GAME 2: ALABAMA (1-0) vs. FIU (0-0)

SATURDAY, SEPT. 12 • 6 P.M. • PPV

BRYANT-DENNY STADIUM (92,138) • TUSCALOOSA, ALA.

THE GAME: The University of Alabama football team opens the home portion of the 2009 season on Saturday, September 12, when the Crimson Tide welcomes the Florida International Panthers to Bryant-Denny Stadium. The game is slated to kickoff at 6 p.m. (CDT) and will be televised on a pay-per-view basis. Chris Stewart, Tyler Watts and Barry Krauss will call the action on television with Eli Gold and Phil Savage joining Krauss on the Crimson Tide Sports Network radio call.

HEAD COACH NICK SABAN: Alabama head coach Nick Saban (Kent State, 1973) is in his third season with the Crimson Tide. He was named the school's 27th head coach on Jan. 3, 2007. Saban has compiled a 111-50-1 (.688) record as a collegiate head coach with a 20-8 (.714) mark at Alabama that includes 1-0 record this year after a 34-24 win over No. 7 Virginia Tech to open the season. He captured his 100th career win and coached his 150th game as a collegiate head coach during the 2008 campaign. Saban led LSU to a 13-1 record and the BCS National Championship in 2003. Overall, Saban has coached three conference championship teams (1990 Mid-American, 2001 SEC and 2003 SEC) and nine of his 12 teams have played in post-season bowl games with Tide appearing in the 2009 Sugar Bowl. Saban is one of two (Bob Stoops) current Football Bowl Subdivision coaches to coach for at least 10 years and not suffer a losing season.

RANKINGS: Alabama was ranked fifth in both the *Associated Press* and *USA Today* Coaches' preseason polls. It was the highest preseason ranking for the Tide since the 2000 season when they opened at No. 3. After a week one win over then-No. 7 Virginia Tech and a loss by then-No. 3 Oklahoma to BYU, the Crimson Tide moved up one spot to No. 4 in both of this week's rankings. The Crimson Tide also garnered two first-place votes in the AP poll.

FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL SERIES: Alabama defeated Florida International 38-3 in the only meeting between the two schools. The Crimson Tide's win came on Oct. 28, 2006, at Bryant-Denny Stadium. The Tide scored in all three phases of that game with Le'Ron McClain catching a touchdown pass from John Parker Wilson, Javier Arenas returning a punt 68-yards for a touchdown and Ramzee Robinson picking off a pass and returning it 34 yards for a score.

NEXT GAME: Alabama will play the second game of a three-game homestand against the North Texas Mean Green on Saturday, Sept. 19, at Bryant-Denny Stadium. The game will kickoff at 11:20 a.m. and will be televised on the SEC Network. It will be the third meeting between Alabama and North Texas and the first since the 2002 season when the Tide won 33-7 at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama's success on the field over the past two seasons under the direction of head coach Nick Saban has also coincided with the Crimson Tide's success in the classroom. An impressive 12 Crimson Tide players will take the field in 2009 with degrees already in hand, including Eryk Anders (Health Studies), Drew Davis (marketing), P.J. Fitzgerald (management), Mike Johnson (consumer affairs), Tyrone King (Health Studies), Greg McElroy (business marketing), Cory Reamer (finance), Chris Rogers (consumer affairs), Ali Sharrief (human environmental science), Travis Sikes (consumer affairs), Heath Thomas and Lorenzo Washington (human environmental science). McElroy finished his undergraduate degree in just three years with a 3.86 grade point average while graduating magna cum laude. On top of that, another 10 players are on track to graduate in December of 2009. In 2008, Alabama had six players with degrees already in hand.

TIDE LEADS NATION IN GRADUATES: Alabama's 12 graduates on the 2009 roster are the most of any school in the Bowl Championship Subdivision. The Crimson Tide is four graduates ahead of any other SEC school with Auburn checking in fifth with eight graduates. Boston College and the Tide season-opening opponent Virginia Tech are tied for second with 10 graduates while Penn State is fourth with nine. (see sidebar for complete list)

LINEBACKERS NATION'S ELITE: Alabama entered the season a year ago with a lot of questions and no depth at linebacker. In 2009, one of the few questions is how will the Tide get all of their talented young linebackers playing time. Leading that group is junior Rolando McClain and sophomore Dont'a Hightower. McClain was a Butkus Award finalist a year ago and a preseason *Playboy* All-American in 2009. Hightower was a Freshman All-American a year ago and will be looking for even more as a sophomore. *ESPN.com* SEC beat writer Chris Low recently took a look at the SEC linebacking corps and ranked them from 1-12. The Crimson Tide came out on top in a league filled with outstanding linebackers. *Sporting News* also tabbed the Alabama linebackers the best in the nation. Below is a look at what Low had to say about the Tide.

"1. Alabama: The one-two punch of Rolando McClain and Dont'a Hightower is as good as there is anywhere in the country. Watch some of the younger guys take off at linebacker this season, too, like Courtney Upshaw and Jerrell Harris. The Crimson Tide have depth, talent and smarts to go around at linebacker."

