark Ingram (17 carries, 50 yards). Ingram finished the afternoon with 71 total yards of offense and two touchdowns.

Alabama (4-0) jumped out to a 14-0 lead at halftime thanks to scoring plays of 52 and 50 yards. Richardson jump-started the Tide's scoring with a 52-yard touchdown run over right end, breaking four tackles behind the line of scrimmage to spring the big run and give the Tide a 7-0 lead with 9:30 left in the half.

Following another defensive stop, the offense tacked on another touchdown when a direct-snap reverse freed up receiver Julio Jones downfield. McElroy, who received the ball from Terry Grant via Ingram, hit the wide-open Jones for the 50-yard strike to give the Tide a 14-0 halftime lead.

Alabama's defense was the story of the first half, limiting Arkansas to just 101 yards of total offense and forcing the Razorbacks to punt on all seven first-half possessions. The Tide's rush defense was particularly stout, allowing 27 yards on 17 attempts while quarterback Ryan Mallett completed only seven of his 21 attempts for 74 yards. The Arkansas signal caller finished the afternoon 12-of-35 passing for 160 yards with a touchdown and an interception.

Cornerback Javier Arenas led the Tide's first-half defensive effort on the rain-soaked grass with four solo tackles, three of them for losses totaling 25 yards, and two quarterback sacks for his first multi-sack game at Alabama.

Arkansas' lone score came when the Razorbacks took the opening drive of the second half 55 yards in five plays culminating with an 18-yard toss from Mallett to Greg Childs that cut UA's lead to 14-7.

The Tide needed just one play covering 20 seconds to respond to Arkansas' only score as McElroy found a streaking receiver Marquis Maze along the sideline for an 80-yard touchdown completion to take a 21-7 lead with 10:25 left in the third quarter. The Tide defense returned to form on the ensuing series, forcing a three-and-out that allowed the special teams unit to shine.

With Arkansas in punt formation, Lorenzo Washington blocked a Dylan Breeding punt.

Alabama made use of the short field on the fifth play of the series as McElroy, facing a healthy dose of pressure, dumped the ball off to Ingram on a screen pass. A lone block up the sideline allowed Ingram to waltz into the end zone for the first of his two touchdowns on the day.

The Crimson Tide effectively sealed the verdict with its third straight touchdown drive, this one a clock-killing 99-yard march that took 6:28 off the clock before Ingram's two-yard dash ended the day's scoring with 13:12 left in the fourth quarter.

LEXINGTON, Ky. - Running back Mark Ingram ran for a career-high 140 yards and scored a pair of touchdowns and quarterback Greg McElroy threw for two scores, as third-ranked Alabama took advantage of four Kentucky turnovers in a 38-20 victory over the Wildcats at Commonwealth Stadium.

McElroy completed 15-of-26 passes for 148 yards in the victory, to lead Alabama (5-0, 2-0 SEC). Mike Hartline threw for 168 yards with a touchdown on 17-of-31 passing but was picked off three times for Kentucky (2-2, 0-2).

Javier Arenas returned the opening kickoff 60 yards to give Alabama the ball at the Kentucky 37, and three plays later Ingram scored on an 11-yard run for a quick 7-0 lead.

Kentucky's first series ended in an interception that Alabama was unable to convert into points,

Kentucky's first series ended in an interception that Alabama was unable to convert into points, but UK placekicker Lones Seiber drilled a pair of 49-yard field goals to cap the next two Wildcat possessions, making it a one-point game after 15 minutes.

The Alabama offense went dormant after its opening series and momentum appeared to be on Kentucky's side until the Tide scored a pair of touchdowns in a 19-second span.

McElroy engineered a 97-yard drive for the first score.

Alabama converted four third downs during the 13-play march and McElroy connected on 5-of-6 throws to key the drive. He finished it with a three-y-gard toss to tight end Colin Peek for a touchdown and a 14-6 edge with just 40 seconds left in the half.

On the first play after the ensuing kickoff, Locke caught a short pass from Hartline but had the ball knocked out of his hands by Crimson Tide linebacker Rolando McClain. It popped into the air for linebacker Courtney Upshaw, who raced 45 yards the other way for an Alabama touchdown and a 21-6 lead with 21 seconds to play in the half.

Kentucky's first series of the second half ended with an interception by McClain, who returned the pick 21 yards to the Wildcat 38. Ingram scored on a 32-yard run soon after to increase the Alabama lead to 28-6.

Alabama linebacker Eryk Anders then picked off Hartline moments later, giving the Crimson Tide the ball at the Kentucky 47 to set up a 36-yard field goal from Leigh Tiffin.

Kentucky's Randall Cobb scored on a 45-yard touchdown to make it 31-13, but Alabama followed with a 76-yard drive for another score.

Kentucky's Alfonso Smith scored on a two-yard run early in the fourth to account for the final margin.

OXFORD, Miss. – Alabama picked off four Jevan Snead passes and scored twice after special teams miscues to smother Mississippi 22-3. "This was the most complete win we've had all year, in a difficult situation," Alabama coach Nick Saban said. "It's like climbing a mountain. The higher you go the more treacherous it gets."

A strong defensive performance by Mississippi was negated by offensive mistakes and the Rebels never had the kind of consistency needed to rattle one of the nation's top defenses. Alabama couldn't generate much offense against the Rebels defense, but didn't need it. Mark Ingram rushed for 172 yards and the game's only touchdown and Leigh Tiffin hit five field goals, one shy of the school's single-game record.

The Alabama defense made it stand up, forcing Snead into the four interceptions. The Crimson Tide's Cory Reamer also blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a punt return. Snead completed 11 of 34 passes for 140 yards. Twice Alabama defenders ripped the ball away from Rebels receivers who were bobbling it.

Alabama defenders hit Snead on practically every pass attempt in the first half and it showed in the Rebels' production. Alabama held the Rebels to 19 yards and one first down in the first half on the way to a 16-0 lead and allowed them past the 50 just four times overall.

The Rebels' offense was in complete disarray in the first 30 minutes and some of the school-record 62,657 fans booed the home team as it ran off the field. Snead completed just 2 of 12 passes for 14 yards with two interceptions and Alabama held the run-happy Rebels to 5 yards on the ground.

It could have been worse had the Rebels defense not been so good after turnovers. The Rebels forced a field goal with a goal-line stand after Reamer's blocked punt gave Alabama the ball at the 5. But with the Rebels' offense holding the ball for just 8:57 in the first half, Alabama used 47 plays for 237 yards to tire out the Rebels. That helped Ingram score untouched from 36 yards out on fourth-and-1 with 55 seconds left in the half to make it 16-0.

The Alabama defense came up big again late in the third quarter after Reamer stripped Dexter McCluster on a punt return and recovered the fumble, giving the Tide the ball at the Mississippi 40. Ingram picked up its third fourth-down conversion, and then carried the ball to the 3 with a 24-yard run. The Rebels, however, held the Tide to Tiffin's fourth field goal.

After Kareem Jackson returned an interception deep into Rebels territory in the fourth quarter, the Mississippi defense forced a fumble. Rebels defensive backs also knocked two passes away from Julio Jones in the end zone. Mississippi was the fourth of Alabama's six opponents to be held under 88 yards in the first half. The five turnovers against Alabama were more than half Mississippi's season total of nine entering the game.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. - Running back Mark Ingram churned out a career-high 246 yards and the game-clinching touchdown to power the second-ranked Crimson Tide to a 20-6 victory against No. 22 South Carolina.

Ingram's powerful running and a punishing defense helped the Tide (7-0, 4-0 SEC) overcome four turnovers and 10 penalties. Ingram's previous career-high was 172 yards set one week earlier against Mississippi, which also didn't manage a touchdown against the Crimson Tide.

The game's only other touchdown fittingly came from a Crimson Tide defense that sacked Game-cocks quarterback Stephen Garcia five times and kept him firing blanks into the end zone at the end of promising drives. Safety Mark Barron stepped in front of Garcia's first pass attempt in the middle of the field and returned it 77 yards for a touchdown.

South Carolina responded when Garcia and Alshon Jeffrey connected for a 52-yard pass play to the Alabama 16 and an eight-yard completion to Moe Brown set up a first-and-goal from the five. Three plays later, Spencer Lanning rammed a 22-yard field goal between the uprights for a 10-3 game.

A 54-yard Ingram run helped set up Tiffin's 35-yard field goal to give the Crimson Tide a 13-3 lead with 56 seconds on the clock, but Garcia led South Carolina into Alabama territory with runs of 21 and 12 yards, allowing Lanning to connect from 31 yards for a 13-6 score at the half.

South Carolina failed to score off two drives into Alabama territory late in the third quarter. The Gamecocks marched just across midfield on 12 plays before having to punt. Then Clifton Geathers stripped the ball from McElroy to give them back the ball. But the Alabama defense held again and Lanning's 50-yard field goal attempt was short.

The Tide relied on Ingram late in the game. With Alabama leading by only seven with eight minutes to play, Ingram carried the ball on each of Alabama's six plays during a game-changing drive that chewed three-plus minutes off the clock. Runs of 24 and 22 yards set up a first-and-goal on the four and Alabama's workhorse lowered his head on the next play for a clinching touchdown with just under five minutes remaining.

Garcia wound up 20 of 46 for 214 yards, and South Carolina managed just 64 yards rushing. McElroy also was shaky against the nation's sixth-ranked pass defense. His first pass – and two of his initial four – was picked off after he had gone 135 straight passes without an interception. He wound up completing 10 of his 20 attempts for 92 yards. Ingram made up for it on his 24 rushes and also caught two passes for 23 yards.

Both teams were missing key players. South Carolina's second-leading rusher, Jarvis Giles, was suspended. Alabama cornerback and return man Javier Arenas watched from the sidelines with a rib injury that was aggravated before the game.

Tennessee (3-4, 1-3) kept hopes for head coach Lane Kiffin's first major victory with Eric Berry's fumble recovery and quarterback Jonathan Crompton's 11-yard touchdown pass to receiver Gerald Jones with 1:19 left. Then Tennessee's Denarius Moore recovered the ensuing onside kick at the Tennessee 41-yard line with no time outs remaining.

Crompton hit Jones on a 14-yarder before Tennessee was pushed back by a false start. On second down, Crompton hit tight end Luke Stocker for a 23-yard gain to get the Vols into position for the potential game-winning kick.

But Cody and the Crimson Tide defensive line made a big push to enable Alabama to remain in control of its destiny in the national title race.

Tiffin's 49-yarder with 6:31 left had barely cleared the uprights for a 12-3 lead and the decisive points. That came after Cody blocked Lincoln's 43-yard field goal attempt with his left hand.

Tennessee would get new life when Ingram lost the first fumble of his career in 322 touches, giving the Volunteers the ball back at the Alabama 43. All-American safety Eric Berry jarred the ball loose as Ingram was going down, and then recovered it.

Crompton overcame a sack on the first play and completed 4-of-4 passes for 42 yards and the touchdown to make it 12-10, the first touchdown allowed by Alabama in almost 12 quarters of action. Alabama was held without an offensive touchdown for the first time since the Mississippi State game in 2007.

Tennessee outgained Alabama, 341-256, and Crompton was 21 of 36 passing for 265 yards with one interception. Alabama quarterback Greg McElroy was 18 of 29 for 120 yards. Ingram, who emerged as a Heisman Trophy contender the past two weeks, gained 99 yards on 18 carries and surpassed 1,000 yards on the season.

Tennessee got close, but Mount Cody was ultimately too big to kick over.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. – Julio Jones took a wide receiver screen and broke loose for a 73-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter, and No. 3 Alabama locked down No. 9 LSU in a 24-15 victory. Leigh Tiffin booted a 40-yard field goal with 3:04 left to seal the outcome and the Crimson Tide (9-0, 6-0 SEC) earned a rematch with Florida for the league championship. The hard-hitting affair left the Tigers (7-2, 4-2) without injured quarterback Jordan Jefferson and running back Charles Scott for much of the second half.

LSU, whose only other loss came to the Gators, took a 15-10 lead into the fourth but managed only 9 yards in the quarter. They had won four straight games at Bryant-Denny Stadium prior to the defeat, Alabama outgained LSU, 452-253, and narrowed the number of SEC national championship contenders to two.

Greg McElroy completed 19 of 34 passes for 276 yards with two touchdowns and an interception as Alabama aired it out 25 times in the first half against a defense that was putting extra defenders near the line. The second half was more typical of the Alabama offense as running back Mark Ingram gained 106 of his 144 yards after the half to continue to mount a strong campaign for Heisman Trophy consideration. Jones had his best game of the season, with four catches for 102 yards, including his second touchdown.

The Alabama defense came through in the end. Needing two scores, backup guarterback Jarrett Lee and LSU couldn't reach midfield in the final minutes. Alabama hadn't left them much time, milking more than six minutes off the clock in setting up Tiffin's final kick, made possible when a running into the kicker call led the Crimson Tide to go for it on fourth-and-1 at midfield. Ingram got the first down after taking a direct snap.

Tiffin, who became Alabama's all-time leading scorer in the game, also had a 20-yarder early in the fourth after a drive that took nearly six minutes. LSU had failed on a two-point try late in the third quarter, trying to push its lead to seven points. Trent Richardson's two-point run after Jones' touchdown made it a two-score lead for Alabama at the end.

For LSU, Scott ran for 83 yards and his 34-yarder was the longest rushing play given up by Alabama to that point in the season. Jefferson passed for 114 yards and also had some success running the option. Lee was 4 of 10 for 44 yards with an interception on a fourth-down play at the end, and the Tigers were held to 95 yards rushing.

 $LSU's \ defense \ held \ its \ own \ through \ three \ quarters. \ Drake \ Nevis \ sacked \ McElroy \ in \ the \ third \ quarter$ for a safety, cutting Alabama's lead to 10-9. LSU fullback Stevan Ridley bounced off a tackle attempt by nose guard Terrance Cody on an eight-yard touchdown run and a 15-10 Tiger lead. Scott's big run set up the TD, but also ended his day.

STARKVULLE, Miss. - Quarterback Greg McElroy hit three passes of more than 40 yards, including two for touchdowns, to lead Alabama to a 31-3 win over Mississippi State. McElroy was 13 for 18 passing for 192 yards and no interceptions, throwing scoring passes of 45 yards to Darius Hanks and 48 yards to Julio Jones. Running back Mark Ingram ripped off a 70-yard touchdown run as the Crimson Tide (10-0, 7-0 SEC) improved to 10-0 for the second straight year, something that hasn't happened since the 1973-74 seasons.

It marked the 30th time in Alabama's 115 years of football the Tide has reached 10 wins, second only to Oklahoma's 31. Alabama has done it four times this decade. With wins against Tennessee-Chattanooga and Auburn, the Tide could envision taking a 12-0 record into the SEC title game against Florida for the second straight year.