PRESEASON ALL-AMERICANS: The Crimson Tide has had five players earn preseason first-team All-America honors leading up to the start of the 2009 campaign. Javier Arenas, Terrence Cody, Mike Johnson, Julio Jones and Rolando McClain have garnered at least one first-team designation. McClain leads the way with six first-team honors. (complete list of preseason All-American in the sidebar)

SABAN AMONG THE BEST: Head coach Nick Saban's arrival in Tuscaloosa has seen his Crimson Tide vault up the national rankings. His success in such a short period of time has quickly impacted the Tide's record book. Saban produced the largest win increase from year one to year two in school history as Alabama went from seven wins in 2007 to 12 wins in 2008. He is one of two coaches (Bob Stoops, Oklahoma) in Football Bowl Subdivision football to have coached 10 years and never suffered through a losing season. He also ranks fourth in winning percentage (68.6 percent) among active coaches who have coached at least 10 years of Division I-A football.

TIDE CAPTURES 800TH WIN: The storied Alabama football program captured the program's 800th win last week in Atlanta with a 34-24 win over No. 7 Virginia Tech. Alabama is the seventh school in the Football Bowl Subdivision to reach the 800-win plateau. The Crimson Tide holds an 800-316-43 all-time record, which is a .709 winning percentage that ranks sixth in FBS history. The other six programs to record 800 wins is: Michigan (873); Texas (833); Notre Dame (832); Nebraska (818); Ohio State (808); Penn State (801).

BEATING THE BEST: Alabama is 4-2 against the Associated Press Top 25 over the 2008 and 2009 seasons. The Crimson Tide's 34-24 win over Virginia Tech on Saturday was the Tide's third win over a top-10 team during that 15 game span.

STIFLING DEFENSE PUTTING UP IMPRESSIVE NUMBERS: Alabama's defense over the past 15 games - or two seasons - has developed a reputation for its toughness and talent. That reputation is played out when you look at the stat sheet. The Crimson Tide has held 13 teams under 100 yards rushing over the past 15 games, only LSU and Florida in 2008 were able to crack the 100-yard barrier as a team. The Tide has surrendered just 1,102 yards on the ground in the last 15 games, an average of 73.5 yards per game. Also, no individual running back has cracked the 100-yard mark since Mississippi's BenJarvus Green-Ellis went for 131 on Oct. 13, 2007, a span of 21 games.

The Alabama defense has also held opponent's total offense under 200 yards in seven of the last 15 games, including a 155-yard effort by Virginia Tech in the 2009 season opener. The complete sub-200-yard games in that span include: Clemson (188); Western Kentucky (158); Tennessee (173); Arkansas State (158); Mississippi State (167); Auburn (170); Virginia Tech (155).

MARCELL DAREUS HAS BREAKOUT GAME: Sophomore defensive lineman Marcell Dareus had a great fall practice and a breakout game in the season opener against Virginia Tech. He got the start at defensive end after Brandon Deaderick was shot in an attempted robbery the Monday prior to the season opener against Tech. Dareus responded with two total tackles, including 1.5 sacks as he harassed Tech signal-caller Tyrod Taylor into 9-of-20 passing for just 91 yards.

TIME OF POSSESSION: An Alabama trademark over the past two seasons has been its ability to control the line of scrimmage offensively and, consequently, control the tempo of the game. This has played out with an impressive advantage in time of possession. A year ago the Crimson Tide finished 11th nationally with an average time of possession of 32:08. In 2009, the Crimson Tide is off to another great start in that category after holding the ball for 37:02 in the opener against Virginia Tech. The Crimson Tide has won the time of possession battle in 10 of their last 15.

INGRAM OFF TO THE RACES: Sophomore running back Mark Ingram showed a national television audience why he was named to the watch list for the Doak Walker Award after rushing for 150 yards and a touchdown against No. 7 Virginia Tech. He also hauled in three passes for 35 yards, which included an 18-yard touchdown grab to seal the fifth-ranked Crimson Tide's 34-24 win. Ingram earned Offensive Most Outstanding Player honors for the game and bested his previous single-game career-best rushing yardage, which was a 113-yard effort against Arkansas State in 2008. He also set a single-game high for rushing attempts with 26, eclipsing his previous high of 17 set against Clemson and Mississippi in 2008. Ingram also received "Helmet Stickers" from Mark May on ESPN's GameDay Final and from ESPN SEC beat writer Chris Low.

BALL SECURITY: Mark Ingram has also developed another impressive reputation during his 15-game Alabama career. The Flint, Mich. native is an expert at holding onto the football. The sophomore has not lost a fumble in 169 career rushing attempts and only put the ball on the ground one time, coming at LSU in 2008, which was recovered by the Tide. He has 878 yards in those 15 games with 13 rushing touchdowns.

ALABAMA IN THE AP

Alabama has been ranked in 631 of the 991 Associated Press college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll

Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 373-128-10 all-time record in games when ranked in the Associated Press college football poll, including a 13-5 mark under head coach Nick Saban. The Crimson Tide is also ranked in the AP poll for the 16th consecutive game (including all 14 last season), its longest streak since the mid 1990s when UA was ranked for 71 consecutive weeks under Coach Gene Stallings.

UA IN THE COACHES' POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches rankings over the last half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. The USA Today took over the poll in 1991 and has run the poll for the last 19 seasons. Alabama is ranked No. 5 in the 2009 preseason coaches' poll after not being ranked in last year's preseason poll. Alabama entered the rankings after beating Clemson and was ranked in the coaches poll for the remainder of the season, reaching No. 1 in the polls for five weeks in November. The Tide has five UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 and 1979) and USA Today (1992) coaches poll national titles.

DOMINANT 'D': Alabama returned eight starters from a 2008 defense that finished third nationally in total defense, allowing just 263.5 yards per game. The 2009 unit had an excellent debut against Virginia Tech, holding the Hokies to 155 total yards (64 rushing, 91 passing) and 11 first downs. The Tide held Tech to 2-of-12 on third down conversions and racked up five sacks of Hokies' quarterback Tyrod Taylor. In 2008, Alabama finished second nationally in rush defense, surrendering just 74.14 ypg and rank 26th after the opening weekend of 2009.

TIFFIN TIES SINGLE-GAME HIGH WITH 4 FIELD GOALS: Senior place-kicker Leigh Tiffin converted 4-of-5 field goal attempts against Virginia Tech, making good on attempts from 49, 34, 43 and 20 yards. That matched his single-game best at Alabama. (previously achieved vs. Tennessee, Oct. 20, 2007; Mississippi State on Nov. 10, 2007; Clemson on Aug. 30, 2008) and ranks second in Alabama history (6 by Philip Doyle vs. Southwestern Louisiana on Oct. 6, 1990). The four field goals give Tiffin 57 in his Alabama career, ranking him fourth all-time in Crimson Tide history behind Philip Doyle (78 from 1987-90), Michael Proctor (65 from 1992-95) and Tiffin's father, Van Tiffin (59 from 1983-86).

DEADERICK SEES ACTION: Senior defensive tackle Brandon Deaderick completed a miraculous return to the playing field with an appearance in the Crimson Tide's win over Virginia Tech, just 5 days after being shot by an unknown assailant on Monday night, August 31, in Tuscaloosa. Deaderick, who suffered non-life threatening injuries to his left forearm and hip in the incident, was cleared for action by team doctors. He saw his first action on special teams with 6:35 left to play in the first quarter on Virginia Tech's point-after conversion following a 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown that tied the game at 6-6. Deaderick saw action on defense with 3:00 left in the first quarter. He finished with one solo tackle vs. the Hokies.

9 FIRST-TIME STARTERS FOR ALABAMA: Nine Alabama players (6 on offense, 3 on defense) made their first career starts for the Crimson Tide against Virginia Tech. On defense, senior linebacker Eryk Anders, sophomore defensive back Mark Barron and sophomore defensive lineman Marcell Dareus were first-time starters. On offense, junior left tackle James Carpenter, sophomore center William Vlachos, sophomore right guard Barrett Jones, senior tight end Colin Peek, sophomore tight end/H-back Brad Smelley and junior quarterback Greg McElroy made their first starts.

11TH NATIONAL TV EXPOSURE IN ALABAMA'S LAST 15 GAMES: The Virginia Tech game was Alabama's 11th national TV broadcast in its last 15 games. In 2008, Alabama had 10 of its 14 games broadcast nationally, including five games on CBS, three games on ESPN, one on ABC and one on FOX. The 10 nationally broadcast games last year were tied with Notre Dame for the most in the nation.

TOUGH SLATE: Alabama will once again have one of the most difficult schedules in the nation with three games against teams ranked in the *USA Today* Coaches' Poll top 10. The Tide will face No. 7 Virginia Tech in the opener and then travel to No. 10 Mississippi on Oct. 10. The final preseason top-10 foe is LSU, who will visit Tuscaloosa on Nov 7.

THE HERBIES: ESPN's Kirk Herbstreit will see a lot of the Crimson Tide on the first weekend of the 2009 college football season. He kicks off another year of the popular ESPN College GameDay Saturday morning in Atlanta and will then be in the broadcast booth for ABC for the Crimson Tide's match up with Virginia Tech. Earlier in the week his ninth annual Herbie Awards were announced on ESPN.com with several Alabama players being honored and the Tide picked to win the SEC West. Both Mark Ingram (Remember Me: Household Names by the End of September) and Greg McElroy (Anticipation: Top First-Year Quarterback Starters) won Herbies. Several other Tide players were listed in the top three. The complete list of Alabama players is below.

TIDE PLAYERS EARN EARLY ACCOLADES: Eight Alabama players have been named to 11 different preseason awards watch lists heading into the 2009 season. The players have been recognized before the start of the 2009 season as potentially the top players at their position nationally.