McElroy got the Alabama offense rolling in the second quarter when he found Hanks wide open near the left sideline about 20 yards downfield. Hanks broke a tackle about 10 yards from the end zone and scored. Mississippi State punted on its next possession, and Alabama drove for another score. McElroy's 11-yard pass to Hanks converted a third down, and the Tide picked up a 1st-and-goal when Ingram ran three yards to the Bulldogs' one-yard line. On the next play, Ingram stretched to get the ball across the goal line with 4:41 left as Alabama assumed a 14-0 lead.

Ingram had his helmet knocked off in the process, and with his head exposed, he was cut and remained on the field as trainers attended to him. But after a quick examination, he jogged off the field to be bandaged, and then returned to play in the second half.

Two one-play drives by Alabama ended any Mississippi State hopes. First, McElroy found Jones all alone around the 15 and hit him in stride for his second long scoring pass. Then on the ensuing drive, Ingram found an opening in the middle and accelerated untouched through the Bulldogs defense. The play highlighted an otherwise typically methodical performance by Ingram. In the second period, Ingram scored on a one-yard run to give Alabama a 14-0 lead at halftime. He rushed for 149 yards.

Alabama had the only points of the third quarter, a 39-yard field goal from Leigh Tiffin on the opening drive of the half. Mississippi State got on the board in the fourth quarter, as Derek DePasquale kicked a 34-yarder to end a 15-play drive that consumed nearly seven minutes of game clock. The score came with 10:35 left, but just 17 seconds later, McElroy found Julio Jones for a 48-yard TD and a 24-3 Alabama lead.

The Crimson Tide defense came up with several big plays as well. Safety Mark Barron picked off his SEC leading fifth and sixth interceptions, ending two potential scoring drives. Cornerback Marquis Johnson batted away two potential touchdown passes to O'Neal Wilder, forced a field goal with another strong play in the end zone, and then picked off a pass

The Crimson Tide defense held the Bulldogs to 83 first-half yards and 213 total yards on the night. Only running back Anthony Dixon had sustained success against Alabama with 140 all-purpose yards.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. - Alabama scored five touchdowns on five straight possessions in the first half in a 45-0 shutout of Chattanooga on Senior Day at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

in a 45-0 shutout of Chattanooga on Senior Day at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

Alabama punted on its first and last possessions of the first half, but scored five straight touch-downs on the possessions in between. Running back Trent Richardson got the scoring started with a two-yard run that capped an 11-play drive that included nine running plays.

On Alabama's next possession, quarterback Greg McElroy hooked up with receiver Julio Jones on a deep pass for 44 yards on the first play of the drive and, on the next play, running back Mark Ingram scored from 25 yards out to give Alabama a 14-0 lead.

On Chattanooga's next play from scrimmage, linebacker Cory Reamer intercepted a wide receiver reverse pass from Jare Gault, Reamer's first career interception, giving Alabama good field position at the Mocs' 31-yard line. On the fourth play of the ensuing drive, McElroy cashed in the turnover with a 19-yard strike to Jones, extending the Tide lead to 21-0 as the first quarter came to a close.

Javier Arenas set the tone for the second quarter when he took a Chattanooga punt, darted to the outside, and streaked up the sideline for a 66-yard score on the second play of the quarter to take the Alabama lead to 28-0.

Chattanooga moved into Alabama territory on its next possession, but the Tide defense held on fourth down, forcing a turnover. Once again, the Alabama offense took advantage swiftly. Following three runs by Richardson that netted 22 yards, Ingram broke his second long run of the day, this time a 40-yarder for his second touchdown. The 40-yard scamper was Ingram's final carry of the day. He finished with 102 yards and two touchdowns on 11 carries.

Chattanooga posed its first scoring threat on its next drive, but on fourth-and-six at the Alabama 22, Arenas intercepted a pass and returned it 22 yards to keep the shutout intact as Alabama took a 35-0 lead into halftime.

On the first play from scrimmage of the second half, Alabama safety Justin Woodall intercepted a Chattanooga pass and returned it to the Mocs' 32-yard line. With quarterback Star Jackson at quarterback, the Tide gained one first down to set up a 41-yard field goal by Leigh Tiffin, making the score 38-0. From that point, Alabama turned the game over to the defense. Alabama gave up only 17 yards and one first down in the second half.

Alabama controlled the ball with the running game after halftime, mounting one drive that lasted 19 plays and ate up 10:14 on the clock, including 16 running plays. Alabama running back Roy Upchurch ended the scoring with a 21-yard touchdown run to take the score to 45-0. Upchurch carried 17 times for 70 yards in the game.

For Alabama, McElroy finished 6-of-11 for 80 yards and a touchdown in only one half of action. Jackson completed 4-of-5 attempts for 29 yards with no touchdowns and no interceptions. As a team, Alabama ran for 313 yards on 56 carries. Richardson finished with nine runs for 60 yards, and Demetrius Goode had 11 carries for 70 yards. Linebacker Rolando McClain led the Tide defense with seven tackles.

Twenty-seven seniors were honored on the field before kickoff in their last home game at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

AUBURN, Ala. – Alabama running back Roy Upchurch scored the go-ahead touchdown on a fouryard pass from quarterback Greg McElroy with 1:24 remaining in the game to preserve Alabama's perfect season and defeat rival Auburn, 26-21. With 8:37 left in regulation Alabama started what head coach Nick Saban described as one of the best drives he had seen. The 15-play, 79-yard march consumed 7:03 of game clock while giving the Crimson Tide the deciding points.

After the Tigers held Alabama to three-and-out on the Tide's first possession, Auburn wasted no time striking first on the scoreboard when receiver Terrell Zachery scored on a 57-yard touchdown run off a reverse with 11:40 remaining in the first quarter. Auburn followed that score with a 13-play drive after recovering an onside kick. Chris Todd connected with Eric Smith for a one-yard touchdown pass to put the Tigers up 14-0.

Alabama did not make a first down until Greg McElroy found Darius Hanks for a 15-yard gain with 2:45 remaining in the first quarter. The Tide continued to move the ball, eventually scoring on Trent Richardson's two-yard rush on the 10th play of the drive. McElroy later connected with tight end Colin Peek on a 33-yard touchdown pass with 5:31 remaining in the second quarter. Leigh Tiffin's extra point tied the game at 14-14.

Auburn regained the lead on its second offensive possession of the second half when Todd completed a 72-yard pass to receiver Darvin Adams, putting the Tigers up 21-14 with 11:05 left in the third quarter. The Crimson Tide began its comeback when Leigh Tiffin punched through a 27-yard field goal, closing the margin to 21-17. On the ensuing Auburn possession, Alabama safety Mark Barron intercepted a Todd pass on the Auburn 41 and returned it to the 35-yard line. Alabama moved to within one point when Leigh Tiffin made his second field goal of the day, from 31 yards out, drawing the Crimson Tide within a point at 21-20.

After the Alabama defense kept the Tiger offense off the board on its next two possessions, the Tide offense took the field for what will go down as one of the best drives in Iron Bowl history. With 8:34 remaining in the fourth quarter the Alabama offense drove to within scoring range. On third-and-goal from the Auburn four, McElroy connected with Roy Upchurch on a play-action pass capping one of the most memorable of recent Alabama history.

DEFENSIVE LEADERS

ATLANTA, Ga. - Alabama regained its place atop the Southeastern Conference with an impressive, dominating 32-13 victory over Florida in the SEC Championship Game. The victory took Alabama to within one win from its first national championship since 1992.

Running back Mark Ingram rushed for 113 yards and three touchdowns. Quarterback Greg McElroy was 12 of 18 for 239 yards and a touchdown and No. 2 Alabama rekindled memories of Paul "Bear Bryant with the convincing victory. With the win, Alabama (13-0) moved on to Pasadena for the BCS championship game. Florida quarterback Tim Tebow and the Gators (12-1) were denied a shot at their third national title in four years, including their second consecutive

Tebow, who came back for his senior year in hopes of winning another title, was 20 of 35 for 247 yards but his last gasp was picked off in the end zone. Alabama held the ball for nearly 40 minutes and piled up 490 yards against a defense that was ranked No. 1 in the country, allowing less than 10 points and about 233 yards per game.

Alabama led all the way, establishing its will on the very first drive. In the second half, Alabama shut Florida down, making up for its loss in last year's SEC title game. Trailing 19-13 at the half, Florida took the third-quarter kickoff and came up a yard short on Tebow's third-and-7 pass to Riley Cooper. The Gators didn't know it at the time, but it was over.

Ingram carried three straight times before McElrov went down the right sideline to Maze for a 28yard pass. A costly penalty on Jermaine Cunningham for shoving McElroy in the back two steps after the quarterback threw the ball away set up a perfect throw and catch.

McElroy rolled to his right, stopped suddenly and lofted the pass in the other direction, the ball dropping over Colin Peek as he extended his arms to haul in a 17-yard touchdown. Ingram finished the drive with his third score early in the fourth, powering over from the 1 to cap an 88-yard drive; Alabama's longest of the season.

Tebow, who came back for his senior year in hopes of winning another title, was 20 of 35 for 247 yards but his last gasp was picked off in the end zone. Ingram passed Bobby Humphrey for the school rushing record in a season (1,542 yards) and augmented his performance with a 69-yard reception on

McElroy was nearly flawless against Florida, with his legs as well as his arm. He hopped on one leg along the sideline to pick up a crucial first down, and he set up Ingram's final touchdown with a bobbing, weaving run to just short of the end zone.





The Rose Bowl January 1, 1926 Alabama 20, Washington 19

PASADENA, Calif. — Trailing 12-0 at halftime, Coach Wallace Wade's Alabama team battled back in the second half to capture a thrilling 20-19 win over Washington in the Crimson Tide's first bowl outing. It was a game that is still remembered as one of the all-time finest and the Tide victory brought new and permanent respect from all sections for Southern football.

Washington's great halfback, George Wilson, was everything he had been billed as being. He carried the ball for 134 yards, completed five passes for 77 yards and two touchdowns. But Alabama put him out of the game for 22 minutes with injuries and it was during those 22 minutes that the Crimson Tide scored all of its points.

Wilson missed the third quarter, and that's when Alabama scored its 20 points, all in seven minutes. First it was Pooley Hubert scoring from the one with Bill Buckler kicking the point after. After holding Washington and forcing a punt, Grant Gillis faded back from his own 41 and found Johnny Mack Brown at the Husky 25.

"All I had to do was sidestep one man and I was across," remembers Brown.

A fumble gave Alabama another chance at the Washington 30. On first down Hubert told Brown to run as fast as he could for the goal. "When I reached the three, I looked around," says Brown. "Sure enough, the ball was coming down over my shoulder. I took it in stride, used my stiff arm on one man and went over carrying somebody. The place was really in an uproar."

Washington scored a final time in the fourth quarter, but they couldn't overcome Bama's lead. And Alabama was off and running to Bowl history.

The Rose Bowl January 1, 1927 Alabama 7, Stanford 7

PASADENA, Calif. — Wallace Wade was invited to return with Alabama for the 1927 renewal after another perfect season. His great backs of 1925 were gone and he was not wealthy in reserves.

It was a team with some unusually colorful nicknames: for example, Lovely Barnes, Goofy Bowdoin, Snake Vines and Rosy Caldwell.

The bowl was packed with 57,417. Gross receipts were \$218,047 — the highest ever. Approximately \$100,000 was refunded.

Stanford scored first, George Bogue passed five yards to end Ed Walker, who ran the remaining 15 yards for a touchdown. Bogue then kicked the point after and Stanford held its 7-0 first quarter lead until the final period.

With just four minutes to go, Alabama blocked a Stanford punt with center Clarke (Babe) Pearce leaping through to deflect the ball. Bama took over on the Stanford 14.

Into the game went 170-pound Jimmy Johnson at halfback. A dislocated shoulder had prevented him from playing much. First it was Wu Winslett getting three yards, then Johnson knifing forward for seven. Winslett smashed to the one. Then Johnson banged into right guard, the resistance crumpling under his charge. It was 7-6 now. A ruse was coming up next.

As the teams lined up for the crucial extra point attempt with the crowd respectfully hushed, Captain Emile Barnes barked signals. Suddenly someone shouted "signals off." Stanford's line stood at ease in anticipation of another signal sequence. At that moment center Gordon Holmes snapped the ball to Winslett who touched it down. Unrushed and with plenty of time. Herschel Caldwell smoothly kicked it through the posts and over the bar.

The 7-7 game ended three plays later.

The Rose Bowl January 1, 1931 Alabama 24, Washington State 0

PASADENA, Calif. — This was Wallace Wade's last Alabama team before he left for Duke and it typified the personality of the coldly efficient strategist. Alabama crushed Washington State, 24-0, before 60,000.

Wade announced on New Year's Eve that he planned to start his second team. The writers were incredulous. But Wade, who felt Alabama was two touchdowns better, meant it and in fact did open with his second unit.

The Cougars held the upper hand most of the first quarter but didn't come close to scoring. Late in the period Wade inserted his first string and things began to pop.

After 13 straight plays on the ground, from its own 39, Bama's left end Jimmy Moore returned and sped into his own backfield. He received the ball from fullback John Cain, took a few more steps and spiraled a long pass downfield. Left halfback John (Flash) Suther, galloping at high speed, gathered it in smoothly on the Washington State 22. In a flash he was in the end zone.

Bama center Jess Eberdt intercepted a
Cougar pass on the WSU 47. Moore again passed,
hitting end Ben Smith on the Cougar one. Monk
Campbell powered in for the score.

Lightning struck quickly the next time Alabama got the ball. Campbell, on a beautifully setup fake to Moore, shot through left guard. He wriggled free of a State man's clutches and bolted 43 yards to score. These 21 points had come within a stretch of six minutes of the second quarter.

Wade's second team was on the field in the third quarter when the final points were registered. Guard J. B. (Ears) Whitworth, later head coach at Alabama, kicked a field goal from the 30.

The Rose Bowl January 1, 1935 Alabama 29, Stanford 13

PASADENA, Calif. — "Dixie Howell, the human howitzer from Hartford, Ala., blasted the Rose Bowl dreams of Stanford today with one of the greatest all-around exhibitions football has ever known," was the lead written by all-time great Grantland Rice.

Alabama blasted Stanford, 29-13, with Howell teaming with the incomparable pass catching end, Don Hutson, to electrify the crowd of 84,474 with a 22-point second guarter outbreak.

In those 15 minutes Alabama amassed 150 yards on passes and another 106 on the ground. Howell himself gained 96 yards in the air on four completions to Hutson and three more to end Paul (Bear) Bryant. Dixie also ran 96 yards, including a sensational 67-yard spring for a touchdown.

Alabama had the ball for four plays in the first quarter and made four yards. Stanford recovered a Tide fumble on the 27 yard line and drove for a score with Bobby Grayson pounding right tackle for the final foot.

Howell scored from the five early in the second quarter to tie the game. Stanford, though, chose to kickoff to show Bama's scoring was a fluke. On fourth down with the ball on the Stanford six, Hutson held while Riley Smith kicked a 22-yard field goal. Now it was 9-7, and Stanford kicked off again.

Two plays later Howell swung to his right and swerved for the sidelines. He ran 67 yards and the crowd was on its feet, agog at this masterly piece of running.


The Howell to Hutson battery was quiescent until the early part of the fourth quarter. From the Alabama 41 it struck. Don caught Dixie's long spiral on the Stanford 30 and whizzed for his second touchdown.

When Howell left the field late in the game after a 52-yard punt , he had gained 111 yards running, 160 yards passing (nine completions in 12 attempts) and had punted six times for an average of 43.8 yards.

"No team in the history of football, anywhere, anytime, has passed the ball as Alabama passed it today," wrote Ralph McGill in the Atlanta Constitution. "And no man ever passed as did Dixie Howell, the swift sword of the Crimson attack."

The Rose Bowl January 1, 1938 California 13, Alabama 0

PASADENA, Calif. — Frank Thomas' 1937 Alabama team was not one of his best, but none was better coached or accomplished quite so much with what it had.

The Crimson Tide experienced several close calls. Sandy Sanford literally kicked his team to Pasadena. In the game with Tulane, Sanford booted a late fourth-quarter field goal of 32 yards when Alabama had only six men on the line of scrimmage. The illegal formation was undetected by officials. The Tide won, 9-6. Sanford beat Vanderbilt 9-7 with another late-game field goal.

In the Rose Bowl, there was no opportunity for Sanford's heroics. Alabama was subdued 13-0.

California, coached by Leonard B. (Stub)
Allison, demonstrated too much power and
speed, better balance, and some exceptionally skilled and rugged players in center Bob
Herwig, end Perry Schwartz, quarterback Johnny
Meek, guard Vard Stockton, and halfback Sam
Chapman, the latter soon to become a major
league outfielder.

But the star of the game was Vic Bottari, a junior tailback who started his career as a virtual nonentity on the Golden Bear squad. Bottari scored both touchdowns against Alabama on almost identical plays in the second and third quarters, quick, well-escorted trips around right end of three and five yards respectively.

California punched over touchdown No. 1 to culminate a 63-yard 12-play land march. Alabama couldn't check driving, brutal power smashes accompanied by paralyzing blocking. The Bears hammered out No. 2, pushing the Tide 48 yards in nine whacks in much the same fashion. No passes were thrown on this scoring sweep as well.

Alabama lost the ball on fumbles four times and suffered four pass interceptions. One scoring opportunity was muffed on the California one and another on the six, both on fumbles. The Bears tackled with crunching, stunning force.

"It was a heartbreaker," said Alabama captain Leroy Monsky. "I still try to blank it from my mind."

A check for \$104,129.94 from gross receipts of \$293,372.61 helped to ease some of the grief felt by the Alabama party.

The Cotton Bowl January 1, 1942 Alabama 29, Texas A&M 21

DALLAS, Texas — It wasn't a very festive atmosphere, since most of the nation was thinking about World War II, but Alabama's opportunist Crimson Tide whipped Texas A&M 29-21 under very bizarre circumstances.

The Tide made only one first down. A&M had 13. Bama picked up only 75 yards total offense, as opposed to 309 for the Aggies. The Tiders clicked on just one pass while A&M completed 13 and Bama ran just 32 plays as opposed to 79 by the Texans.

Yet the Tide led 29-7 midway in the fourth quarter, held off an Aggie rush at the end and wound up with one of the most amazing bowl wins ever.

The significant statistics were seven Alabama pass interceptions and five fumble recoveries, for a total of 12 turnovers against A&M.

A&M scored first, Chal Daniels passing to Bob Crowley. Later in the second quarter Daniels fumbled and Don Whitmire recovered on the Aggie 24. Jimmie Nelson passed to Holt Rast for 16. Two passes failed. On a no-shift play, Nelson reversed to Russ Craft for an eight-yard score.

In the third quarter Nelson returned a punt 72 yards to put Bama ahead. In the same quarter Nelson punted to Daniels who fumbled, with Sam Sharpe grabbing it for the Tide on the A&M 21. Nelson quickly scored, romping 21 yards around right end.

In the final period another A&M interception put Alabama in business on the Aggie 17. George Hecht wound up kicking a 31-yard field goal to make it 23-7.

Alabama's final score was another unique play. A&M had the ball and Derence Moser passed, had it tipped into the hands of Holt Rast who jogged 10 yards into the end zone. It was 29-7. The Aggies scored twice in the fourth quarter to narrow the gap, but the alert Tidesmen won the only statistical battle that counted — the score.

MIAMI, Fla. — Stung by two first quarter Boston College touchdowns, Alabama's All-American center Joe Domnanovich called his team into a huddle as they awaited a kickoff. "Don't give up," he said, simply but firmly. "We haven't had a chance to go with the ball yet. We're going to receive and we're going to run them into the ground."

Twenty minutes later, at halftime, Alabama was in front, 22- 21, and won the game, 37-21.

Mike Holovak, the Eagles' swift-striding right halfback, scored on runs of 65 and 35 yards to put Boston College in front early. Then Bama went to work.

Russ Craft, Dave Brown, Johnny August and Russ Mosley tore off big chunks of turf and the Eagle defense caved in. Bobby Tom Jenkins raced 40 yards for one score. Boston College made a comeback effort and went ahead 21-19 just before halftime but George Hecht booted a 25-yard field goal to put Bama on top, 22-21 at intermission. The Tide added 15 more points in the second half.

Wheeler Leeth scored on a 14-yard pass from Mosley, Ted Cook grabbed a 17-yard scoring aerial from August, Jenkins scored twice on runs of 40 and one, and August faked a pass and ran around right end for a 15 yard score. Hecht kicked a field goal and two extra points and Domnanovich even put two points on the board by tackling an Eagle in the end zone for a safety.


The Boston press treated the game from an unbiased standpoint.

Bill Cullingham, widely respected columnist for the Boston Post, wrote, "When you're beaten as clearly and as splendidly as was Boston College today, the only thing to do is stand and salute as the victors go by. It was a fine game, played in the truest tradition of sportsmanship, brilliantly won and gallantly lost in a magnificent setting, so in taste with the times that none who saw it will ever forget it."

NEW ORLEANS, La. — If you said the 1945 Sugar Bowl game was charged with drama every minute, it wouldn't be much of an exaggeration.

The lead changed four times. The outcome was uncertain until the last second. The heart-throbbing finish pulled 72,000 people out of their seats

In the last analysis, it was the power and experience of Duke's Navy trainees that prevailed over Alabama's inspired wartime civilian group, 29-26.

Harry Gilmer hit the tough Duke line hard for important gains and made many tackles, personally downing the Blue Devil ball carrier after every kirkoff

One pass in particular stood out. Forced far back, Harry tripped over one Duke man. Two more Blue Devils got a piece of him. Suddenly, he broke loose for an instant, leaped high, and whipped the ball 41 yards to Ralph Jones, a big end.

In bowl history never has one so young performed so brilliantly.

On the last play he fired another long pass to Jones, who just missed going for a touchdown on a 33-yard gainer to Duke's 25.

Duke led early, 7-0, but Gilmer's aerial craft set up three Crimson Tide touchdowns before Duke could score again, making it 19-13 at halftime

Trailing 20-19 early in the 4th quarter, Alabama threw back the Blue Devils on the Tide 12. But they surged forward again, this time with Hugh Morrow intercepting a Cliff Lewis pass and running 75 yards for the score.

Duke took the kickoff and wasn't stopped until the goal line was a yard away.

until the goal line was a yard away.

With three minutes remaining, Coach Frank
Thomas took a calculated risk and sent in orders
to give up two points through an intentional
safety. Thomas hoped for a long high punt from
the 20 by John Wade, who would have plenty of
time.

The strategy backfired. The punt sailed 40 yards. Clark returned it 20 yards to Alabama's 40. The Blue Devils cracked the Tide defense for the touchdown in two inspired runs.

The Rose Bowl January 1, 1946 Alabama 34, Southern California 14

PASADENA, Calif. — This was Alabama's sixth and final trip to the Rose Bowl and although the Crimson Tide had enjoyed great success against the West Coast powers, a lot of coast writers and fans always said, "but you've never played Southern Cal." You didn't hear much of that commentary after this one. Bama won, 34-14.

At halftime, Alabama led 20-0. Troy's 21 plays had resulted in a net loss of 24 yards. Not until the score was 27-0 in the third quarter did Southern Cal make a first down.

Alabama's "wooden horse" toppled the men of Troy like no team ever before. Southern Cal had won eight straight Pasadena battles since 1923. Fortunately, Coach Frank Thomas was merciful. For Thomas it was his last bowl trip as a coach. His health began to fail in 1946 and he was forced to give up coaching in 1947. He died May 10, 1954.

Alabama outgained USC 351 to 41. Troy's pitiful running offense netted just six yards.


Harry Gilmer, the Crimson Tide's extraordinary passer, threw only 11 times, resulting in one touchdown. But he ran for 116 yards on 16 carries. Hal Self scored twice, sneaking over from the one and on a 24-yard Gilmer pass. Gilmer went over from the one, and Lowell Tew hit left guard from the two for points and Norwood Hodges scored up the middle on a one-yard plunge. Hugh Morrow kicked four extra points.

The great bowl victory assured Coach Thomas a place among the all-time greats. Captain Tom Whitley 15 years later remarked: "Coach Thomas' system would go today. He used innovations no scout could capture with notes and against which no defense could be surely set."

The Sugar Bowl January 1, 1948 Texas 27, Alabama 7

NEW ORLEANS, La. — It is a peculiar fact that some of the most celebrated backs in the Southeastern Conference came to grief in New Orleans in their final game. Names coming to mind of those so ill-fated are Billy Cannon (1960), Johnny Majors (1957), Hank Lauricella (1952), and Harry Gilmer (1948).

Three years before, Gilmer, the Alabama sharp-shooter, had heard the multitudes roar of applause in the Sugar Bowl. It was a far cry from the reaction of 72,000 fans who saw Texas thwart Gilmer and the Crimson Tide, 27-7, in 1948. He completed only three of his 11 passes and ran for a mere five yards. By his own evaluation it was the worst day of his college career.

Loudest cheers went to Texas quarterback Bobby Layne. He sent the ball aloft 24 times and made connections ten times for gains totaling 183 yards. Ground attacks were virtually non-existent. Alabama was restricted to 41 yards. Texas to 59 rushing.

The Tide was not outplayed to the extent the score would indicate. The difference could have been a touchdown. The first half ended in a 7-7 standoff. Texas' last three touchdowns were achieved by their defense. Bama committed three expensive errors, having a punt blocked, having a pass intercepted and run back for a touchdown and losing a fumble in its own territory.

The entire left side of the Longhorns' line swarmed into the backfield when Norman Mosley tried to punt from Alabama's 25 in the third quarter. Left tackle George Petrovich blocked the kick and left guard Vic Vasicek recovered in the end zone for a touchdown.

Alabama appeared to wilt after that but displayed the heart to stall Texas drives twice within its 10. Then with six minutes left and the Tide gambling to tie or win, Gilmer was rushed hard and threw almost despairingly over oncoming Longhorns' upraised arms. End Lewis Holder intercepted Harry's soft, short, high pitch. Texas scored again and led, 20-7. A few plays after that, Holder pounced on a Gilmer fumble five yards from another touchdown. Layne scored on a sneak.

Some years later, Gilmer said, "I wouldn't swap the experiences, the thrills, the friendships and fellowships made in bowl games for anything."

The Orange Bowl January 1, 1953 Alabama 61, Syracuse 6

MIAMI, Fla. — New Year's Day, 1953, was the first on which football fans could see, through the medium of television, bowl games in Pasadena, Dallas, New Orleans, and Miami. Receipts increased greatly with bigger checks for competing schools and their conference brethren.

Alabama crushed Syracuse, champion of the East, 61-6, in the Orange Bowl. Many in the crowd of 66,280 left in the third quarter so they could see more of other bowl games on TV at home.

Because the game was lasting so long, an Orange Bowl committee-man reportedly approached the timekeeper and suggested the game, nearly three hours old at the time, might be speeded up because it was about to be cut off the network.

Fifteen records were set in the fiasco. Even the deepest Alabama substitutes among the 46 Crimson Tide players were record-minded. "We didn't want to leave any still standing," explained tackle Van Marcus.

Alabama rushed for 286 yards and passed for 300. Its total offense of 586 yards and the sum of 818 for both teams were among the Orange Bowl records.

It was a close contest for a quarter when Alabama led, 7-6. After two periods the score was 20-6. And in the second half, "I just couldn't stop them," said Coach Harold (Red) Drew, a native of Maine who came to Alabama as end coach under Frank Thomas and developed Don Hutson, Paul Bryant, and Holt Rast, among others.


Bobby Marlow, who scored the Tide's second touchdown, was one of the finest running backs in Southeastern Conference history. In three years he gained 2,560 yards. That was 693 yards more than the next highest total in the conference in the 1950-59 period made by Billy Cannon of Louisiana State. But Marlow was not picked on the all-decade team in the conference.

Soon after the game the Orange Bowl committee signed contracts with the Big Eight (then Big Seven) and the Atlantic Coast Conference. Their representatives met for the next five years.

"I'm too emotional," he told a reporter. "I kept telling myself, 'I didn't do it. I didn't do it.' But I knew I had.

"I'm just too full of 'Bama. He just ran too close. I know I'll be hearing about this the rest of my life."

What Tommy Lewis, Alabama fullback, had done before 75,504 spectators in the 1954 Cotton Bowl game was the nearest thing to the wrongway run by Roy Riegels 25 years before.

Rice was leading, 7-6, midway in the second quarter. The Owls were in possession on their own 5. Alabama had just muffed a scoring opportunity.

Left halfback Dickie Moegel's signal was called. Taking a hand-off from quarterback LeRoy Fenstemaker, he turned right end as his blockers did their job efficiently and headed for the Alahama goal line.

As Megle approached midfield near the sidelines in front of the Alabama bench, it appeared no player could stop him. No one, that is, except Lewis, who was on the bench, and suddenly ran onto the field barehanded, and threw his body into Moegle's legs. Moegle was felled on Alabama's 41. Referee Cliff Shaw awarded a touchdown to Rice. Moegle was credited with a 95-yard run.

Although Tide coach Harold (Red) Drew said the Lewis incident had no demoralizing effect on his team, the Southeastern Conference champions were never the same again. A letdown was evident. Rice went on to smash Alabama, 28-6.

It was Lewis who plunged the final foot for a touchdown on a 47-yard advance in the first quarter.

Rice went ahead on Moegle's 79-yard scamper followed by Fenstemaker's extra point. Dick scurried 34 yards for another touchdown in the third period. He gained 265 yards of his team's whopping 379 rushing. He carried the ball only 11 times, averaging 24.1 yards. After this game Moegle held four Cotton Bowl records and three all-time major bowl records.


At the half Lewis went directly to the Rice dressing room to ask if apologies would be accepted.

"My heart went out to him," Rice coach Jess Neely said. "I told him, 'Don't let it bother you."

The Liberty Bowl December 19, 1959 Penn State 7, Alabama 0

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — Perhaps it was fitting that this was the 13th bowl appearance by an Alabama team. Penn State bested Alabama, 7-0, before 36,211 frigid spectators. But it was the start of something that ran for 24 straight years — that of Paul William (Bear) Bryant taking an Alabama team bowling.