Both Rolando McClain and Terrence Cody appear on five watch lists. McClain is on the watch list for the Chuck Bednarik Award (best defensive player), Dick Butkus Award (top linebacker), Lombardi Trophy (top lineman or linebacker), Lott Trophy (best defensive player) and Nagurski Trophy (defensive player of the year). As a sophomore, McClain led the Tide with 95 tackles and 12 tackles for loss. Cody is also up for the Bednarik Award, Lombardi Trophy, Lott Trophy, Nagurski Award and Outland Trophy. Last year as a junior, Cody recorded 24 tackles, 4 ½ tackles for loss and recovered two fumbles for the Tide. Other defensive players on the various preseason awards list included Arenas (Nagurski and Thorpe) and Hightower (Butkus and Lombardi).

The Crimson Tide offense is represented by Mark Ingram, Mike Johnson and Julio Jones. Jones appears on the Biletnikoff Award (best receiver) and Maxwell Trophy (player of the year), while Johnson is on both the Lombardi and Outland watch lists for outstanding linemen. Ingram appears on the Doak Walker Award list, presented the nation's top running back. Last year as a freshman, Ingram ran for 712 yards and a freshman record 12 touchdowns. Senior Leigh Tiffin was named to the Lou Groza Award list, which is given to the nation's top place kicker.

THREE TIDE PLAYERS NAMED PLAYBOY ALL-AMERICANS: Alabama landed three players on the 2009 *Playboy Magazine* annual preseason College Football All-America Team. Rolando McClain was selected as a linebacker while Julio Jones was picked at wide receiver and Javier Arenas was the return specialist. Alabama has now had four *Playboy* All-Americans in the last two years after Andre Smith was chosen in 2008.

FRESHMAN ACADEMICS: Alabama's heralded 2008 freshman class did more than just excel on the football field, the Crimson Tide placed 12 rookies on the 2009 SEC Freshman Academic Honor Roll, by far the highest total in the SEC with Georgia coming in second with seven honorees. The Tide's freshmen academic honorees were Undra Billingsley, John Michael Boswell, Jerrell Harris, Mark Ingram, Barrett Jones, Chris Jordan, Tyler Love, Wesley Neighbors, Brad Smelley, Corey Smith, Damion Square and Michael Williams. Each student-athlete must have a cumulative GPA of 3.00 or above and be on scholarship or a letter winner. They also must completed 24 semester hours of non-remedial credit at the nominating institution and have been a member of the varsity team for the sport's entire NCAA Championship segment.

UA COACHES PLAYERS OF THE WEEK: The Alabama coaching staff recognized five players of the week following the Crimson Tide's 34-24 win over No. 7 Virginia Tech in Atlanta on Saturday. **Mark Ingram** and **Greg McElroy** shared offensive honors. Ingram rushed for 150 yards and a touchdown while catching three passes from McElroy for 35 yards and a score. McElroy threw for 230 yards on 15-of-30 passing with one touchdown and one pick. **Rolando McClain** was the defensive player of the week after recording two sacks (-19 yards) and five total tackles. **P.J. Fitzgerald** and **Brian Selman** shared the special teams award. Selman was again perfect on 13 snapping opportunities, recovered a fumble after hustling down on punt coverage and down another punt inside the Virginia Tech 5-yard line. Fitzgerald averaged 44.8 yards on five punts with a long of 53 yards while pinning the Hokies inside the 20-yard line three times.

SEC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Alabama sophomore running back Mark Ingram was named the Southeastern Conference Offensive Player of the Week following his impressive showing against Virginia Tech. Ingram rushed 26 times for a career-high 150 yards and one touchdown. His previous rushing high was 113 yards against Arkansas State in 2008. He also added three catches for 35 yards and one touchdown to finish the game with a career-high 185 all-purpose yards and two scores. His six-yard rushing touchdown put Alabama on top 24-17 early in the fourth quarter. His 18-yard touchdown catch with 6:35 left in the game, gave the Tide the final margin, 34-24. The Flint, Mich., native accounted for 99 total yards and two touchdowns in UA's decisive fourth quarter. He ran the ball 10 times for 81 yards and one TD and added an 18-yard TD reception.

McELROY DEBUT: Alabama junior Greg McElroy made his starting quarterback debut last week against Virginia Tech. The Southlake, Texas native threw for 230 yards on 15-of-30 passing with one touchdown and one interception in leading the Crimson Tide to a win over the No. 7 team in the country. The 230 yards is the fourth-highest total of any quarterback in their UA debut. Only Brodie Croyle (285), Andrew Zow (272) and John Parker Wilson (253) had more.

DEFENSE TOUGH ON THIRD DOWN: The Crimson Tide defense was stalling on third down against Virginia Tech, holding the Hokies to just two conversions on 12 third down attempts (16.7 percent). The defense was even tougher in the second half, forcing Tech into a 0-of-5 performance on third downs. That continues a trend for the Crimson Tide after UA finished third nationally in third down conversion defense in 2008, holding opponents to a 28.14 percent (56 of 199) conversion rate.

GETTING TO THE QUARTERBACK: Pressure on the quarterback was an area of emphasis for the Alabama defense in 2009 and the hard work in the off season was evident against the Hokies in the season opener. The Crimson Tide sacked Virginia Tech quarterback Tyrod Taylor five times with All-America linebacker Rolando McClain dropping the passer twice in the second half (-19 yards). Marcell Dareus was credited with 1.5 sacks (-8) while Javier Arenas had one sack (-10) and Josh Champman had half of a sack (-1). The five sacks were the most for the Tide in a game since also recording five against Middle Tennessee state on Sept. 3, 2005.