"We weren't a real strong team," says Bryant, "but that team would hit you. We had the makings of something good a couple of years later and it was important for them to get started in the bowl business."

The play that beat Alabama was one that Penn State coach Rip Engle put in just two days before the game. It was a fake field goal, quickly sprung and well executed, as the clock ran out ending the first half.

A 20-mile-an-hour gale held up punts all afternoon and Tommy White's punt just before halftime went only three yards. With the ball on Alabama's 18, second-down and six yards to go, Penn State went into field goal formation without huddling. Quarterback Galen Hall knelt on the 25. Guard Sam Stellatella stood ready to kick. Hall took a high snap, rose and rolled to his right. Roger Kochman took the pass near the 20 and bolted for the goal line, charging behind a convoy of teammates. He was tripped near the end zone but fumbled it in.

"We were fortunate not to be beaten by four or five touchdowns," said Bryant. "We just got a good sound thrashing."

HOUSTON, Texas — A unique field-goal standoff left 68,000 fans neither happy nor hurt as Texas and Alabama fought to a 3-3 tie in the 1960 Bluebonnet Bowl defensive struggle.

It was a strange contest from this standpoint, too: if the Longhorns of Texas had won, they would have done so on a play that began after time had officially expired.

End Tommy Brooker kicked a 30-yard field goal to put Alabama in the lead in the third quarter when a drive stalled on the Texas 13.

Texas' Dan Petty, a third-team tackle, booted the equalizer with 3:44 remaining.

With 28 seconds to go, Texas took possession of the ball on its 48. An Alabama pass, thrown on fourth down, was complete. But it failed to make the required yardage. No doubt existed about what Texas would do.

The Crimson Tide secondary defense broke up Johnny Genung's first long fling. Alabama's Leon Fuller and Texas end Bob Moses both jumped for Genung's second lengthy throw. The big clock's second half stopped at zero. Part of the crowd flocked onto the field thinking the game had ended. But a handkerchief had been dropped. Interference was called against Fuller. Since a game cannot end on a penalty, Texas was awarded another play.

The ball was placed on Alabama's 18. It would be a field-goal try, of course. Thumped from the 25 by Petty, who in the third quarter had missed from the same spot, it was wide to the left. Earlier — late in the first quarter, Bobby Skelton tossed a look-in pass to end Bill Rice, who took it on the Texas 40 and ran to the seven before David Russell overhauled him. It was a 49-yard run.

On third down from the three, Skelton cut in at left tackle. Millions watching on television thought he had carried the ball across the goal line before being halted. So did many at the game.

"I was in there," Skelton said. "I had chalk all over my jersey when I got up." A moment later, fullback Bobby Richardson was stopped within an inch or two of scoring. "Naturally, we all were hoping that last kick by Petty would go through," said Texas coach Darrell Royal. "But it would have been a shame to win it that way. I think the score was indicative of the comparative strength of the two teams."

The Crimson Tide team, too, was hopeful, but the call never came from Pasadena, and Alabama's Bear Bryant took his undefeated National Championship team to New Orleans to face a tough Arkansas team. The Tide barely escaped with a 10-3 victory.

Starting a drive on its own 21, Alabama fullback Mike Fracchia, a high stepper with terrific drive, burst through two tacklers' arms and sped 43 yards to the Arkansas 12 before being halted. Pat Trammell carried the ball on the next play, rolling wide to the left and through tackle. As teammates obliterated all opposition, Trammell ran unhindered into the end zone.

Placekick specialist Tim Davis toed a 32-yard field goal in the second quarter. A fumble, a missed field goal try and a holding penalty after a successful third quarter effort by the Tide kicking expert thwarted other penetrations.

Mickey Cissell got the Razorbacks on the scoreboard in the third quarter with a 23-yard placement.


Late in the game standout halfback Lance Alworth had a touchdown pass trickle off his fingertips that might have turned the game around.

Bryant was proud of his team. "Regardless of who was coaching them, they still would have been a great team. I said early in the season that they were the nicest, even the sissiest bunch I'd ever had. I think they read it, because later on they got unfriendly."

Alabama allowed only 22 points and didn't allow their goal line to be crossed in the last seven games.

MIAMI, Fla. — In the Alabama dressing room after the Crimson Tide's 17-0 Orange Bowl victory over Oklahoma, a photographer asked Coach Paul Bryant to spell the name of a player whose picture he had just taken.

"That's Namath, son — N-A-M-A-T-H," Bryant said. "But don't worry about it. You'll learn how to spell it in the next couple of years."

If the cameraman was unfamiliar with the name, the crowd attending the 1963 Orange Bowl game and those watching on television were not.

Long before that game, Bryant said the precocious young man from Pennsylvania was ahead of Babe Parilli (whom he coached at Kentucky) as a sophomore. He rated Namath "potentially the finest quarterback I've ever coached."

Namath piloted his team 61 yards in ten plays for a touchdown in the first quarter. From the Oklahoma five, he faked a handoff and a short pass, whirled, and sailed a long pass into end Dick Williamson's hands in the end zone.

A sleight of hand pitch-out to halfback Cotton Clark resulted in a 15-yard scoring sprint in the second period. It was the third play after Billy Piper returned a punt by Joe Don Looney to the Sooners' 34. First, Namath threw a pass to Williamson, good for 20 yards. Clark's touchdown was his sixteenth of the year.

Namath conducted a Tide drive from Oklahoma's 33 to the two-yard line. On fourth down, Tim Davis, Bama's placekicking specialist, toed a 19-yard field goal. This third-quarter opportunity arose when Looney, the nation's leading punter with an average of 43.4 yards, was hurried by guard Frankie McClendon's rush and got off a kick of only seven yards.

The Sooners were hounded all day, most notably by Bama linebacker Lee Roy Jordan.

Perhaps nobody else in college football in 1962 had his almost instinctive ability to seek out the ball carrier so quickly and bring him down so abruptly. It is doubtful if Bryant ever praised a player quite as much. Jordan finished the game with an Alabama bowl record 31 tackles.

Fifteen seniors finished the best three years (29-2-2) Alabama ever knew in football. Only a matter of inches, the distance by which Jack Hurlbut failed to make a two-pointer after the only touchdown against Georgia Tech (Tech won, 7 to 6), apparently separated the Tide from two straight national championships.

January 1, 1964 Alabama 12, Mississippi 7

NEW ORLEANS, La. — Everyone knew that this wasn't just an ordinary Sugar Bowl game. It snowed on the eve of the game and that was just the first of some unusual occurrences.

With junior standout quarterback Joe Namath suspended for disciplinary reasons, sophomore Steve Sloan, showing the poise and savvy of a veteran, guided the Crimson Tide to a 12-7 victory over the heavily favored Mississippi Rebels, but it took four Tim Davis field goals to turn the trick.

Davis' kicks of 31, 46, 22 and 48 vards earned the Columbus, Ga., senior the Outstanding Player award. His four field goals were a bowl record and his 48-yarder was the longest in bowl history.


It was 3-0 after the first quarter, 9-0 at halftime and 12-0 going into the final quarter. Mississippi finally got on the scoreboard when Larry Smith took a five-yard pass from Perry Lee Dunn. Billy Irwin kicked good and it ended just that way, 12-7, Alabama.

With snow piled on the edge of the playing field, The Tide put on a great display of how to win under adversity. The alert Crimson gobbled up six Mississippi fumbles and intercepted three Rebel passes. And while Mississippi piled up more yardage (248 to 194), it was Bama who controlled the football by running 69 plays to only 48 for the Rebels

In the final quarter the Tide defense stopped the Rebels on its two, nine and 28-yard lines to show that its defense came ready to play.

January 1, 1965 Texas 21, Alabama 17

MIAMI, Fla. — Gimpy legged Joe Namath put on one heckuva show and almost pulled a victory out of the fire, but the Texas Longhorns rose up to stop Namath inches short of the goal line late in the game and held on to win, 21-17, over the national champion Crimson Tide team.

Namath was a shoo-in for the game's MVP honors, hitting on 18 of 37 passes for 255 yards and two touchdowns. And his knee was hurting so much that he couldn't start the game.

Texas struck first, scoring with just 23 seconds left in the first quarter when big Ernie Koy sped 79 yards. In the second period Jim Hudson fired a 69-yard bomb to George Sauer to put Texas on

The Tide battled back, marching 87 yards, with Namath passing seven yards to sophomore Wayne Trimble for the score

Texas got a couple of breaks for its next score just before halftime. The Longhorns were seemingly stopped and went for a field goal. Creed Gilmer raced through to block it, David Ray recovered for the Tide and rambled three yards before fumbling. Texas recovered to regain possession. On the next play Hudson went back to pass, and was dumped by Jim Simmons for a loss but on the play Alabama was guilty of holding a receiver downfield and it gave the Horns a first down on the Tide 13. Three plays later Koy went around right end from the one and it was 21-7 at halftime.


Namath then put the Tide into motion in the second half. He hit Tommy Tolleson, Wayne Cook and Ray Perkins for passes to move to the Texas 20, then hurled a perfect strike to Perkins for the score. In the fourth quarter Namath got the offense going again, only to bog down and have to settle for a David Ray field goal to cut it to 21-17.

Jimmy Fuller intercepted a Texas pass in the fourth quarter, then Namath and Steve Bowman moved the ball within inches of the Longhorn goal, but on fourth down Tommy Nobis and the Texas line stopped Namath and it ended Bama's hopes.

January 1, 1966 Alabama 39, Nebraska 28

MIAMI, Fla. — Alabama's cobra-quick Crimson Tide found out just before game time that a victory over Nebraska's big Cornhuskers would mean a second straight National Championship, since upsets earlier that day had set this game up as the National Title playoff.

Striking with daring aggressiveness against the much larger Big Eight power, Alabama won 39-28, but the game really wasn't as close as the final score. Bama ran 86 plays to just 43 for the Huskers. It outgained Nebraska 518 to 377 in total offense and Bama's great quickness and speed were just too much.

Tom Somerville recovered a Nebraska fumble at the Bama 39 early in the game and in seven plays Bama was on the scoreboard, the payoff being a 21-yard pass from Steve Sloan to Ray Parkins

Bob Churchich passed to Tony Jeter for a 33-yard TD in the second quarter to tie it at 7-7, but Bama promptly marched 89 yards to score, with Les Kelley ripping over from the four. Shortly afterward Sloan hit Perkins with an 11-yard scoring aerial. The Tide then used the onside kick, recovered by Vernon Newbill, and moved to the Nebraska two when time almost ran out before David Ray could kick an 18-yard field goal and make it 24-7 at halftime.


Nebraska scored early in the third quarter, Churchich passing to Ben Gregory for a 49-yard score. Bama marched right back, though, with Steve Bowman cracking over from the one, then Sloan passed to Perkins for two points and it was 32-13. Churchich sneaked over from the one on the first play of the final quarter and it was 32-20.

Bowman got the next Tide touchdown with a three-yard run, Ray kicked and it was 39-20. Nebraska scored with 2:50 left when Jeter gathered in a 14-yard Churchich pass and Churchich passed to Gregory for a two-point PAT, making the final tally, 39-28, and with the victory the National Championship for the Crimson Tide.

NEW ORLEANS, La. — It was billed as a classic rematch, Alabama vs. Nebraska, after the Crimson Tide had whipped the Cornhuskers, 39-28, the year before in Miami and won the national championship in so doing.

The 1966 season found Alabama unbeaten in 10 straight games, but frustrated at the polls since Notre Dame and Michigan State had battled to a 10-10 tie and were 1-2 in the ratings.

When Alabama got through with Nebraska this day, though, it went down in history as the finest performance anyone had seen. Alabama completely thrashed a good Nebraska team, 34-7.

"This was the greatest college team I've ever seen," said Bama's Bear Bryant afterwards. Nebraska's Bob Devaney certainly didn't argue.

On the first play from scrimmage Kenny Stabler faded back and lofted a strike to streaking Ray Perkins and it was a 45-yard gain to the Husker 27. Seven plays later big Les Kelley bulled his way into the end zone. The second time Bama had the ball, Stabler hit Perkins for a nine-yard gainer, then flipped to him again for a 42-yard gain to the Nebraska 20. After Stabler had connected to Dennis Homan for six yards, the crafty signal caller rolled out and sprinted 14-yards to score.

Before the first quarter was over Charlie Harris recovered a fumble at the 39 and Steve Davis kicked a 30-yard field goal making it 17-0. The Tide took over early in the second quarter and marched 71 yards in 10 plays with Wayne Trimble scoring from the six, making it 24-0.

Then in the third quarter another Davis field goal from 40 yards out, pushed it to 27-0. Game Nebraska, hitting harder as the game wore on, scored early in the fourth quarter when Bob Churchich passed to Dick Davis for a 15-yard touchdown.


Moments later, however, Stabler and Perkins renewed their act and the result was a 45-yard touchdown pass play. Stabler hit 12 of 17 passes for 218 yards, gained 40 more on the ground and was the MVP with Perkins a close second.

Alabama drove 80 yards in the first quarter with QB Kenny "Snake" Stabler going over from the three to put the Tide out front first. A&M intercepted a Stabler pass later in the period to set up the Aggie tying score. Edd Hargett passed 13 yards to Larry Stegent for the score.

On the first play of the second quarter Steve Davis booted a 36-yard field goal to give Bama its final lead of the day at 10-7. With just 16 seconds left on the first half clock, Hargett hit Tommy Maxwell with a seven-yard pass to put A&M out front. 13-10. at intermission.


It didn't take long for the A&M lead to push to 20-10 as the Aggies drove 52 yards in six plays with big Wendall Housley going over from the

But the Tide wasn't through. It took the kickoff and drove 83 yards in just nine plays, with Stabler racing over from the seven yard line. Bama tried to run for two points, but it failed and A&M led 20-16.

Time and time again in the fourth quarter Alabama threatened but the Aggies defense kept the Tide at bay. With just seconds left a Stabler pass was stolen by Curley Hallman, a youngster who grew up just across the river from Tuscaloosa in Northport. That sealed the Aggie victory.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — It was a close game for three quarters, but when the fourth period rolled around Missouri's powerful Tigers pushed home three touchdowns and routed Alabama, 35-10, before 68,011 in the 24th annual Gator Bowl.

It was the worst beating a Bryant coached Alabama team had ever suffered and the statistics tell the story

Bama had minus 45 yards rushing and a total offense of just 23 yards. Missouri banged out 402 yards rushing, but didn't complete a single pass although it really wasn't necessary. Alabama made just six first downs to 21 for the Big Eight Tigers.

Missouri scored the first time they had the ball, driving 71 yards in 11 plays with Terry McMillan scoring from the four. Alabama tied it at 7-7 in the second quarter when Donnie Sutton intercepted a McMillan pass and raced 38-yards for the Bama score. Late in the second quarter the Tigers drove 55 yards in 13 plays, with McMillan going over from the five. A roughing the kicker penalty against the Tide kept Missouri's drive going, but at halftime it was 14-7, Missouri, and stayed that way going into the final period.

Mike Dean connected on a 25-yard field goal early in the final period to pull the Tide within striking distance, but a Missouri interception put the Tigers in business on the Bama 21 and it took six plays for McMillan to sweep over from the two, making it 21-10.

After the Tiger defense pushed Bama back to its eight, a bad Alabama punt put the ball on the Tide 36. Greg Cook raced in for a score. Alabama tried to go to the air and get back in contention, but Dennis Poppe snared one for the Tigers and sprinted 46 yards to close out the scoring and make it 35-10.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — The enthusiastic Liberty Bowl people got what they wanted when they matched Colorado and Alabama this day.

Colorado defeated the Tide, 47-33, in a wild one. The Big Eight school scored on the opening drive, Ward Walsh blasting over from the 13 after driving 80 yards in eight plays. Later in the quarter Dave Haney kicked a 30-yard field goal to make it 10.00

Colorado did it again as Bob Anderson barged over from four yards out to cap an 80-yard march in just eight plays, making it 17-0.

But the Tide got in a few surprises of its own, the payoff being pass minded Scott Hunter dashing 31 yards on a sneak to make it 17-7. Later in the quarter George Ranager took a pitchout and got a key block from Johnny Musso to score from the six and it was 17-13, as Bama went for two and failed.

But it took the Buffaloes only six plays to score again. Walsh popping over from the 15. Alabama wasn't finished, however, and drove 72 yards in seven plays to score, Musso going in from the two. Again the Tide went for two and failed, but it was 24-19 with just 46 seconds left in the first half.

Jim Duke's kickoff was fielded by Bob Mastern on the Colorado nine, with Mastern handing off to Steve Engle. He sped 91 yards to score and make it 31-19 at intermission.

Alabama received to open the second half, then with second and 10 from its 45, Neb Hayden arched a long pass to Griff Langston who gathered it in and raced home to score, pulling the Tide within five points, 31-26.

Steve Williams intercepted a Colorado pass minutes later and the Tide was at it again. Hayden again went to the air and hit Musso with a 10-yard touchdown pass to put Alabama out in front, 33-31. Colorado marched 53 yards in 12 plays, with Anderson sliding off left tackle from the two to put the Buffs out front, 38-33. Colorado's Bob Brundidge and Herb Orvis sacked Tide quarterback Hayden for a safety to make it 40-33. The Tide turned it over on downs to give the Buffs another shot and Colorado's Anderson scored with just 45 seconds left and defeated the Tide, 47-33.

HOUSTON, Texas — Two offensive-minded football squads battled to a 24-24 deadlock in Houston's famed Astrodome in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl as Alabama and Oklahoma fought tooth-and-nail down to the wire. There was a total of 843 yards total offense in the game, showing that defense just wasn't anything to write home about, although both teams did make some key stops along the way.

Alabama scored first as tight end Randy Moore gathered in a four-yard Scott Hunter pass to cap a 54-yard, eight play drive. Oklahoma marched right back to tie the game, though, with Joe Wylie scoring from the two. It was 7-7 after one quarter and they were just warming up.

Bama was within the shadows of Oklahoma's goal, only to have an interception kill a drive. The Sooners got a 58-yard scoring play out of swiftmoving Greg Pruitt to go on top, 14-7.

Then it went to 21-7, as Pruitt got a key block from Wylie and dashed 25 yards to score after a Bama field goal attempt was no good. With just 14 seconds left before halftime, Hunter hit David Bailey with a five-yard scoring pass and it was 21-14, Oklahoma, at halftime.

In the third quarter Richard Ciemny kicked a 20-yard field goal to narrow it to 21-17. Then came the big fourth quarter. With 7:36 left, fourth down from the Sooner 25, Johnny Musso took a handoff and started wide to his right. He stopped, fired a left-handed pass back to quarterback Hunter and it caught the Okies napping, with Hunter making a dash for his life to score. Alabama led, 24-21.

With only 59 seconds left, OU field goal specialist Bruce Derr hit on a 42-yard attempt to tie the game at 24-all. But Alabama had one last shot. Oklahoma tried an onside kick, but it didn't go anywhere and the Tide had it at the OU 40. Musso broke loose for 21 yards to the 19. Dave Brungard got two yards, then Hunter was hit for a yard loss, and with just five seconds left Bama called time out. Ciemny lined up for a 34-yard field goal try that would win the game, only to have John Shelley get a hand on it and deflect the attempt to preserve the tie.

MIAMI, Fla. — It was billed as the National Championship game, Nebraska ranked first and Alabama second, but the Cornhuskers quickly salted away not only the game but the national title with a 38-6 victory which was greatly aided by a mistake-laden Crimson Tide.

Nebraska scored late in the first quarter after a fumbled punt snap by Bama gave the Huskers possession at the Bama 47. Jeff Kinney ripped off tackle for the score.

Then swift-moving Johnny Rodgers returned a Tide punt 77 yards to make it 14-0, and before you could ask "who?" the Tide fumbled the kickoff and Nebraska had it on the Tide 27. Jerry Tagge kept for the score, making it 21-0, as the wall tumbled down on Bama.

Moments later it was a fumble-fingered Alabama team that again coughed up the ball on its own four and Gary Dixon quickly scored to send the scoreboard to 28-0, still midway in the second quarter

The Tide settled down, but found it couldn't pass from the new wishbone-T. Finally Terry Davis went over from the three in the third quarter to cut the score to 28-6. Rich Sanger kicked a 21-yard field goal to make it 31-6 at the end of the third quarter, and then Van Brownson scored from the one after a Nebraska interception, to close out the scoring at 38-6.

Stats on the game were reasonably close, but the score wasn't and it was a long trip home for the 16,000 Crimson Tide fans.

After an exchange of punts, Wade grabbed his second interception of the young game and raced 42 yards to the Texas 31. On the first play, Wilbur Jackson took a pitch wide to the right and behind Joe LaBue's springing block, cruised untouched for the touchdown and Bill Davis quickly added the extra point to make it 10-0.

Texas drove down for a field goal of 24-yards by Billy "Sure" Schott and then with just eight seconds until intermission, Bill Davis banged through a 30-yard three-pointer for Bama to push its halftime lead to 13-3

A short Tide punt in the third quarter gave Texas field position and the wishbone Horns drove 59 yards in 15 plays, Alan Lowry scooting over from three yards out and Schott's kick cut the Bama lead to 13-10.

Alabama reeled off a dazzling fourth quarter drive from its 20 to the Texas 34, where on first down, Terry Davis went for broke and tried to hit Wayne Wheeler with a TD pass, only to have Terry Melancon intercept for a touchback.


Texas, going to the air behind Lowry, marched to the Tide 34, from where Lowry bootlegged the final 34 yards, tightwalking the sidelines for the winning touchdown. Schott's kick made it 17-13.

The Tide wasn't finished, though, and marched from its 10 to the Texas 43, where Jackson was stopped short on a fourth and one play, Texas taking over and hammering the final nail into the Tide's coffin.

NEW ORLEANS, La. — It was the first ever meeting between two giants of college football and the game was promoted so heavily even the fans involved got tired of all the advance publicity. It was THE GAME of all time in a lot of ways, and it certainly lived up to every inch of newspaper space and moment of radio-TV air time.

Notre Dame won, 24-23, in one of the truly alltime classics of college football. It had everything you could want in a football game and Notre Dame vaulted from third in the AP to first. Alabama had finished first in both polls in the regular season and remained the UPI champ.

Seldom do games live up to all the advance and frenzied billing. Just like most Super Bowl games are dull. But when Ara Parseghian of Notre Dame and Bear Bryant of Alabama unleashed two of the finest college teams of modern history onto the Sugar Bowl's soggy artificial turf, this game caught the fancy of the entire football world.


Big plays abounded. Alabama could have put it away in the third quarter, but couldn't deliver the knockout punch. Notre Dame ran a kickoff back for a touchdown, a real no-no in this type of encounter. Alabama had a controversial play develop when Notre Dame roughed the Tide kicker in the waning moments of the game, but it was controversial only in that the TV announcers blew the call. The 15-yard penalty would not have given Bama a first down and Bryant elected to let Notre Dame have the ball backed up on their own two yard line.

But millions of people listening and watching on TV didn't know it wasn't an automatic first down, as it is in pro football. As a result, Bryant received literally thousands of letters and wires about the decision.

Bryant's strategy almost worked. Notre Dame gained almost nothing in its first two plays but on third down QB Tom Clements lofted a 35-yard pass to tight end Robin Weber to get the Irish out of the hole and to salt away the victory.

January 1, 1975 Notre Dame 13, Alabama 11

MIAMI, Fla. — Notre Dame once again proved to be the spoiler for Alabama's national championship dreams, as the underdog Fighting Irish upset the Crimson Tide, 13-11, and jerked the throne rug right out from under Coach Bear Bryant's team.

Alabama was ranked first in the nation in the UPI poll and second in AP going into the game, with Notre Dame being eighth and ninth. A year before when the two had met with Sugar Bowl as the setting, Notre Dame won, 24-23, and vaulted to the national title. This time all it did was ruin Bama's chance, and give retiring coach Ara Parseghian a retirement gift.

Neither team had much offense, as the defense dominated. Alabama's Willie Shelby fumbled a punt in the first quarter and gave the Irish the ball on the Tide 16. In five plays Wayne Bullock scored from the four.

It went to 13-0 early in the second quarter when Notre Dame put together a 77-yard drive in 17 plays with Mark McLane scoring from the nine, after a Tide penalty had kept the drive alive. Then a Notre Dame fumble gave the Bama team a chance from the Irish 40, but all the Tide could get was a field goal by Danny Ridgeway of 21 yards and it was 13-3 at halftime. The score remained the same going into the fourth quarter.

Then after a good Shelby punt return, Richard Todd found Russ Schamun on a 48-yard touchdown pass play. Todd then threw to George Pugh for a two-point conversion to narrow it to 13-11.

With 1:39 left, Alabama got a chance from its own 38. Todd to Schamun for 16, then to Randy Billingsley for eight to the Irish 38, but Reggie Barnett grabbed off the next Todd effort and iced the game for the Irish.

Alabama's Leroy Cook was the defensive standout, although Ronnie Robertson led in tackles. Bama had more total offense, 285 to 204, but had four turnovers. Todd hit 13 of 24 passes, six of them to freshman Ozzie Newsome for 68 yards and five to Schamun for 126 yards.

A crowd of 71,801 watched this New Year's night game, with NBC-TV televising it nationwide.

December 31, 1975 Alabama 13, Penn State 6

NEW ORLEANS, La. — For eight consecutive seasons, sports writers had been writing about and fans had been crying about Alabama's terrible bowl drought. Not since Jan. 1, 1967 — with a 34-7 victory over Nebraska in the Sugar Bowl — had the Tide won in post-season play.

But with a 13-6 victory over Joe Paterno's Penn State Nittany Lions on December 31, 1975, Paul "Bear" Bryant's team gained the needed respect it had been lacking in eight previous bowl encounters. It was the first Sugar Bowl played inside the pleasant confines of the multi-million dollar Louisiana Superdome, matching third-ranked Alabama (10-1) against seventh-ranked Penn State (9-2)

Richard Todd, Alabama's senior quarterback, put on an offensive show, completing 10 of 12 passes for 205 yards. In running the Tide's wishbone offense to near perfection, he was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

Todd passed 55 yards to sensational split end Ozzie Newsome to set up the game's only touchdown in the fourth quarter.

"We had a sweep called to the left side but I didn't like the defense they were in. I didn't want to take the chance of ruining a play," said Todd after the game. "So I called time. I went over to the sidelines and Coach Bryant sort of winked at me. He called a pass.

"We felt they'd be single covering Ozzie. He ran what we call a slant-and-go. The last time we called this particular play was in the Tennessee game. But it was more important this time."


Two plays later, Mike Stock swept left for an 11 yard touchdown.

Danny Ridgeway added an extra point and two field goals to offset Penn State's two three-pointers by Chris Bahr and the nation's leading defense allowed its average — six points — to put the wraps on Alabama's first bowl victory in nearly a decade.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — A record crowd of 52,737 braved 28 degree temperatures and gusting winds at speeds up to 28 miles per hour in the 18th annual Liberty Bowl.

The "refrigerator bowl" was blown wide open by the Bama defense, which stopped the Bruins twice on fourth down, once at the one, and another time by an interception at the one on third down.

It was sophomore linebacker Barry Krauss, the game's most valuable player, who intercepted a pass and rambled 44 yards for the Tide's first touchdown

"Our defense was simply magnificent most of the time," said Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant. "Not only were we stopping them, our defense put some points on the board, too."

Bucky Berrey kicked three field goals of 37, 25, and 28, a Liberty Bowl record. Johnny Davis plunged one yard for the Tide's first TD. Tony Nathan added six more with a half back pass to quarterback Jack O'Rear, in a 20-yard scoring play.

Rick Watson added a one-yard touchdown run and Berrey was successful in three extra point attempts.

Only a 61-yard run by UCLA's Theotis Brown averted a shutout, but the extra point attempt failed making the score 30-6.

But the Crimson Tide came right back and Rick Watson's one-yard touchdown run ended the scoring at 36-6.

UCLA's young head coach summed up the game as he met Alabama's legendary Bear Bryant at midfield at the conclusion of the game.

"You gave us a good, old-fashioned butt-whipping, and you know it," Terry Donahue told Bryant.

NEW ORLEANS, La. — Alabama had been knocked to its knees after an early-season 31-24 loss to Nebraska, but it bounced all winningly into a Jan. 2 Sugar Bowl encounter with the Ohio State Buckeyes.

Since a thrilling 21-20 upset of top-ranked Southern Cal in Los Angeles at mid-season, the Crimson Tide had been on a roll, winning its sixth Southeastern Conference championship in seven years and climbing to third in the nation. It was billed as a match between the nation's two winningest active coaches — Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant and Ohio State's Woody Hayes.

It turned into a rout. Alabama won easily, 35-6, and with the upset by fifth-ranked Notre Dame of number-one Texas in the Cotton Bowl, many Crimson Tide fans thought their team should have claimed the national prize. But in a controversial and ever-so-tight vote, the Irish vaulted from fifth to first, with Alabama finishing a close second.

Jeff Rutledge and his comeback team of 1977 wasted no time in putting the game into their control. On the Tide's second possession - a 10 play, 76 yard march - "Touchdown" Tony Nathan scored from a yard away, and the rout was on.

Rutledge finished as the game's MVP, hitting on 8 of 11 in the air for 109 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Johnny Davis, the Tide's bullish senior fullback, led the ground assault with 95 yards and 24 carries.

Alabama led 13-0 at the half and built the margin to 21-0 on a three yard Rutledge pass to Rick Neal in the third quarter before sophomore Steadman Shealy manned the controls in the final period to direct the Tide to another pair of touchdowns.

Ohio State's Chris Ward dealt Alabama the supreme compliment after all the fighting had taken place.

"I don't think they were extremely quick," he said. "I don't think they were extremely strong. I think they were extremely effective."