BEST COACHING STARTS: Nick Saban has compiled a 19-7 (.731) record in his career with the Tide and the 19 wins rank in a tie for the fifth-most for any Crimson Tide head football coach after 26 games. J.W.H. Pollard also posted 19 wins through his first 26 games with the Crimson Tide. Xen Scott and Wallace Wade hold the record for most wins after 26 games, with 22 victories. Frank Thomas is third with 21 wins in 26 games with Gene Stallings fourth with 20. Below are the most wins by Alabama coaches after the first 26 games in their career.

SABAN VS. FIU: Alabama head coach Nick Saban has never faced Florida International in his coaching career.

CRISTOBAL VS. ALABAMA: While Florida International head coach Mario Cristobal has never faced Alabama during his coaching career, he did encounter the Crimson Tide on two occasions while a starting offensive lineman for the Miami Hurricanes from 1989-92. As a true freshman, Cristobal played on a Miami team that beat Alabama 33-25 in the Sugar Bowl and clinch the national championship. As a senior, he was a starting offensive lineman for a Miami squad that was beaten 34-13 by Alabama in the Sugar Bowl as the Crimson Tide clinched its 12th national championship.

FIU VERSUS SEC: Florida International is 0-2 all-time against teams from the Southeastern Conference. In addition to its loss to Alabama in 2006, the Panthers also suffered a 58-10 loss to Arkansas on Oct. 27, 2007.

ALABAMA VERSUS SUN BELT: Alabama holds a 17-1 series lead against teams from the Sun Belt Conference. The Crimson Tide posted a 2-0 record against Sun Belt foes last season and will play two more teams in consecutive weeks this year with Florida International (Sept. 12) and North Texas (Sept. 19). Alabama's only loss to a Sun Belt Conference team came on Nov. 17, 2007, when Louisiana- Monroe handed Alabama a 21-14 setback in Tuscaloosa. Here is a breakdown of Alabama's record against the current Sun Belt Conference: Louisiana-Lafayette (8-0), Arkansas State (2-0), Middle Tennessee (2-0), North Texas (2-0), Florida International (1-0), Western Kentucky (1-0) and Louisiana-Monroe (1-1).

FIU UNDER CRISTOBAL: The turnaround from the 2007 season to the 2008 season was not only monumental; it was one of the top storylines of the 2008 college football season. Head coach Mario Cristobal rallied FIU to within one win of reaching bowl eligibility. This year, FIU brings a much improved and more experienced team to Tuscaloosa. The Panthers offense, which averaged 24.7 points per game, will return 30 starters from the 2008 season including All-Sun Belt Conference quarterback Paul McCall and Sun Belt Conference Freshman of the Year T.Y. Hilton at wide receiver and kick returner. Veterans Scott Bryant, Anthony Gaitor, Jeremiah Weatherspoon, and Armond Willis all have another year of experience and will lead a defensive unit ready to prove there is more than just offensive explosion on the Panthers roster.

FLORIDA NATIVES: Alabama has 11 Florida natives on its 2009 football roster, including Javier Arenas (Tampa), Terrence Cody (Ft. Myers), P.J. Fitzgerald (Coral Springs), Star Jackson (Lake Worth), Marquis Johnson (Sarasota), Mike Johnson (Pensacola), Colin Peek (Ponte Vedra Beach), Trent Richardson (Pensacola), Chris Rogers (Lakeland), Ed Stinson (Homestead) and Roy Upchurch (Tallahassee).

HOME OPENERS: Alabama has compiled a 94-15-3 all-time record in home openers, which includes all games in Tuscaloosa, Birmingham, Mobile and Montgomery. The Crimson Tide enters the 2008 season having won its last seven home openers. The streak includes wins over Middle Tennessee (2002), South Florida (2003), Utah State (2004), Middle Tennessee (2005), Hawai'i (2006), Western Carolina (2007) and Tulane (2008). The last time UA lost its home opener was Sept. 1, 2001, when No. 17 UCLA opened the season with a 20-17 win over No. 25 Alabama in Bryant-Denny Stadium. Alabama's first ever home opener took place on Oct. 14, 1893, when Eli Abbott's Crimson Tide team suffered a 4-0 loss to Birmingham Athletic Club. Alabama posted a 44-game unbeaten streak in home openers from 1904-48, which included a 43-0-1 record. The Tide had a 31-game winning streak from 1904-34 before a 7-7 tie with Howard in 1935. UA followed that up with another 12-game losing streak, before the streak ended with a 28-14 loss to Tulane on Sept. 24, 1949 at Ladd Stadium in Mobile. Since 1929, Alabama is 67-10-1 in Bryant-Denny Stadium openers, including a 20-0-1 record from 1929-50 and a 25-game winning streak from 1964-89. The 21-game unbeaten streak was snapped by a 41-18 loss to Villanova on Oct. 12, 1951. The Tide's 25-game winning streak in home openers was snapped by a 17-13 loss to Florida on Sept. 15, 1990.