January 1, 1979 Alabama 14, Penn State 7

NEW ORLEANS, La. — One vivid image was permanently etched into the minds of the 76,824 in the Superdome and the millions of TV viewers who watched the 45th annual Sugar Bowl on New Year's Day, 1979.

Penn State, the nation's No. 1 team was stopped on two consecutive plays inside the one-yard line to preserve a 14-7 victory for Alabama's second ranked Crimson Tide. That now-famous goal line stand won a national championship for Paul "Bear" Bryant's Crimson Tide. Alabama appeared content to run out the clock in the first half with 1:11 left. But Penn State called a timeout on two consecutive plays to stop the clock, hoping to get the ball back and set up a field goal. But senior halfback Tony Nathan countered with runs of 30 and 7 yards down to the Penn State 30 yard line.

Penn State coach Joe Paterno watched his plan backfire as Crimson Tide quarterback Jeff Rutledge found split end Bruce Bolton open in the end zone for a 30-yard touchdown.

Alan McElroy kicked the extra point to give Alabama a 7-0 halftime lead. In the third period, Nittany Lion quarterback Chuck Fusina hit Scott Fitzkee deep in the end zone for a touchdown. Matt Bahr's kick tied the game with at 7-7.

Moments later, Lou Ikner, Alabama's talented halfback, ran 62 yards with a Penn State punt before being dragged down at Penn State's 11-yard line. Three plays later Major Ogilvie rammed himself into the corner of the end zone, sprung by a key block from tight end Rick Neal. McElroy kicked the extra point ending the scoring at 14-7.


The Nittany Lions had a chance to tie the score when the Lions Joe Lally fell on a misdirected pitchout on an option play by Rutledge at the Tide 19 with 7:57 remaining. Penn State drove from there to a third and goal at the one. But the Alabama defense sealed off its end zone in a tremendous defensive effort, climaxed by Alabama linebacker Barry Krauss stopping Penn State tailback Mike Guman short of the goal line. After the game, Bryant commented on one of the most memorable goal line stands in college football history.

NEW ORLEANS, La. — The University of Alabama reached a new pinnacle of success as Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's Crimson Tide beat Arkansas 24-9 in the 46th annual Sugar Bowl.

In the process of winning its fifth straight bowl, four of them Sugars, this unbeaten Alabama team became the first Tide squad in the school's history to win 12 games in a season.

A record Sugar Bowl crowd of 77,468 and millions of viewers on national TV watched Alabama win.

After Ish Odonez booted a 34-yard field goal following Arkansas' recovery of Don McNeal's fumble on the opening kickoff, the Razorbacks didn't get back into the game until Alabama was holding a 17-3 advantage in the third quarter.

The game's most valuable player, Major Ogilvie, capped off an 82-yard touchdown drive with a 22-yard scramble to put Alabama up 7-3 in the first period.

Arkansas quarterback Kevin Scanlon fumbled a snap from center and linebacker Thomas Boyd recovered the ball on the Hog 22.

Again it was Ogilvie, minutes later with a oneyard plunge to set up a 14-3 advantage.

With two minutes left in the half, Ogilvie returned a punt 50 yards to the Arkansas 30, setting up an Alan McElroy field goal, which made the halftime score 17-3.


Arkansas came back from halftime with an 80-yard scoring drive in 11 plays, but the Bama defense rejected Scanlon's two-point attempt after the touchdown and the Razorbacks were held scoreless for the remainder of the contest.

Alabama quarterback Steadman Shealy engineered a final 98-yard touchdown drive capped off by a 12-yard blast by senior Steve Whitman.

Alabama's defense held the Razorbacks the rest of the way, under the brilliant secondary of Tommy Wilcox and Jim Bob Harris.

DALLAS, Texas — Alabama capped off a 10-2 season by decking Southwest Conference champion Baylor 30-2 in the Cotton Bowl on New Year's Day 1981.

For only the second time since 1971, Alabama had failed to win the Southeastern Conference championship, finishing second behind eventual national champion Georgia. The Tide had been upset by Mississippi State (6-3) to snap its longestin-the-nation 28 game winning streak and then fell to old nemesis Notre Dame (7-0).

But against Grant Teaff's Baylor Bears, Paul "Bear" Bryant's Crimson Tide was impressive. The 'Bama defense was the big hero, as the likes of middle guard Warren Lyles, E.J. Junior and Thomas Boyd shut down Baylor's thought-to-be unstoppable running tandem of Walter Abecrombie and Dennis Gentry.

The pair had combined for nearly 2,000 yards during Baylor's 10-1 regular season, but on this sunny day in Dallas, they were limited to 54 yards — altogether.

Major Ogilvie (one yard run), Don Jacobs (one yard run) and Mark Nix (three yard run) scored touchdowns for the Crimson Tide and sophomore Peter Kim added a Cotton bowl record three field goals to send Alabama to its record-tying sixth consecutive bowl victory.

DALLAS, Texas — Alabama marched into Dallas as the Southeastern Conference co-champion and its coach as the winningest man in the history of the game, but Fred Akers' Texas Longhorns were not impressed.

Five weeks after Bryant had won his recordshattering 315th contest against cross-state rival Auburn, the Longhorns came from behind to hand Alabama a 14-12 defeat, which ended its season at 9-2-1.

After a scoreless first quarter, Alabama struck to take a 7-0 lead into halftime as sophomore quarterback Walter Lewis tossed six yards to sophomore wide receiver Jesse Bendross. Junior Peter Kim kicked the extra point.

Kim added a 24 yard field goal in the third quarter to put the Crimson Tide out front 10-0.


But Texas saved its best for the final quarter, wherein it scored each of its 14 points. Quarterback Robert Brewer, who completed 12 of 21 passes on the day for 201 yards, directed the Longhorns on two fourth quarter scoring drives, running himself 30 yards for the first points.

Terry Orr's eight yard run was the clincher and Raul Allegre added his second PAT to give the Longhorns a 14-10 lead.

Texas allowed an intentional safety in the game's closing moments to secure the win.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — The University of Alabama football team retired Coach Paul W. "Bear" Bryant in grand fashion by registering a 21-15 Liberty Bowl victory over Illinois at Memphis, Tenn.

The win gave Coach Bryant a final record of 323-85-17 — unmatched in intercollegiate football history

"Many thanks to the staff for one heck of a job," he said afterward in a crowded press interview tent. "The players' preparation and the coaches' preparation, especially in this circus-type atmosphere, were exceptional.

"I am thankful to have won my final game," said the Crimson Tide coaching legend. "Whether the team likes it or not, they will always be remembered for winning my last game. I am proud they wanted to win this one for me."

Alabama saw fullback Ricky Moore, flanker Jesse Bendross and fullback Craig "Touchdown" Turner scored touchdowns for the Tide in Bryant's final battle to overcome Illinois' potent offensive attack

Even Heisman Trophy candidate Tony Eason who threw two touchdown passes on the evening, couldn't spoil Coach Bryant's final exciting appearance.

"Give Alabama credit," Eason said following his team's loss. "Their defense hit harder tonight than any opponent we faced all season long."

Crimson Tide cornerback Jeremiah Castille ended an illustrious career at Alabama by tying secondary Coach Louis Campbell's single game Liberty Bowl record with three interceptions.

"It sure was great to send Coach Bryant out a winner," Castille said after being named Liberty Bowl "Most Valuable Player." "He really deserved to finish his career on a good note."

With the win, the Crimson Tide ended its 1982 campaign with an 8-4 record. An upset loss to Tennessee and three disappointing November setbacks spoiled what could have been a national championship-type season, but the win over Illinois provided college football's greatest coach one of his most cherished memories.

EL PASO, Texas — It was the largest crowd (41,412) to ever witness an event in El Paso, Texas sports history. The University of Alabama Crimson Tide football team gave the fans their money's worth and shocked fifth ranked SMU, 28-7, in the 50th anniversary of the Sun Bowl.

Alabama gained possession with 7:33 remaining in the first quarter at its own 41 yard line and drove 59 yards in seven plays as fullback Ricky Moore pounded over from the one for the game's initial touchdown. "The offensive line did a great job all day," Moore said after racking up his sixth consecutive 100-yard-plus game with a Sun Bowl record 28 carries.

Following cornerback Sammy Hood's fumble recovery on a Lance McIlhenny bobble, Moore ran untouched for an 11-yard score to put the Tide ahead, 14-0, with 1:14 remaining in the first stanza. The key play in the drive was a 32-yard pass by quarterback Walter Lewis to flanker Greg Richardson.

As the second quarter got underway, Alabama marched 91 yards on a 15-play possession as Lewis capped the drive with a one-yard keeper to move Alabama ahead 21-0, with 7:16 left in the first half. The senior signal-caller from Brewton engineered a march that knocked 6:22 off the clock and he combined for 58 yards (45 passing, 13 rushing). After the teams traded turnovers late in the half, the Crimson Tide put together its final scoring drive of the 1983 season when the team moved 62 yards. The offensive line provided outstanding protection for Lewis, who found split end Joey Jones on a 19-yard touchdown pass with 43 seconds left on the clock.

Although the Mustangs got on the scoreboard in the third quarter when McIlhenny threw a 15-yard touchdown strike to wide receiver Marquis Pleasant to cut the Tide lead, 28-7, the Alabama defense took over and shut the "Pony Express II" down.

HONOLULU, Hawaii — Alabama had "fun in the sun" in beautiful Hawaii dominating Southern California 24-3 in the fourth annual Aloha Bowl in Honolulu to end the season with a 9-2-1 record.

Before a crowd of 35,183, the Crimson Tide victory tied USC with the most bowl victories (21) as the traditional football powers met for only the second time in bowl competition. The Tide stopped USC 34-14 in the 1946 Rose Bowl, the last team to play in the bowl outside of the Big Ten and Pac Ten Conferences.

The first half ended in a 3-3 tie and led Coach Ray Perkins to comment afterwards. "This was the worst first half I have been associated with to play such a great second half."

Alabama was whistled for 68 yards on seven penalties in the first half. It scored on its first possession. From its own 15-yard line, the team drove to the USC 31 where Van Tiffin kicked a 48-yard field goal.

Early in the second quarter, USC tied the score on a 24-yard field goal by Don Shafer with 9:36 left in the half. Alabama had stopped the Trojans at the eight yard line on a drive that started from the USC 37

The charged up Crimson Tide scored a touchdown on its second possession in the third quarter. Greg Richardson returned a punt 14 yards to the Trojan 42. Ten plays later fullback Craig Turner dove into the end zone from the one. Tiffin converted the extra point for a 10-3 lead.

Then freshman Kermit Kendrick intercepted a USC aerial and returned it 16 yards to the Trojan 44. Five plays later quarterback Mike Shula hit wide receiver Clay Whitehurst in the end zone for a 24-yard TD pass. Tiffin converted for a 17-3 lead with 13:25 left.

Alabama forced USC to punt on its next possession and Richardson called for a fair catch on the Trojan 44. Seven plays later, flanker Albert Bell ran a reverse around the left side for a 14-yard touchdown with 8:25 remaining. Tiffin kicked the extra point for the 24-3 final score.

EL PASO, Texas — Alabama's star-studded senior class went out in grand style with a sparkling 28-6 victory over the Pac-10 runner-up Washington Huskies. The win gave the Crimson Tide a 10-3 record against one of the nation's toughest schedules.

Senior All-American linebacker Cornelius Bennett was selected the game's most valuable player. He led the defense that allowed Washington's high powered offense just 62 yards on the ground, and 241 yards total offense. The Tide didn't allow a touchdown.

After a scoreless first quarter, All-American halfback Bobby Humphrey broke loose for a 64-yard run for the game's first score with 13:55 left in the second quarter. The Huskies all-star kicker, Jeff Jaeger, booted a 31-yard field goal with 5:55 left and added a 34-yarder with :44 remaining as Alabama took a 7-6 halftime lead.

After two possession exchanges, Alabama's Freddie Robinson recovered a Washington fumble on their 47 yard line. In six plays, quarterback Mike Shula sharply guided the Crimson Tide to a touchdown, completing two passes to Humphrey, and a 32-yard scoring strike to Greg Richardson. All-American placekicker Van Tiffin converted his second PAT of the day with 6:24 remaining in the third stanza. Alabama led 14-6.

On the Crimson Tide's next possession, Humphrey ran three plays for 15 yards. Then Shula hit Angelo Stafford for 27 yards, Richardson for 25 and Humphrey for an 18-yard TD pass. The sixplay, 83-yard drive took but 2:11 off the clock and with Tiffin's PAT. Alabama was in charge 21-6.


Alabama scored again on its next possession covering 92 yards in 16 plays. Humphrey ran in the score from three yards out after gaining 48 yards on ten carries and catching three passes for 30 yards from Shula on the drive. Tiffin converted again in the fourth quarter to seal the 28-6 victory.

Shula completed 15 of 26 passes for 176 yards with two TD passes to end his collegiate career. Humphrey ended a sensational year with three touchdowns. His 159 yards rushing gave him eight 100-plus yards rushing games for the season. It was Coach Perkins last game with the Crimson Tide and one of his team's best performances while he was at the helm.

The Hall of Fame Bowl

January 2, 1988 Michigan 28, Alabama 24

TAMPA, Fla. — In a battle of two traditional football powers, Alabama and Michigan met for the first time in the second Hall of Fame Bowl in Tampa, Fla., and the Wolverines won 28-24 on a fourth down last minute touchdown.

NBC televised the game nationally and 60,156 fans looked on as Alabama Coach Bill Curry faced Michigan Assistant Head Coach Gary Moeller who replaced Head Coach Bo Schembechler, who had a heart attack three weeks prior to the game.

A 51-yard Philip Doyle field goal at 8:43 in the first quarter gave the Crimson Tide a 3-0 lead. Michigan's All-American halfback Jamie Morris then proceeded to score three unanswered touchdowns. Two came in the second quarter from 25 and 14 yards out. Michigan held a 14-3 lead at intermission.

On Michigan's second possession in the third quarter, Morris broke through the left side of his line for a 77-yard touchdown sprint with 9:36 remaining. Down 21-3, Alabama came to life and scored three touchdowns for the lead.

With 4:55 left in the third stanza, tight end Howard Cross took a 16-yard scoring strike from quarterback Jeff Dunn to complete a 72-yard drive but the Tide failed on a two-point conversion. Then on Alabama's next possession, the team put together an 85-yard drive with its All-American tailback Bobby Humphrey leaping over from the one yard line.

After forcing Michigan to punt on its next two possessions, the passing of Dunn and the running of Humphrey completed a 79-yard drive with Humphrey scoring on a determined 17-yard run. Dunn completed a two-point play to Clay Whitehurst for a 24-21 lead with 4:49 remaining to play.


Starting from its own 38-yard line after the kickoff, Michigan caught fire and moved to Alabama's 20-yard line with a fourth and three situation. In a surprise move, quarterback Demetrius Brown completed a beautifully executed touchdown pass with 50 seconds left in the game to flanker John Kolesar in the end zone to give the Wolverines a 28-24 victory.

Dunn completed 23 of 40 passes for 269 yards and Humphrey rushed for 149 yards on 27 attempts to lead Alabama offensively.

December 24, 1988 Alabama 29, Army 28

EL PASO, Texas — Alabama rallied to defeat upset-minded Army 29-28 in the 55th annual Sun Bowl Classic. Quarterback David Smith shattered passing records set by Bama names such as Steve Sloan and Joe Namath in guiding Bama to this win on a near perfect football day in El Paso.

A 51-yard run by Army fullback Ben Barnett set up the first score of the game, a one-yard run by Mike Mayweather, with less than three minutes gone in the action.

Alabama cut the lead to 7-3 in the first quarter, but early in the second period, the Cadets took a 14-3 lead when quarterback Bryan McWilliams capped a 69-yard, six-play drive with a 30-yard TD scamper on a patented wishbone option play. Again Alabama had to settle for a Philip Doyle field goal, this time from 22 yards out.


The end of the first half brought some of the game's most pivotal moments. While the Alabama defense was trying to figure out the intricacies of the Black Knights' wishbone, Army finally went to the airways on a halfback pass. Bama got a break when passer Calvin Cass overshot a wide open Otto Leone for what would have been a cinch score. Instead Army had to settle for a field goal attempt from the Bama 24 yard line. Enter Bama's sensational Derrick Thomas, king of the big play. Thomas blocked the kick, keeping Army from adding to its lead. David Smith rapidly drove Alabama 76 yards in 1:12 for a score. With only :35 left in the first half, Doyle converted the extra point to narrow the lead to 14-13.

With only a few ticks left on the clock, Army lined up for another field goal try, this time from the Bama 27-yard line. Keith Walker's 44-yard attempt was blocked, again by the omnipresent Thomas. Trailing 28-20, Bama and Smith did not panic, driving back to the Knights' two-yard line. Doyle was called on to kick a 32-yard field goal with 7:25 left.

A 19-yard pass from Smith to Todd Richardson and a 16-yard run by Wayne Shaw led to a touchdown in the Tide's winning drive with senior David Casteal leaping into the end zone for the winning score. Smith, the game's MVP, completed 33 of 52 for 412 yards, each setting an Alabama bowl record

The Sugar Bowl

January 1, 1990 Miami 33, Alabama 25

NEW ORLEANS, La. — On the first day of the 1990s, Miami clinched the 1989 National Championship with a 33-25 victory over seventhranked Alabama in a game that was Bill Curry's last as head coach of the Crimson Tide.

Miami never trailed in the game, moving ahead 7-0 with 4:55 left in the first quarter on a threeyard run by fullback Stephen McGuire. Actually the Tide had held the Hurricanes on downs and forced a field goal attempt by Carlos Huerta but Bama was off-sides, giving Miami a first down at the three-vard line.

Two series later the Tide was even at 7-7, thanks to a short punt and a 10-yard return by Gene Jelks which put Bama within striking range from the Miami 36. It took nine plays to move that distance against the renowned Miami defense, but a four-yard reception by Marco Battle scored the Tide touchdown.

Miami was quickly back in front 13-7 after going 78 yards in five plays. Big Mike Ramil, playing in his final Bama game, blocked Huerta's extra point to leave it at 13-7.

Tide freshman Antonio London recovered a Miami fumbled punt to set up a 45-yard field goal by Philip Doyle. Nine plays later Miami was up 20-10 after Alex Johnson scored from three yards out. In its most impressive drive of the night, Alabama covered 80 yards in 11 plays and scored on a seven-yard pass from Gary Hollingsworth to Lamonde Russell with :40 left in the half.


Alabama was back in business seconds later when senior Lee Ozmint intercepted an Erickson toss and ran it back 23 yards to the Miami 19. Doyle tried a 40-yard field goal on the final play of the half. He had the distance to hit it from better than 60 yards but the kick sailed to the left and the halftime score read: Miami 20. Alabama 17.

Miami dominated the second half, scoring a pair of TDs on Erickson passes. Trailing 33-17 late in the game, Alabama made a heroic effort to get back into the tilt. The Tide attempted an on-sides kick, but failed and the Hurricanes had little trouble in running out the clock and claiming not only the Sugar Bowl crown but the unanimous No. 1 ranking in the nation as well.

The Fiesta Bowl

January 1, 1991 Louisville 34, Alabama 7

TEMPE, Ariz. — The Louisville Cardinals, behind four, first-quarter touchdowns, jumped to a 25-0 lead over the Crimson Tide and then coasted to a 34-7 victory in the 1991 Sunkist Fiesta Bowl in Tempe, Arizona.

The game marked the second time Howard Schnellenberger, an assistant coach at Alabama from 1961-65, had faced the Tide as a head coach. Schnellenberger, an assistant under the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant, helped coach the Tide to an impressive, 49-5-1 record, including three SEC and national championships (1961, 64 and 65).

Offensively, the Tide compiled only 189 yards total offense. Alabama's vaunted defense, ranked first in passing defense, third in total defense, fourth in scoring defense and sixth in rushing defense, gave up a Bama bowl-record 458 yards passing. The Cardinals rushed for another 113 yards to set an opponent record for most yards gained in a bowl game (571).

The Tide defense was unable to stop the Cardinals' Browning Nagle who hit on 20-of-33 attempts for 451 yards and three TDs. The Tide's only score came when Charles Gardner intercepted a Jeff Brohm pass and returned it 49 yards for a TD in the second quarter.


The Cardinals jumped out in the first quarter when Nagle hit Latrell Ware for a 70-yard scoring pass with 7:35 left. Ralph Dawkins came back with 3:40 remaining to score on a five-yard burst that capped a six-play, 26 yard drive. The Tide's Byron Holdbrooks blocked the extra point, but just 53-seconds later, Louisville blocked an Alabama punt and recovered it in the endzone for a touchdown. The Cardinals went for two, but George Teague stopped Ralph Dawkins on the one-yard line.

Louisville rounded out the scoring when Nagle threw 19 yards to Anthony Cummings and Bama quarterback Danny Woodson was called for intentional grounding in the endzone.

The Blockbuster Bowl

December 28, 1991 Alabama 30, Colorado 25

MIAMI, Fla. — Alabama relied on a second half rally and three Jay Barker touchdown passes to come from behind and defeat defending national champion Colorado 30-25 at Joe Robbie Stadium in South Florida.

David "The Deuce" Palmer was honored with the "Brian Piccolo Award" as the game's most valuable player. He got the Crimson Tide on the scoreboard first in his usual fashion, a punt return. Palmer took the punt on Alabama's 48-yard line, ran through four Colorado defenders and scooted down the right sideline 52 yards for the score. Matt Wethington's PAT gave Alabama a 7-0 lead.

A blocked Tank Williamson punt gave the Buffaloes the ball on the Alabama three-yard line and two plays later Scott Phillips ran it in from the one. Jim Harper kicked the extra point to tie the game.

Two possessions later, Colorado took the lead when Ted Johnson tackled Martin Houston in the endzone for a safety.

Neither team could generate much offense, but the Alabama defense provided the necessary boost when Mark McMillian intercepted a Darian Hagan pass on the 50-yard line and ran it back 49 yards to the one. The Tide settled for a Wethington field goal. The Buffaloes used the final 43 seconds in the half and kicked a 33-yard field goal as time ran out.

In the second half, the Alabama offense woke up and drove the ball to Colorado's eight. An apparent David Palmer touchdown was called back because of an illegal substitution, but on the next play (third-and-13) Barker and Siran Stacy connected on a 13-yard pass for six points. The two-point conversion failed and Alabama led, 16-12.

A Colorado touchdown gave them a three point lead (19-16), but Alabama marched 75 yards on its next possession and scored on a 12-yard toss from Barker to Kevin Lee. Wethington's PAT put the Tide up 23-19. A 15-play drive in the fourth quarter culminated with a five-yard touchdown pass from Barker to Palmer and gave the Tide a 30-19 lead. Colorado got a quick fourth quarter score to bring them within five, but the Alabama defense held on to preserve the victory.

NEW ORLEANS, La. — In front of 76,789 in the Superdome and a national TV audience, Alabama proved the skeptics wrong as the Tide handily defeated the No. 1 ranked Miami Hurricanes 34-13, winning the national championship for the first time since 1979.

Alabama's defensive strategy stifled Miami's rushing game, only allowing the Hurricanes 48 yards on the ground. Gino Torretta did pass for another 278, but it would not matter.

With Alabama leading 13-6 at the half, the defense took control of the game early in the third quarter. On the 'Canes first play from scrimmage, Torretta was intercepted by Tommy Johnson, who returned the ball to the Miami 20-yard line. Six plays later, Derrick Lassic scored from a yard out to increase Bama's lead to 20-6.

Alabama's defense had been giving Torretta problems all day but the one play that virtually spelled the end for Miami came on their next possession. The Tide pulled all 11 players up to the line with Torretta operating from the shotgun. His errant pass was snared by George Teague who high-stepped 31 yards for a second Tide touchdown in 16 seconds

This play by Teague would be a big one in the Tide's victory, however, it would not be the only one Teague would be remembered for in this game.


Trailing 27-6, the Hurricane offense took the field to mount a successful second-half drive. On Miami's second down and 10 play, Teague made one the biggest defensive plays of the season, although it was null and void because of a five-yard offside penalty called against Alabama.

Torretta hit his favorite receiver, Lamar Thomas, who was streaking down the sideline for an apparent six points. Teague streaked down the sideline, ran Thomas down, stripped the ball from him, and proceeded to advance the ball in the other direction for a short gain. The play may not be officially recorded in the record books but it will stand as one of the best defensive plays ever.

Derrick Lassic controlled Alabama's ground game, cutting, slicing and weaving his way to 135 yards rushing on 28 carries and two touchdowns. The Tide rushed for 267 yards on the day.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — A key to this game for Alabama was to stop the Tar Heels' running attack led by 1,000-yard rushers Curtis and Leon Johnson. The Tide would also have to concern itself with the passing game, guided by Jason Stanicek (139-219-1,878 yards and 12 TDs) whose favorite receiver, Corey Holliday, finished the year with 867 yards and two TDs.

A key ingredient for Alabama to win would be the play of back-up quarterback Brian Burgdorf, who was starting for the injured Jay Barker. Also, the Tide defensive backs would be without the services of consensus All-American Antonio Langham, who lost his eligibility for the SEC Championship game and the Gator Bowl.

After a scoreless first quarter, Alabama got on the board with a Michael Proctor 22-yard field goal with 11:01 in the second quarter. The Tar Heels answered Alabama's score with a one-yard touchdown carry by William Henderson on the next series giving them a 7-3 lead.

On Alabama's next series, Burgdorf hit threeof-four passing for 27 yard and picked up another 19 himself placing Alabama on the Tar Heels' 33-yard line. On first and 10, Burgdorf ran a draw up the middle for the distance and the touchdown. Proctor's PAT gave Alabama a 10-7 lead.


North Carolina tied the game with two seconds left on the clock before the half on a Tripp Pignetti 23-yard field goal.

In the third quarter, Alabama had the first possession and used its rushing attack to drive the length of the field. On second and goal from the UNC eight, Burgdorf threw his first pass of the drive to Tarrant Lynch in the middle of the endzone for six points.

Alabama's final score was Chad Key's first career touchdown. The Tide picked up three rushing first downs and then Burgdorf hit Key on a 10-yard reception. Proctor's PAT gave Alabama a 24-10 lead with 6:34 left, with neither team threatening again.

ORLANDO, Fla. — The Crimson Tide and the Ohio State Buckeyes met for only the third time in the two schools' storied histories at the 1995 CompUSA Florida Citrus Bowl. Alabama, winner of the previous two encounters with OSU, made its first Citrus Bowl appearance.

After a scoreless first quarter, Alabama took possession following a missed field goal and mounted an impressive drive, but the momentum seemed to escape when a stray dog found his way onto the field and caused a lengthy delay. The drive stalled and Michael Proctor's 49-yard field goal attempt was blocked.

The Crimson Tide started another drive on its 20-yard line with just over four minutes remaining in the first period. The 16-play, 80-yard drive ended early in the second period and was capped off by Tarrant Lynch's touchdown run from nine yards out.

The lead was short-lived, however, as 13 seconds later, Ohio State tied the game with a 69-yard bomb from Bobby Hoying to Joey Galloway. The Buckeyes then capitalized on a blocked punt deep in Tide territory, and Hoying hooked up with Galloway once again, this time from 11 yards out, to give Ohio State a 14-7 lead.

Alabama responded with an 11-play, 80-yard drive on the very next possession to tie the game. Sherman Williams finished the drive with a sevenyard scamper and both teams went to the locker room deadlocked at 14.

After a scoreless third quarter, OSU regained the lead at 17-14 as Josh Jackson connected on a 34-yard field goal with 8:41 to go in the game. Michael Proctor, who had missed a 25-yard field goal to start the fourth quarter, redeemed himself with a 27-yarder that tied the score, 17-17, with 4:29 left to play.

With less than a minute to play, Jay Barker hit Sherman Williams over the middle for a 50-yard touchdown and a 24-17 win. Alabama finished the season at 12-1-0, and with the victory, the senior class of 1994 (45-4-1) broke the record for most wins in a four-year period. Sherman Williams rushed for 166 yards, catching eight passes for 155 yards and scoring two touchdowns.

TAMPA, Fla. — With two storied football traditions behind both teams participating in the 1997 Outback Bowl in Tampa Bay, the Crimson Tide and the Michigan Wolverines met for the second time under the sun of Florida's Gulf coast.

Alabama provided the only score of the first quarter when placekicker Jon Brock nailed a 43-yard field goal with 11:18 remaining on the game clock, giving the Crimson Tide a 3-0 lead that lasted until midway through the second quarter.

Starting from their own 30 yard line, the Wolverines capitalized on their first possession of the second quarter as Remy Hamilton split the uprights from 44 yards away to tie the score at three with eight minutes left in the first half.

After two Alabama possessions ended in a punt and a costly interception, Michigan took possession on the Alabama 35-yard line and drove 33 yards, highlighted by a fake field goal that netted 18 yards. A stingy Tide stop unit forced the Wolverines to settle with a 22-yard field goal by Hamilton and Michigan took a 6-3 lead in to half-

After a scoreless third quarter, Butkus semifinalist Dwayne Rudd made the highlight reel and the play of the game for Alabama. Kelvin Sigler's blindside hit of quarterback Brian Griese forced an errant throw that Rudd picked off at the 12-yard line and returned 88 yards for the go-ahead score. Brock's extra point gave the Crimson Tide a 10-6 lead with 12:13 remaining in the game.

Two possessions later, tailback Shaun Alexander capped a five-play, 77-yard scoring drive with a 46-yard touchdown scamper to boost the Alabama lead to 17-6 with 2:15 remaining in the game.

Michigan did not go away, however, and the Wolverines mounted a nine-play, 80-yard scoring drive on the next possession, as Griese connected with Russell Shaw to move Michigan to within five. Chris Floyd completed the two-point conversion for the Wolverines and Bama's lead was cut to three.

An onside kick followed, and Alabama's Chad Goss recovered to close the game for the Tide. Rudd earned the Outback Bowl Most Valuable Player trophy.