SABAN HOME OPENERS: Coach Nick Saban is 11-2 in his career in home openers, including a eight-game winning streak. The streak includes one win at Michigan State (1999), five at LSU (2000-04) and two at Alabama (2007-08). His last loss in a home opener was Aug. 29, 1998, when Michigan State fell to Colorado State, 23-16, at East Lansing.

ARENAS A COMMUNITY SERVICE LEADER: Senior cornerback and return specialist Javier Arenas is a nominee for the 2009 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team, which recognizes college football players who make outstanding contributions in the area of volunteerism and civic involvement. Arenas, a native of Tampa, Fla., is one of 52 Division I-A student-athletes across college football nominated for their efforts away from the gridiron. These athletes are being honored for their selfless efforts in the surrounding communities. Arenas has volunteered more than 50 hours of community service throughout the Tuscaloosa community. He has spent time in the local school systems, speaking to children about the dangers of bullying and the positive effects of team work. He has also attended birthday parties of physically challenged children and reached out with phone calls to children battling cancer.

ARENAS FINALIST FOR LOWE'S SENIOR CLASS AWARD: Alabama defensive back Javier Arenas has been selected as one of 30 finalists for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. The Tampa, Fla. native is a preseason first-team Playboy All-American, but his accomplishments in the classroom and in the community are bringing him accolades off the field as well. CLASS, an acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School, the award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

SPORTING NEWS CHRONICLES MIKE JOHNSON: Like his fellow offensive lineman Antoine Caldwell did a season ago, Alabama senior left guard Mike Johnson will write a regular diary for the *Sporting News* in 2009. Johnson will take a look at all aspects of life when you are a college football player at one of the most storied programs.

SOPHOMORE SENSATIONS: Julio Jones and Mark Ingram return for their sophomore season and give the Alabama offense a big-play threat both inside and outside. The duo turned in some of the best rookie seasons in school history in 2008. Jones set school freshman marks for receptions (58), yards (924) and touchdowns (4), while Ingram rushed for 728 yards and a UA rookie record 12 scores.

The pair is off to another fast start in 2009. Ingram rushed for 150 yards and a touchdown while catching three passes for 35 yards and a score. Jones caught a team-high four passes for 46 yards in the opener.

ARENAS BREAKING SPECIAL TEAMS RECORDS: Javier Arenas enters his senior season near or at the top of almost all of the Crimson Tide's punt return records. He is a preseason Playboy All-American as a return specialist and a first-team All-SEC selection at cornerback. He is one of the most dangerous return men in the country and Alabama's career leader in punt returns yards in a game, season and career as well as touchdowns. He is the active NCAA leader in career punt returns for touchdowns and punt return yards in a game. Arenas' 13.5 career yards per punt return also ranks first on the Alabama career chart, just ahead of Harry Gilmer. His six career punt returns for touchdowns also ties the SEC record.

NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw four players selected in the 2009 NFL Draft, including first-round pick Andre Smith, who went to the Cincinnati Bengals with the No. 6 overall pick. Glen Coffee (San Francisco), Antoine Caldwell (Houston) and Rashad Johnson (Arizona) all went off the board in the third round. The four picks are the most for the Tide since five players were taken in 2005.

RETURNING SUCCESS: Much of the talk in the preseason has been about Alabama's vaunted defense, and the defensive side of the football is where the Crimson Tide returns the biggest portion of its players from last year's Sugar Bowl team. UA features 14 total returning starters and 55 lettermen this season, but eight of those returning starters are on the defensive side of the football with four on offense and both specialists. The Tide returns 90 percent of its lettermen on defense and 73 percent on offense. The defense returns 84 percent of the tackles (728 of 866) from last season. The special teams returns almost completely intact with place-kicker Leigh Tiffin, punter P.J. Fitzgerald, snapper Brian Selman and return specialist Javier Arenas.

NICK'S KIDS: At Michigan State, head coach Nick Saban and his wife Terry started the "Nick's Kids" Foundation, which the Sabans have continued in Tuscaloosa. Since their arrival at the University of Alabama, the Sabans have helped raise over \$1 million - including over \$300,000 this year - for "Nick's Kids" and made a total of more than 160 donations to children's charities throughout the state of Alabama.

STADIUM RENOVATION: The newest expansion project for Bryant-Denny Stadium will see an increase in seating capacity to approximately 101,000, keeping it among the largest on-campus football stadiums in the nation. The expansion, which is expected to be complete for the beginning of the 2010 season, will be the fourth expansion of this magnificent edifice since 1988 and the seventh expansion in the stadium's history. This renovation will mirror north end zone project that was completed in 2006. It will consist of roughly 8,500 additional seats, 1,700 South Zone Club seats, two corner video boards, an upper concourse with concessions and restrooms, 36 skyboxes, offices Donors Hall of Fame and an outdoor market for food and merchandise.

NEW HIRES: The Alabama football staff features two new faces in 2009, including linebackers' coaches Sal Sunseri and James Willis. Sunseri joins the staff spending the last seven seasons as the defensive line coach for the NFL's Carolina Panthers where he coached the likes of Pro Bowl players Julius Peppers, Mike Rucker and Kris Jenkins. Willis joined Saban's staff after spending three years with Auburn where he worked with former Saban assistant Will Muschamp. He spent seven seasons in the NFL prior to beginning his coaching career.

TOP AIDES: Alabama's coaching staff has a wealth of knowledge across all levels of football. The nine-man Crimson Tide staff features a former head coach at the Bowl Subdivision level in Bobby Williams (Michigan State). The staff also has six coaches that have spent time as assistant coaches in the NFL in Bo Davis (Dolphins), Jim McElwain (Raiders), Joe Pendry (19 years with multiple teams), Kirby Smart (Dolphins), Sal Sunseri (Panthers) and Bobby Williams (Lions and Dolphins). Alabama's coaching staff boasts 40-plus years of combined NFL coaching experience.

COACH OF THE YEAR: Saban's success and quick turnaround in 2008 was not lost on the nation. He garnered six national coach of the year awards, including the Home Depot Coach of the year, the FWAA/Eddie Robinson, *Associated Press*, *Sporting News*, Walter Camp and Liberty Mutual. In 2003, Saban was also selected National Coach of the Year by the *Associated Press* and captured the Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award.

LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION: Coach Saban also spent a little time behind the camera during the offseason. He flew out to Los Angeles to film an ESPN College GameDay commercial with Kirk Herbstreit and Chris Fowler. Saban also filmed scenes for the movie *Blindsight*, which chronicles the life of former Mississippi offensive tackle Michael Oher.

BURNS AND COCHRAN HONORED: Associate head coach and running backs coach Burton Burns along with head strength and conditioning coach Scott Cochran were named the nation's best at their respective fields in 2008. Burns was named college football's 2008 FootballScoop Running Backs Coach of the Year, while Cochran was tabbed as the 2008 Samson Strength & Conditioning Coach of the Year for his work with the Crimson Tide in the weight room.

ALABAMA'S TV RECORD: Alabama has compiled a 178-115-5 (.606) all-time record in 298 televised games. This does not include pay-per-view, tape-delayed or closed circuit telecasts. The Crimson Tide owns a 153-96-3 (.613) record in 252 regular-season televised games.

OVERTIME RECORD: Alabama is 4-7 (.364) all-time in overtime games. In its last overtime game, the Crimson Tide defeated LSU 27-21 at Tiger Stadium on Nov. 8, 2008. Alabama has lost six of its last nine overtime games. The Crimson Tide is 4-6 (.400) in overtime games against SEC teams. Alabama is 2-4 (.333) in overtime home games. The Crimson Tide is 3-4 (.429) in single-overtime games.

A-DAY SUCCESS: Alabama has led the SEC in spring football game attendance each of the last three seasons, averaging 84,769 fans for Coach Nick Saban's three A-Day football games at Bryant-Denny Stadium. Alabama dew a then-NCAA record 92,138 fans for Saban's first spring football game on April 21, 2007. In 2008, Alabama led the SEC again with 78,200 fans for it's A-Day game on April 12. The Tide again set the pace in the SEC with 84,050 fans on April 17, 2009.

• Saban brings a 111-50-1 (.688) record as a college head coach into his third season in Tuscaloosa. He has three conference championships and nine teams have played in post-season bowl games, including a trip to the Allstate Sugar Bowl last season.

• Saban one of two (Bob Stoops, Oklahoma) current Football Bowl Subdivision coach to coach for at least 10 years and not suffer a losing season. In 2008, Saban produced the largest win increase from year one to year two in school history as Alabama went from seven wins in 2007 to 12 wins in 2008. He also garnered six national coach of the year awards last year, including the Home Depot Coach of the year, the FWAA/Eddie Robinson, Associated Press, Sporting News, Walter Camp and Liberty Mutual. Saban also spent a little time behind the camera during the offseason. He flew to Los Angeles and film an ESPN College GameDay commercial with Kirk Herbstreit and Chris Fowler. Saban also filmed scenes for the movie *Blindside*, which chronicles the life of former Mississippi offensive tackle Michael Oher.

• His most recent college head coaching stint, a five-season run at LSU, produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships, three SEC West Division championships, and a 3-2 record in bowl games including two Sugar Bowl victories and a Peach Bowl win. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban's guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association of America. Saban was named SEC Coach of the Year twice (by the Birmingham News in 2001 and by the Associated Press in 2003).

• Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans' defensive coordinator/secondary coach. After playing in just one bowl game in the previous four years, Michigan State made four postseason appearances in Saban's five years at the helm. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record as head coach.

• In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season. The Spartans' performance that year landed them a spot in the Citrus Bowl. The Spartans led the Big Ten in rushing defense (77.0 yards per game) and total defense (299.0 yards per game) while ranking fifth nationally in rushing defense and 11th in total defense. The Michigan State offense averaged 31.0 points per game.

• Saban's first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points), and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.

• A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor's degree in business. He earned a master's degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen.

• Saban also is a published author. He co-authored "Tiger Turnaround" in 2001, a book documenting his first two years as head coach at LSU, and co-authored "How Good Do You Want to Be" in 2005, a book that offers real-life principles for success at work and at home.