The Music City Bowl

December 29, 1998 Virginia Tech 38, Alabama 7

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The Tide's 49th bowl appearance and the first for Mike DuBose as Alabama's head coach, turned out to be an unhappy affair, as Virginia Tech beat the Tide, 38-7 in the inaugural Music City Bowl. Televised by ESPN, the later-afternoon game was played in Vanderbilt Stadium before an announced crowd of 41,600. The weather was horrid with rain and sleet as the temperature hung just above the freezing mark.

Tech opening the scoring with a four-play, 56 yard drive to open the game as quarterback Al Clark ran 43 yards for the TD when his receivers were covered. Alabama came back in the second quarter to score on a 75-yard drive when Andrew Zow threw to Michael Vaughn for what would prove to be the Tide's only score of the game. Tech came back on the ensuing possession to score on a field goal to lead 10-7 at the half.

Virginia Tech then scored 14 points in each of the final two quarters to notch their ninth win of the season. The Hokies blocked a pair of Tide punts, picked-off three Alabama passes and generally played havoc with the Tide offense.

In the third quarter, three successive Alabama possessions ended with an interception, a blocked punt and a fumbled punt return. All three miscues resulted in Hokie touchdowns. The final Tech score came when Anthony Midget intercepted an Andrew Zow pass and returned it 27-yards for a touchdown.

Offensively, the stats were close...15 first downs for each team; 278 total yards for Tech and 274 yards for Alabama. Alabama lost one fumble, suffered three interceptions and could manage just 50 yards rushing. The Tide did have 224 yards passing, but could not move the football into the endzone.

January 1, 2000 Michigan 35, Alabama 34 (OT)

MIAMI, Fla. — Two of the most storied college football teams faced each other in the 2000 FedEx Orange Bowl and only extra time and an extra point could separate them.

The Michigan Wolverines scored a touchdown and converted an extra point in the overtime to beat the Crimson Tide 35-34. Alabama scored a touchdown but missed the PAT on its overtime possession

Shaun Alexander scored three touchdowns in the first three quarters to help the Crimson Tide build a 28-14 lead with 8:29 left in the third. His three touchdowns were the most in school history for an individual in a bowl game. Alexander finished with 161 yards rushing and scored his last touchdown on a 50-yard run.

Freddie Milons scored the last touchdown for Alabama in regulation on a 62-yard punt return. Milons ran for 107 yards on four punt returns to set a new Alabama and Orange Bowl record for punt return yards in a game. The previous records for both had been set by Hootie Ingram in the 1953 Orange Bowl Game.

Michigan rallied with three touchdowns in the third to tie the game at 28. The Wolverines lined up to attempt a game-winning field goal with two seconds left in regulation, but Phillip Weeks blocked the kick

Weeks and several other Crimson Tide players had bigger roles in the bowl game than they had in the regular season. Lannis Baxley made his first start on the offensive line in place of injured Outland Trophy winner Chris Samuels. Baxley and Bart Raulston combined to secure the right tackle position and Dante Ellington moved to left tackle to fill in for Samuels.

Andrew Zow and Tyler Watts combined to take all the snaps at quarterback for Alabama. Zow threw for 86 yards and one touchdown and Watts completed all six of his passes for 35 yards.

The two teams combined to set new Orange Bowl records with 35 points scored in the third quarter.

SHREVEPORT, La. — The Alabama Crimson Tide made it four in a row to finish the 2001 season as the Tide trimmed lowa State, 14-13 before a national television audience on ESPN. The game marked Alabama's 51st bowl appearance and the first ever for the Tide in the Independence Bowl.

Iowa State racked-up 456 yards of total offense and had 23 first downs. But the Tide defense held when it had to and the offense scored when it counted the most.

Trailing the Cyclones 13-10 late in the fourth quarter, Marc Miller and Waine Bacon combined to block a Tony Yelk punt. Bama recovered at the Cyclone 29-yard line with 5:31 left in the fourth quarter.

Tailback Ahmaad Galloway ran right for two yards and then quarterback Andrew Zow connected with tight end Terry Jones, Jr., for a 27-yard TD strike for the winning points. Neal Thomas kicked the extra point and turned the game over to the Bama defense.

lowa State began its drive at their own nineyard line, getting to the Tide 30 before settling on a 47-yard field goal attempt by Yelk. The distance was enough to clear the uprights but the kick sailed wide right and Alabama celebrated its NCAA-best 29th bowl victory.

State's Ennis Haywood was the game's leading rusher with 125 yards on 20 carries, while the Tide was led by Galloway's 90 yards on 16 carries. Neither team had a rushing touchdown. The Cyclone's Wallace completed 25 of 42 passes for 284 yards, with Zow hit on 11 of 19 for 119 yards, one TD and one interception.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. -- Minnesota's tailback tandem of Marion Barber III and Laurence Maroney rushed for a combined 292 yards in a 20-16 win over the Tide at the 2004 Music City Bowl at The Coliseum in Nashville.

Bama managed just 21 yards rushing but quarterback Spencer Pennington hit 22 of 36 passes for 243 yards and one TD.

The Tide struck first when Pennington, after a Freddie Roach fumble recovery, hit Le'Ron McClain with a two-yard TD pass to give the Crimson Tide a 7-0 lead just 48 seconds into the game.

The Tide then intercepted the Gophers on their next possession but gave the ball right back on a turnover of their own. Minnesota's Keith Lipka picked up a fumble at Bama's 2-yard line and stepped over the goal line for the touchdown to tie the game at 7-7. On their next possession, UM's Barber scored on a five-yard run to give the Gophers a 14-7 lead with 14:57 left in the first half. UM's Rhys Lloyd tacked on a field goal with 8:07 to play in the first half to go up 17-7 but Bama answered when McClain capped a 10-play, 73-yard drive with a one-yard run to make it 17-14 at the half.


Lloyd drilled his second field goal of the game to put UM up 20-14 with 10:16 left to play in the third. His 24-yarder capped an 11-play, 68-yard drive to open the second half. Following an Alabama punt, Minnesota, pinned deep in its own territory, opted for a safety with 3:11 left in the game to make the score 20-16.

Alabama had one last chance from their own 48-yard line. After two first downs moved the chains to the UM 19-yard line, Bama faced third down. Pennington missed an open Tyrone Prothro in the end zone that would have given Bama the lead. Pennington's fourth down pass to DJ Hall was also incomplete and Minnesota ran out the clock.

Jan. 1, 2006 Alabama 13, Texas Tech 10

DALLAS, Texas – The Alabama Crimson Tide concluded its 2005 season at 10-2 thanks to a 13-10 win over No. 15 Texas Tech in the 2006 AT&T Cotton Bowl Classic in Dallas. It marked the Tide's 28th 10 win season, an NCAA record. When the dust settled, Alabama finished ranked 8th in both final polls.

Although the Jamie Christensen kick was by no means perfect, it was enough to keep Bama in the win column and marked his third game-winning field goal of the season.

Alabama's defense dominated the game early as the Red Raiders were forced to punt after their first possession of the game.

The Tide's first possession resulted in a 76-yard touchdown pass from Brodie Croyle to Keith Brown. It was the Tide's second play of the game and Croyle flicked a play action pass to Brown. Christensen's PAT was good, giving the Tide an early 7-0 lead.

The Tide defense held the Red Raiders in check until late in the first quarter when Alex Trlica hit a 34-yard field goal, cutting the Tide lead to 7-3.

With 2:39 left in the second quarter, Alabama had a 38-yard field goal blocked and Tech took over at the Bama 46. Tech marched to the Alabama 21 and with time ticking off, attempted a 37-yard field goal. Bama's Mark Anderson burst through to block the attempt.

In the third quarter, the Tide was able to put more points on the scoreboard when Christensen kicked a 31-yard field goal for a 10-3 Bama lead. Earlier in the fourth quarter, Tech managed another Triica field goal to tie the game at 10-10.

Bama then went to work from their own 14-yard line, moving to the Red Raiders' 28-yard line. With just five seconds left in the game, Christensen nailed a 45-yard field goal, giving the Tide a 13-10 win.

In his last game, Alabama quarterback Brodie Croyle was named the game's Offensive MVP. He completed 19 of 31 passes for 275 yards and one touchdown. Alabama linebacker DeMeco Ryans was named Defensive MVP after getting seven tackles to lead the Bama defense.

SHREVEPORT, La. – Ending the 2006 season in the PetroSun Independence Bowl, Alabama scored two late touchdowns to erase a 14-point deficit, but a 27-yard field goal by Oklahoma State's Jason Ricks with 13 seconds left pinned a 34-31 loss on Bama at Independence Stadium.

Alabama trailed at halftime, 24-14, after OSU capitalized on an early Alabama fumble to grab an early 7-0 lead when Dantrell Savage scored from one yard out. Alabama responded with a 72-yard scoring drive with John Parker Wilson connecting with Matt Caddell on a slant pattern to tie the score. Wilson finished the day 18-of-33 passing for 168 yards and a touchdown.

DJ Hall extended his school record for single-season receiving yards with five catches for 42 yards, giving him 1,056 yards on the season. Kenneth Darby had a career-high four catches for 30 yards and Caddell caught three for 33 yards and a touchdown

After OSU extended its lead to 17-7 in the second period, Alabama answered with an 80-yard drive ended by a one-yard run by Tim Castille to pull the score to 17-14 before OSU led by 10 at the half, 24-14

After the Tide opened the third quarter with a 24-yard field goal from Jamie Christensen to pull the score to 24-17, OSU extended its lead to 31-17.

Alabama's comeback came quickly. Javier
Arenas returned a punt 86 yards for a score to pull
the Tide within seven, 31-24, with 10:50 remaining. The touchdown was the longest punt return in
Independence Bowl history. On the ensuing kickoff,
Chris Rogers forced a fumble and recovered it on
the OSU 21-yard line. Five plays later, Wilson tossed
a screen pass (ruled a lateral) to right tackle Andre
Smith, who carried the ball two yards into the end
zone, tying the score 31-31 with 8:41 remaining.

After trading possessions, the OSU offense strung together a 10-play, 74-yard drive to the Alabama 10 with 13 seconds remaining, and Ricks' 27-yard field goal split the uprights for the 34-31 verdict.

Dec. 30, 2007 Alabama 30, Colorado 24

Alabama used a 20-point first quarter and relied on a stingy second-half defense to withstand Colorado in the PetroSun Independence Bowl Sunday, gaining 388 total yards in a 30-24 win over the Buffaloes at Independence Stadium.

Alabama (7-6) dominated the first quarter of the game, opening with two field-goal-scoring drives and a touchdown, a 15-yard pass from junior John Parker Wilson to senior Keith Brown for a 13-0 lead 10 minutes into the game.

After a Colorado punt, Alabama took the ball 63 yards on its next possession, capping the drive with a 34-yard touchdown pass from Wilson to senior Matt Caddell for the 20-0 first-quarter lead. A blocked Colorado punt set up the Tide at its own 35-yard line, and six plays later Wilson hit Nikita Stover with a 34-yard touchdown pass to extend Alabama's lead to 27-0. Wilson completed 13 of his first 15 passes for 185 yards and three touchdowns.

Late in the half, Colorado quarterback Cody Hawkins found receiver Tyson DeVree for a four-yard score to cut the Tide lead to 27-7. A 25-yard pass from Hawkins to Dusty Sprague with four seconds left cut the Alabama lead to 27-14 at the half.

A third quarter Colorado field goal cut the Alabama lead to 27-17.

In the fourth quarter, Alabama was able to extend its lead to 30-17 with a 26-yard field goal from Leigh Tiffin, his third of the night, with 4:36 left in the game. Colorado then went 69 yards in just 45 seconds to cut the Alabama lead to 30-24 with a touchdown pass from Hawkins to DeVree, but the Tide was able to convert two first downs on its next possession, running the clock down to preserve the victory.

Wilson was 19-of-32 passing for 256 yards, with three touchdowns and one interception. The Alabama defense was led by defensive end Wallace Gilberry, who recorded five tackles-for-loss in an eight-tackle performance in his final game for the Tide, tying the Alabama single-game record for tackles-for-loss. Safety Rashad Johnson had 13 tackles while Mustin had eight stops to go with his interception.

The Sugar Bowl

Jan. 2, 2009 Utah 31, Alabama 17

NEW ORLEANS, La. – Fourth-ranked Alabama battled back from an early 21-0 deficit against No. 6 Utah, getting to within 21-17 in the second half, but the Crimson Tide fell to the Utes, 31-17, in the 75th Allstate Sugar Bowl in New Orleans. Alabama finished the season with a 12-2 record while Utah finished the season as college football's only undefeated team at 13-0.

Utah scored 21 first-quarter points, converting one interception into points and getting a pair of touchdown passes from Brian Johnson to take a 21-0 lead into the second quarter. Alabama rallied with a 73-yard punt return for a touchdown by Javier Arenas. A fumble on Utah's first possession of the third quarter gave Alabama the ball in the Utes' territory, and a 4-yard touchdown pass from John Parker Wilson to Glen Coffee cut the margin to 21-17 with 11:14 to go in the third. Utah, however, closed the game on a 10-0 run.

Wilson completed 18 of 30 passes for 177 yards, with one touchdown and two interceptions. Julio Jones was Wilson's leading receiver, finishing with seven catches for 77 yards. Coffee (36 yards) and Mark Ingram (26) combined for 62 yards on the ground. Coffee moved into second place on the Alabama single-season rushing list with 1,386 yards. The game was Alabama's first Sugar Bowl appearance since its national championship win over Miami to close the 1992 season, and its first Bowl Championship Series appearance since playing in the Orange Bowl in the 1999 season. The game extended Alabama's NCAA-best bowl appearances mark to 56.

Johnson threw for 336 yards and three touch-downs for Utah on his way to being selected the game's most outstanding player. Johnson was 27-of-41 and was not intercepted. Utah's defense was impressive, intercepting Wilson twice and sacking him eight times, with the seventh sack forcing a fumble that ended the Crimson Tide's last threat with just more than five minutes remaining.

Johnson connected with receiver Freddie Brown 12 times for 125 yards. His touchdown passes went for 7 yards to Brent Casteel, 18 yards to Bradon Godfrey and 28 yards to David Reed. Matt Asiata ran for a 2-yard score, set up by Reed's leaping catch at the 2. An Alabama comeback appeared to be building early in the second half, when Dont'a Hightower stripped Johnson, and Bobby Greenwood recovered at the Utah 30. Wilson drove the Tide for a score, hitting Coffee for an easy 4-yard touchdown pass on a rollout to close the gap to 21-17.

At that point, Alabama had scored 17 straight points, and it appeared to be only a matter of time before the Tide would overtake the underdog Utes. But Johnson opened Utah's next drive with a 33-yard pass over the middle to Brown.

That started a 71-yard scoring drive that ended with Reed's touchdown. The Tide drove right back into Utah territory, but Ingram was stopped for no gain on third-and-2 from the Utah 32. Leigh Tiffin then missed his second long field goal of the game, hooking a 49-yarder just left of the upright.