• At Michigan State, Saban started the "Nick's Kids" Foundation, which the Sabans continue here in Tuscaloosa. Since their arrival at the University of Alabama, the Saban's have helped raise more than \$1 million - including more than \$300,000 this year - for "Nick's Kids" and made a total of more than 160 donations to children's charities throughout the state of Alabama.

• Saban and his wife, Terry, supported several charitable and civic projects in Louisiana. The largest of those efforts was with the Children's Miracle Network, for which Terry and Nick raised more than \$100,000 a year for children.

• Saban was on the cover of the Sept. 1 issue of *Forbes* magazine. The article, written by Monte Burke, examines Saban and his guidance of Crimson Tide program. The cover features Saban with Bryant-Denny Stadium in the background. Saban is the first college football coach to be featured on the cover of *Forbes* since the publication began in 1917.

• The Saban's pledged \$1 million to the University for scholarships in June of 2008. The Saban scholarships are designed specifically for first-generation college students. Six first-generation college students have already benefitted from the \$100,000 gift the Saban's made upon their arrival at the Capstone in January 2007.

HISTORY OF ALABAMA FOOTBALL

- The University of Alabama is in its 115th football season and has compiled an 800-316-43 (.709) all-time record in 1,159 games.
- Alabama won its 800th game on Sept. 5, 2009, with a 34-24 win over No. 7 Virginia Tech in the Chick-fil-A College Kickoff at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. The Tide is the seventh program in Football Bowl Subdivision history to win 800 games.
- The Crimson Tide played its first football game on Nov. 11, 1892 with a 56-0 win over Birmingham High School in Birmingham.
- Alabama is sixth among Division I schools in terms of all-time wins.
- The Crimson Tide football legacy includes 12 national championships, 21 SEC championships and 92 All-Americans.
- UA also ranks among the best in post-season play, holding the NCAA record for most bowl games (56) and most bowl wins (31).
- Alabama ranks second all-time in NCAA history with 29 10-win seasons. Alabama's enduring success on the gridiron is further reflected in the fact that the Crimson Tide has recorded seasons with 10 or more wins in nine different decades since the first double-digit win season in 1920 (10-1).
- Alabama has compiled a 349-159-20 (.680) record in 528 SEC games since 1933.
- Alabama has played in more games (528), has more wins (349) and has won more league titles (21) than any team in SEC history. The Tide also has more SEC wins than Kentucky, Vanderbilt, Arkansas and South Carolina combined.
- Alabama is the only SEC school to win a championship in every decade since the 1930s. The Crimson Tide's last SEC Championship came in 1999.
- Alabama became the first team in NCAA history to win 100 games in a decade in the 1970s. The Crimson Tide posted a 103-16-1 (.863) record from 1970-79, which included eight SEC Championships and three national titles.

BRYANT-DENNY STADIUM

- Alabama's on-campus home since 1929, Bryant-Denny Stadium is one of college football's most scenic venues.
- The Crimson Tide has compiled an all-time record of 218-46-3 (.822) in 267 games at Bryant-Denny Stadium.
- The stadium was originally named for former University of Alabama President Dr. George H. Denny. Dr. Denny was named UA President on Jan. 1, 1912 and amassed an extraordinary career that spanned almost a quarter of a century.
- Bryant-Denny Stadium and Denny Chimes (located on the UA quadrangle) stand as reminders of Denny's legacy to the Capstone.
- In 1976, the State of Alabama Legislature and the UA Board of Trustees added coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's name to the stadium, thus calling Alabama's football home Bryant-Denny Stadium.
- Alabama's Sept. 2, 2006 season opener against Hawai'i drew a state-record 92,138 fans. The previous Bryant-Denny Stadium record was 86,869 on October 23, 1999 against Tennessee.

ALL-TIME TUSCALOOSA RECORD

- In addition to its impressive record at Bryant-Denny Stadium (1929-present), Alabama has made Tuscaloosa a very difficult place to play for opposing football teams.
- Alabama has compiled a 303-59-3 (.834) record in 365 games in Tuscaloosa. The Crimson Tide captured their 300th win in Tuscaloosa on Oct. 18, 2008 vs. Ole Miss.
- Alabama's first game on campus was a 4-0 loss to Birmingham Athletic Club on Oct. 14, 1893.
- From 1911-28, Alabama posted a 55-2 (.965) record in Tuscaloosa. The 1929 season marked the opening of what is now known as Bryant-Denny Stadium.
- Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant posted a remarkable 72-2 (.973) record in Tuscaloosa, losing only to Florida (1963) and Southern Miss (1982). The USM game was the last game Bryant coached at Bryant-Denny Stadium.
- From 1963-82, Alabama posted an NCAA record 57-game home winning streak.
- Miami has since broken that record with a 58-game home winning streak, but the Hurricanes' record also includes three wins in the post-season Orange Bowl game. All of UA's 57 wins were in the regular season.
- The 57-game winning streak is one of seven winning streaks longer than 15 games for the Crimson Tide in Tuscaloosa.
- Alabama posted a 19-game unbeaten streak in Tuscaloosa from 1928-35.
